My Dear Sisters and Brothers --- Resurrection People!

We're deep into Eastertide and evidences of resurrection continue to create joy, ease pain, fill lonely spaces in the lives of friends, and extend the love of Christ to countless persons in retirement centers, after-school kids programs, school classrooms and across our community.

But as we know, for "Resurrection People" all is not sweetness and light. We, too, along with our sisters and brothers across history and creation, are linked not only by the joy that is so deeply embedded in our hearts and symbolized by Easter lilies and empty crosses, but also by the individual and the collective pain and human-inflicted suffering we share in common with others as sister and brother human beings on this planet.

This week, the week following the ending of the Jewish observance of Passover and the Christian celebration of Easter, I pause in my daily schedule of hospital visits, worship planning, sermon preparation, and general "busy-ness" to honor and remember more than Six Million Jews among the Twelve Million Souls who perished during the Holocaust of mid-20th Century Europe, destruction inflicted upon humanity by Adolph Hitler's Nazi regime of fear, hate, and unprecedented systematic violence.

While the First Century Herodian murder of infants remains indelibly part of our own "religious memory," the technologies of genocide have been part of the human arsenal of war for centuries. In the centuries since, humanity has developed far greater efficiencies for killing, technologies of mass destruction and murder ... each and all contrary to the affirmations we as Disciples of Jesus Christ repeatedly but often passively affirm.

Hitler's "Final Solution" required the intellectual dismissal of human value before any significant popular critique or effective political resistance could materialize. Lutheran pastor Martin Niemoller witnessed the systematic demonization of minorities across Europe, counting himself as one who stood silent by. His words echo today as we remember the countless millions who have died during our own brief histories in this and the last century and as

we recon with political forces in our own day who dehumanize before destroying and who depend upon human differences of race, religion, social status, and/or political philosophy to divide us:

"First they came for the socialists, and I did not speak out because I was not a socialist.

Then they came for the trade unionists, and I did not speak out because I was not a trade unionist.

Then they came for the Jews,

and I did not speak out because I was not a Jew.

Then they came for me,

and there was no one left to speak for me."

In this "Season of Resurrection" it is imperative that we who claim the mantle of Christian Discipleship, rediscover our voices and speak out for those whom Jesus himself identified in words reported in Matthew's Gospel, Chapter 25: "When you did it for/to the least of these, my brothers and sisters, you did it to me."

May our worship, our praise, our prayers, and our speech be reified in our behaviors and actions as we "speak out" and act on behalf of "the least" among us today.

Remember! We worship Sunday at 10 AM and dine next Friday, May 5, at the First Fresh Fish Fry! Join us in peace and joy! God's Blessings be yours.

And he walks with me, and he talks with me, and he tells me I am his own; and the joy we share as we tarry there, none other has ever known.

The Gospel of John gives us a glimpse of the early morning experience of Mary Magdalene following Jesus' resurrection. This account in the twentieth chapter is one that is often read at Easter. This text was a favorite of hymn writer C. Austin Miles. He notes that it is one that he would read often. The constant reading of this passage led Miles to write the beloved hymn "In the Garden." Miles writes this about the hymn's origin:

One day in March, 1912...I drew my Bible toward me; it opened at my favorite chapter, John 20...That meeting of Jesus and Mary Magdalene had lost none of its power to charm. As I read it that day, I seemed to be part of the scene. I became a silent witness to that dramatic moment in Mary's life, when she knelt before her Lord, and cried, "Rabboni!" ...Under the inspiration of this vision I wrote as quickly as the words could be formed the poem exactly as it has since appeared.

Miles does not simply set the scripture text but expands upon and interprets it. This scripture passage, not unlike others, has the possibility of only telling us the essential facts of Mary Magdalene's encounter with Jesus in the garden. Prior to this event Mary Magdalene finds herself full of grief. Not only has Jesus been crucified but she has now found the tomb empty and wants to know where Jesus has been taken. Once her eyes are opened to know it is Jesus who stands before her I can only imagine what she would have said to him. It is likely there is an interaction not recorded in the gospel. Miles provides us with an idea of what that could have been like in the refrain. Jesus probably walked and talked with Mary and reassured her that everything was alright. The final stanza of the hymn tells about the end of their encounter:

I'd stay in the garden with him though the night around me be falling, but he bids me go; thru the voice of woe his voice to me is calling.

Jesus tells Mary Magdalene to go and tell the disciples about what she has seen and that he is alive! And not to worry because the story is not over yet and he will eventually ascend into heaven. *The United Methodist Hymnal*, our current hymnal, is the first Methodist hymnal this hymn was published in and was the most requested hymn to be included. This speaks to our desire to have a person encounter with Jesus like Mary Magdalene did. We want to know Jesus is close. As we experience Jesus is settings of quiet and solitude it is important to remember his final words to Mary Magdalene in the garden. "Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" (John 20:17) Go and tell the world that Jesus is alive in our world today and walks with us and talks with us and reminds us that we are indeed his own.

John Wesley's Approach to Mission

Are we His disciples?
Do others see Him through us?
Are our words His words & our actions His actions?

I am busy, I volunteer for various church functions, I do behind the scene stuff for committees. I answer the call to help when someone from my church asks for help.
