Some people do Pilates or scrapbooking for fun, I, on the other hand, dream up new church outreach ministries to help families in poverty. I know that is a weird hobby, but I have always been wired this way. This is just part of the DNA God put in me when I was knitted together in my mother's womb. A new opportunity has come my way. Someone wants to pay me to do what I love — help churches plan and implement new outreach ministries! I have been offered the job of Project Coordinator for a new program called Faith in Rural Communities at the NC Rural Center. This program will work with 64 rural United Methodist Churches across North Carolina. We will offer workshops and coaching, as well as provide grants to these churches to begin a new outreach ministry to their greater community. We will be using a formula called Asset Based Community Development, which focuses on the assets in a struggling community instead of only focusing on their needs. This program is supported by a five-year grant from the Duke Endowment, the same foundation who helped build the Christian Life Center and renovate the Narthex. My last day at Bethlehem will be February 14 and I will begin this new job on February 16 by flying to Missouri to help lead a workshop to 200 United Methodist pastors. Talk about putting on your running shoes!

The only downside of this exciting opportunity is that I will have to say good-bye to my Bethlehem family. You loved me over the last seven months with a love that can only be called Christ-like. You were not afraid to put on your running shoes and pursue new ideas for the church. I pinched myself several times to make sure this was real. No church is this nice to their pastor—when was the other shoe going to drop?

I leave confident in the future of Bethlehem for two very good reasons: First, you are the future of Bethlehem. I am simply amazed to see what you and God did over the last six months. Second, you are getting an excellent interim minister, Rev. Jody Seymour. You can read more about him on page 2 of this newsletter. Rev. Seymour has a resume that would make any minister jealous; however, that is not the cause of my confidence. I am confident because of his spirit and deep wisdom. Just talk to him for a few minutes and you will see it, too. You will have an opportunity to meet him and his wife Betsy on their first Sunday at Bethlehem, February 18.

In praying about this move, I received an inspiring message that encouraged me: "I am not God's plan for Bethlehem. I was part of God's plan for Bethlehem. God's plan for Bethlehem will always begin and end with YOU!" I can't wait to watch how God's vision will continue to unfold for the people of Bethlehem United Methodist Church.

Welcome, Pastor Jody Seymour!

Bethlehem welcomes our new interim minister. He looks forward to starting at Bethlehem on February 15.

Jody's roots go back to Biloxi, Mississippi, where he was born in 1947. He moved with his family to North Carolina during the elementary school days and spent his high school years in Salisbury, N.C., where he and Betsy were high school sweethearts.

Jody graduated from Greensboro College and Duke Divinity School and did his Doctoral work in Spiritual Formation through the Graduate Theological Foundation. He studied one year at Candler School of Theology at Emory on a Lily Foundation program in Congregational Analysis.

He is the author of six books, *The Christian Skeptic: Caught Between Belief and Doubt…Looking* for God in All the Wrong Places…Finding God Between the Lines… A Time for Healing: Overcoming the Perils of Ministry… Lost but Making Excellent Time: Transforming the Rat Race into a Pilgrimage; and Marking the Gospel: A Devotional Commentary on the Gospel of Mark. Jody is also a certified Enneagram instructor. The Enneagram is a personality system that is often used in spiritual direction.

He has served seven churches in the Western North Carolina Conference, which have included Salisbury, Mt. Pleasant, Pilot Mountain, Newton, Charlotte, and Gastonia. Jody enjoys tennis and writing. He and Betsy, who worked for American Retirement Corporation for 18 years before retiring, have been married for 49 years. Betsy appears monthly on the TV show "Charlotte Today" where she offers tips on gardening and various decorating ideas. They have two children, Abigail who lives in Atlanta with husband Jay; and Amanda who lives in Cornelius with husband Jason and who just provided the Seymour's with their first grandchild.

Jody says, "My passion is to take the old story and make it come alive. I love to help people formulate questions of faith before we ever get to the answers. The spiritual pilgrimage is not only about 'having arrived,' but about experiencing the journey and seeking to understand the challenges that come with such a journey."

Jody was the featured preacher last year for the national conference of The Fellowship of United Methodist in Worship and Music Arts.

Jody is now retired after 44 years as a United Methodist pastor. His last church was Davidson United Methodist where he served for 13 years.
