Are You a Prophet?

Prophet means spokesman, not fortune-teller. The one whom in their unfathomable audacity the prophets claimed to speak for was the Lord and Creator of the universe. There is no evidence to suggest that anyone ever asked a prophet home for supper more than once. -Frederick Buechner, Wishful Thinking (1993), 88

Jesus stood up in his hometown synagogue prophetically reading the scripture from Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free." (Luke 4: 16 -30) The reaction from the congregation was not applause or praise. Jesus was driven out of town and almost killed. If your teenage son or daughter comes home and announces he or she wants to be a prophet, I strongly encourage you to talk them out of that career.

A few weeks ago, the subject of prophets came up in our Acts Bible study. We had an interesting discussion. Biblical prophets are different from the

modern use of this word. They do not see into the future like a fortune-teller. They are proclaiming how God would like to see the future.

The easiest example of a prophet for us to understand is Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. In his 1963 speech, he said: "I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia, the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood. . .. I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character." Dr. King was not looking into a crystal ball seeing into the future, nor was he reading in the newspaper that this was the direction our country was heading. He was describing a vision for God's desired future for our nation. We can show examples where we have achieved this dream of racial equality in 2017 and examples where we are still falling short.



The summer went by quickly, school is back in session. We want to update you on our summer. Our Mission trip to Blue Ridge Georgia was amazing. We had 3 youth that had never been on a mission trip and I think they were blessed by the experience. We also thank Tim Roseman and Amy Galliher for being our awesome chaperones. Our week consisted of living in cabins with bunk beds and a community bath/shower; however, we really didn't need showers because it rained about the whole week. Our responsibility was finishing several projects that had already been started by previous groups. Our first project was for an older couple. The

man was a double amputee and lived in a wheelchair. The ramp to his house was already started, but we finished it by putting up a railing and we finished painting their house. We had to deal with the hornet nests that were living where we wanted to paint! We also built and finished two stairways that led out of the back of their house. We had arrived one morning to start working and animals had scattered their trash throughout the yard, so our youth came up with the idea to make a trash can holder out of scrape wood, so the animals couldn't knock the cans down. There was plenty more that we could have done for this couple, but Team Effort had other plans for us. We then headed to a small Baptist Church and painted a Sunday School Classroom and also made the railing for a deck that had already been built. They also wanted a frame around a propane tank, so we used lattice to make a beautiful frame around it. This all done in the rain, there were a few breaks in the clouds but the youth never wavered. The best entertainment for the youth was mud sliding in the field where we were staying. It had rained so much, that there was always a pool of water to temp the youth. Each night we had worship services with music, scrip-

ture and messages. Very uplifting. It was a wonderful week, but you will have to come to the 5th Sunday School lesson to hear more details.

Our other project this summer was the ramp for a church family. Headed up by Tim Roseman, the youth went to work. I think the other adults there were surprised at how hard our youth worked and what skills they have already developed. They are awesome and we appreciate their dedication to Christ!

How are we as a church called to make that future a reality? This is our purpose and calling as a church: to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, and to let the oppressed go free. Go and be prophets of Jesus Christ, just don't expect to be invited back for dinner.
