Forgive Us Our Sins

Have you ever heard the phrase, "To Err is Human, To For-give is not Company Policy!"? Forgiving someone who has harmed us can be one of the troubling events in our lives. How do we understand the concept of sin and the interaction of God's Pastor's Desk forgiving authority?

How do we define "Sin", according to the authorities at Wik-ipedia, "In Abraham contexts, sin is the act of violating God's will.

tionship between an individual and God; or as any diversion from the ideal order for human living. To sin has been defined as "to miss the mark". Some sins are regarded as greater than others. In this nuanced concept of sin, sins fall in a spectrum from minor errors to deadly misdeeds"

Sin is then something that "happens" by us. We act in the doing of the sin. We are responsible for the actions of the sin. Sin is not something that we just "trip over" or do unknowing, we are active agents in the sin we perform. The Church has said that we all are guilty of sin. As it says in Romans 3:22-24, "²² This right-eousness is given through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe. There is no difference between Jew and Gen-tile, ²³ for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴ and all are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus."

Jesus' understanding of "Forgiveness by God" was never based upon an acceptance of the sin. Forgiveness is seen as chances to break away from the "bondage" that one finds oneself held in. Jesus' very first teaching was a call to repentance. Repentance understood as being a change in one's direction in life. Nowhere in the Bible does one find Jesus, or scriptures, condoning the continuation of any sin.

The best example of this would be the story of the "Women caught in Adultery." (John 8) when all the ac-cusers had went away, Jesus forgave the woman but told her to "go and sin no more". Jesus did not instruct the woman that her sins have been approved or condoned in anyway. She still was called to separate herself from her sin.

In today's world there appears to be an understanding that forgiveness is in some way an approval of our sins. We have begun a process in which we are trying to find a way to make our sins more palatable in the eyes of God so as to allow us to keep participating in them. We try to walk on a fine line of trying to keep within our Sins while all the time stating that we are being faithful to the teachings of Jesus. Repentance is neither wanted nor desired.

As a church that calls upon a restoration of Wholeness, we cannot abandon the idea that this restoration can never be fully accomplished without the acceptance of one's own involvement with sin, and the repentant act which is followed by God's forgiveness through the cross of Jesus the Christ. The only question would be if we are willing to accept this forgiveness.

Accepting God's forgiveness is not a display of having weak or timid behavior. We do not show ourselves as being any lesser of a human by allowing for God's Forgiveness. We also should not see others as being any less when they stand before God asking for God to forgive them. In Jesus' parable of the two men who come to the temple for forgiveness, ¹⁰ "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. ¹¹ The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. ¹² I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.' ¹³ "But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'¹⁴"I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

Sin is real, and Forgiveness is also Real. God forgives through the blood of the Christ shed on the Cross.



Our History: 100 years ago By Ann Embrey



By my count there were 7 short-term ministers during the 1920's, with some periods of vacancy. In 1920, Frank Zook came from California and was described as sensational and controversial. Yet, construction on a new brick building began. During construction, R. A. Highsmith and then Henry Hagemier came - and went. Rev. Hagemier held the

shortest ministry, serving just four months before his death in a car-train wreck, while travelling to serve at a revival in Caddo Mills. Rev. Hugh B. Brous filled in and was here for the dedication of the new building in May 1923. Despite holding services during construction in temporary locations and with interim ministers, Church membership was reported at 200, while the Sunday School count was 275. Member Dr. W. R. Lindley was superintendent of the Sunday School. Many prominent citizens were members and stepped in to serve.

During this period of time, America had a population of 100 million and was bouncing back from the Spanish flu pandemic and the effects of World War I. Modern inventions were changing daily life and an influx of new ideas were expanding the way people thought & lived. The 'Roaring Twenties" with jazz music, radiovision became television, airplanes were flying across the ocean and to the North Pole and back! Speakeasies and prohibition. Religion was tested - Fundamentalism versus Modernism was debated. The stock market collapsed and a great depression fell across America.

100 years later, this church has endured. The decade of the 1920's was a testament to the faith and fortitude of the membership of First Christian Church Terrell. Truly Disciples of Christ

We opened Serenity several days ago when the temperature dropped below freezing with the threat of freezing rain, sleet, and snow in the forecast. We opened for our homeless brothers to have shelter and food. How can we say Christ in us would only pray for these friends and not provide shelter? Which is greater: to talk about Love or to practice Real Love (<u>1 John 3:18-19</u>), Love that has no agenda (<u>1 Corinthians 13:4</u>), Love that has no qualifications (<u>1 Corinthians 13:5-7</u>), Love that has no boundaries (<u>Ephesians 3:14-20</u>).

One of brothers that is sheltered at Serenity walks and drinks his beers on our streets. To make a little bit of money he collects beer and soda cans and sells them at the scrap yard to buy his beer. That's his "job". He makes enough to buy 6-8 beers and "sinks them". We've fallen in love with him.

We see him not just with our fleshly eyes but with our spiritual eyes. We see his worth. We see his value. The same Death that brought our Redemption brought it for him as well. How much Faith does God require? Mustard seed size. Our friend has that. We embrace him. If my blood brother was homeless and alone on the street living just to drink, would I give him shelter if I could? Of course I would. This man is my brother. Shelter is available. So we open our door for him.

Another of those staying in our place normally sleeps at an open car wash. He makes money by offering to wash and clean (detail) people's cars that come there. I saw him one morning sleeping under the shelter next to the large vacuum cleaners at the wash. Someone had just donated a pair of New Balance sneakers and I just happened to have them with me and they just happened to be his size. I gave them to him. That was the start of his and my discovery of kinship with each other. This man is my brother. Shelter is available. So we open the door for him.

The weather will get back to normal maybe by Friday and our brothers will be back on the street. We'll still see them. They'll still come by. Life will get back to normal. I'll pull the cover up over me in my comfortable bed in my warm house. My brothers will sleep at the car wash, in abandoned cars or houses, in the bushes or next to a sheltering dumpster. But for a week and a half the blows of poverty and neglect are softened by the Good News that is Preached to the poor (Matthew 11:5).
