Rachelle Fetty thought she wanted to be a nurse after graduating from high school, but she soon learned the medical path was not for

She thought about her likes and decided she enjoyed baby-sitting and loved kids — so teaching was an easy decision. That was 36 years ago. She has been teaching pre-school at Heritage Christian School for the past eight years.

"I get additional things ready for them to teach social skills and science. I love it, and they do, too," Fetty said.

She has nine students and can accommodate up to

God gives me the wisdom to work with these children. If we can teach them to make good choices at this age, then parents will have an easier life down the road."

Fetty said the parents are very focused on their children's education.

"I love this school. We're a family here. I tell parents they won't regret selecting Heritage Christian School. The Lord will make it affordable to come here," Fetty said. "I get to go on a home visit of all my students. I learn a lot about them. I respect the child by asking if I can play with their toys.

When they come to school, I teach them social skills about what they can play with and what is mine. We learn about the whole child and family.

School Administrator Linda Simms said Fetty is a delight in every way.

"Our preschool children and their parents absolutely love her. She makes our youngest students feel safe, loved and accepted, all while sneaking in learning and fun activities," Simms said. "We are grateful for her commitment, her insight into preschoolers and for the excellence she has brought to the preschool classroom. She is an amazing gift."

Fetty and her husband, Jim Fetty, a civil engineer at Morgantown Utility Board, reside in Fairmont. She is a member of the Tree of Life Church, where she works in the nursery and puts on the Christmas play.

"I'm very active. I love my church," she said. "My hobby is my job, my mission. But I do enjoy flower gardening."

She has a friendship garden that contains flowers from many friends.
