

HOMEWORK!?

When Pastor Tim said he was giving us homework -- my first reaction was probably the same as most of yours – what! at this stage of my life -- you've got to be kidding -- memorize scripture? I was never good at memorizing anything.

After a few hours to digest this statement I thought back about 40 years to an intensive two year Bible course I signed up for from the Navigators--Discipleship Training for Church Laymen -- based on Col 2:7 -- "Rooted and built up in Him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness." I was in my late 20's and had the same thoughts as now. It was a course that met EVERY week for 2 years with only 2 weeks off for vacation. We started as a small group of 10 and by the end there were 4 of us still committed to the course. At the first meeting we were greeted with the news that we were required to memorize a Bible verse every 2 weeks -- so by the end -- we would have 52 verses to help us in just about any situation life should bring. Again, I thought, I can't do that! We were asked how many of us had memorized the times tables in school -- which at that time was all of us. I can still remember my mother drilling them into me -- writing them over and over -- saying them over and over -- reading them over and over. We were required to know from 2-10 times tables -- but mom insisted on 2-12 -- and I still know them and use them every day! Learning them is something I have never regretted doing (I wish they still required it in school -- it makes life much easier.)

If I was so committed to knowing the times tables, which has helped me a lot in my life -how could I not be so committed to knowing the scriptures, which are the Words of God! Those words of God have helped in a lot of ways also -- many more than the times tables have! I was able to memorize the 52 verses within the 2 year time limit -- and still know most of them -- but it is like everything else -you need to review them every now and then to keep them fresh in your mind. It always seems harder to me to remember the address -- but that is also important. Pastor Tim made it easier on us since they are all from Matthew chap 5. It is also good that he asked us to all memorize in the NRSV, I had a study partner who used NIV and I was faithful to my KJV--I like the poetic sound -- but not always the easiest to understand. However it made it hard to study our scripture memorization together while using different translations.

WHY memorize scripture? -- it is a short term investment with a long term payoff!

It helps us face future problems -- grief, stress, worry, anxiety

There is not a problem you will face, that is not covered in the Bible. Our omniscient, almighty God has covered everything!!

What are some helps to memorizing?

Involve as many senses as you can -- sight, sound, touch! It is a proven fact that the more senses involved in learning something the more it sticks!

WRITE the verse out -on index cards you can carry with you
on post-its -- put them on your
bathroom mirror, your car dashboard
(something to do when you are stuck in traffic!
READ it -OUT LOUD -- you are
seeing and hearing it at the same time.

How much time do you spend on Social Media, watching TV, playing video games, reading useless romance novels, etc? Doesn't it make sense to spend more time to LISTEN to God (which is His Word to us).

I know it's not New Year's but it is the beginning of a new school year, so make a resolution to commit to memorizing His Word.

A reminder that when we put on the armor of God, the "sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God" (Gal 6/17b), is the <u>ONLY</u> offensive characteristic of the armor. It is our way of attacking the lies of Satan! So let's be an army for God and arm ourselves appropriately!
