Stewardship Reflection

St. Paul offers a formula for living the way we are supposed to live as Christians in the Second Reading. Paul writes, "Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regard others as more important than yourselves." Doing that is a challenge for most all of us. Yet, that is one of the secrets to being a good steward and living as Christ wants us to live.

To truly live that way requires a dramatic conversion. All of us know people who are so self-centered that they often are not even aware that they are totally unwilling to compromise or to even recognize the value of those around them. Achieving this kind of self awareness, of what kind of a person we are, is a significant step on our faith and life journeys.

Screenwriter and playwright William Nicholson once wrote, "God does not necessarily want us to be happy. He wants us to be lovable, worthy of love, able to be loved by Him. What makes people hard to love? It is called selfishness. Selfish people are hard to love, because so little love comes out of them."

That is our challenge, to love others in such a way that we become lovable as well. Christ told us over and over that the secret to being His disciple and the secret to being a good steward is to "Love your neighbor." That is how to be the kind of person Paul calls us to be as well.

PRO-LIFE SUNDAY

Understanding Conscience. . . Conscience helps us to hear the voice of God: it helps us recognize the truth about God and the truth about how we ought to live. If our conscience isn't well formed, we aren't well-equipped to determine right from wrong. How to form our consciences? pray, participation in the sacraments, learn and know our faith.

To oppose ASSISTED SUICIDE, uncover the dangers. . . Elder abuse is considered a major health problem in the USA. The deadly and dangerous practice of assisted suicide is now legal in 5 states (Oregon, Washington, Vermont, California and Colorado) and the District of Columbia, our nation's capital. Some polls indicate that the public is receptive to the general concept of assisted suicide. But the same poll shows that when the public learns about the dangers of assisted suicide, (i.e the Dangerously Broad Definition of Terminal Illness; Pain is not the Primary Issue) their view shift against the practice.

Catholic Considerations for our earthly passing. We are entrusted by God with the GIFT OF LIVE, and in response, we care for our lives and health in obedience and gratitude to our Creator. The Church affirms the inviolable dignity of every person, regardless of the duration or extent of the person's incapacity or dependency. Nothing diminishes this unchangeable dignity, or the obligation to protect and care for it. In principle, assisted feeding and hydration should be provided unless it cannot sustain or is unduly burdensome to the patient, or if death is imminent whether it is provided or not.

How to build a CULTURE OF LIFE... To understand more fully how to defend and protect human life, we must first consider who we are, at the deepest level. God creates us in His image and likeness, which means we are made to be in loving relationship with Him. The essence of our identity and worth, the source of our dignity, comes from God. He gave us an inherit capacity to become the image of His Son. The world measures our worth by our successes and failures. But nothing can reduce our God-given dignity, and nothing can reduce the immeasurable worth of our lives. This is how we build a culture of life.
