Youth, Guns and Drugs

Each year, more than 20,000 children and youth under age 20 are killed or injured by firearms in the United States. The lethality of guns, as well as their easy accessibility to young people are key reasons why firearms are the second leading cause of death among young people ages 10 to 19. Only motor vehicle accidents claim more young lives.


I decided to write about my friend S who was shot and killed in 2011.

Students in each grade category who exhibited at-risk behavior. For example, 49% of D/F-students were at risk for rarely/ never wearing seatbelts, compared to 16%, 23%, and 29% of the A, B, and C students. **Note.** For the "carry weapons" Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) item, it was the **Mostly C** students who contributed most to the statistical significance.

Anyone who thinks about their own death is serious about suicide. Take me for instance, 14hi alpost it for 12 hrs. a day. who have committed suicide.

A majority of youth gun deaths are homicides. Suicides account for about onethird of all youth gun deaths, and unintentional shootings for about 7% of those deaths. Older teens, males, African American and Hispanic youth, and young people residing in urban areas are at particularly high risk for gun homicide; white adolescents, males, and youth living in rural areas are at highest risk for gun suicide.


