THE DIRECTOR'S TAKE



The name Norbert Sudhaus is not well known around the world but on one September day in 1972, he experienced a fleeting moment of fame and exhilaration.

The moment took place in the 1972 Summer Olympics in

Munich, West Germany at the end of the marathon race. Norbert, a German student, donned running shorts and a tank top and somehow eluded the notice of race officials as he ran into the Olympic stadium appearing to be on his way to the gold medal in the men's marathon!

It was only moments, before race commentators and officials realized that he was an imposter. The BBC commentator calling

the race, realizing that something was amiss, uttered these words, "This is puzzling, this man is not in the program and he looks as fresh as a buttercup"! The momentary rush of the collective ovation and cheering of the fans in the arena was quickly overtaken by booing as many began to realize that this man was not an Olympian and had only run the last quarter mile of the race. What was meant to be a gag turned into a moment of infamy frozen in time when authorities detained him as he angled off the track. The real gold medalist, American Frank Shorter had entered the stadium while Norbert was still circling the track and he shared afterward that it took him a moment to realize why some of the fans were booing as he had entered.

It has often been said that there are no shortcuts to any meaningful accomplishment. This statement holds true in the world of recovery, it can be a painstaking journey to sobriety. If shortcuts are taken, results will be at best temporary and short-lived. Many have found truth in the statement from the

AA Big Book, "Half measures availed us nothing".

Shortcuts, as in the case of Norbert Sudhaus, may give the appearance of success for a small period of time but reality soon catches up and things come crashing down. It takes brutal honesty on the road to recovery, both with oneself and in dealing with the wreckage that has been caused along the way. It also takes great courage to begin to take steps toward sobriety, addressing the many challenges in the present that have piled up because of alcoholism and/ or drug addiction. Challenges that may include physical and mental health problems, legal issues, fines/restitution, lost driver's licenses, homelessness, loss of jobs/work challenges and broken relationships.

These are just some of the many hurdles they may be facing as they begin the road to recovery. As you can imagine, this can lead to a sense of hopelessness. At Friendship House, we provide safe housing, support, guidance, accountability and a message of great Hope as men take their first steps toward a new life! "No one whose hope is in You will ever be put to shame" (Psalm 25:3).

Along with our friends and supporters, we celebrate the successes and milestones that our residents achieve. We are very thankful for all of your prayers, donations, support of our fundraisers, meals prepared and the generous financial support that you provide, which continue to impact the lives of men here! I wish you a blessed Thanksgiving and Christmas season!
