No Where to Turn?

A great philosopher once said, "when you have exhausted all other possibilities, the only one remaining is to come face to face with God". For many of us in this modern way of living that we call life, that confrontation has become a far more real event. Each day I have heard about someone who has been dealing with some decision or some overpowering circumstances that appear even darker and alone with no way out. What do you do when you have nowhere to go?

There are so many stories that we hear doing ministries that show just how hard and difficult life can be. Some people contact their **local** church with some overwhelming problems such as: pregnancies, drugs, criminal activities both personal and in the immediate family, mental illness and poor health decisions. On top of these powerful problems there exists a lack of any contact with **God** or **their** church. They are under the impression they have been left alone and have no one on their side.

Then there are the stories from those who have heard from their doctors about some disease that has invaded their bodies. They are now looking at a future of tests, drugs, doctors, nurses, hospital visits, needles, and all of the systems that will accompany whatever are their core events There is also with these stories, the same symptoms that are common with the earlier examples, that feeling of being alone in the world with no one that understands or cares for them.

It is during these "nights of darkness" that many come to a pivotal moment where all of our old and incorrect beliefs about God and our relationship to God are abandoned for something truer. We stop seeing God as the distant, unapproachable, and unknowing mist that we have no contact with. We begin to acknowledge the knowledge that we have not only tried not to come into contact with God, but have really tried to separate from this God that we were so wrong about. We come face to face with what many have termed "the overpowering Love" that fills them with peace and comfort. God moves from being the last possibility to God's rightful place of first in our lives.

It is sometimes hard for those of us who have not gone through some night of darkness to understand this authoritative transformation that we witness within the lives of those who have. We may even long for the change that we are a spectator, but we are consumed with holding on to our selfish and self-centered view that we are in some way superior to or immune from any of the troubles of this life. We look, as the Gospel writer says, "through a mirror darkly" and hide behind our blind image.

Resurrection Sunday is coming soon and part of the celebration of the Easter time: Lent, the 40 days, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday, is the concept that all that we are and all that we understand is not anything that we have any control over, but all is in God's control. We are not made holy by any means at our disposal and any act that we might perform. The Cross of Jesus has within it all of the power of transformation. It is only upon the cross where love is truly displayed and we are mere lonely humans that can come to comprehend that we are never alone on the walk of life. God did not just push a little hole to peek in on us as we still live separate, but God invaded and established a beachhead into our existence.

We have been set free from the darkness that was trying to devastate our lives and we are now given a new bill of pardon. We walk with a renewed perception and a new examination of the God whose only desire is to be with us. The darkness and the loneliness have been discarded along the road of life as some old flat tire that we had been driving on for miles not acknowledging that the air was out of it a long time ago.

We hear the stories of those who have heard the good news that their cancer is not so bad or that it was not there and we rejoice with them. The morning is bright and the sun rises for them again. But keep those who still live in the darkness, even those of us, by their own unwillingness to accept or rejection of what God is for them. There are still so many of them and us out there.

2019 REPORT "OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD"



If you packed a shoebox or assisted with the cost of shipping, yours was one of 10,569,405 shoeboxes sent to children worldwide in 2019. The US collected 8.9 million of these and the rest came from partnering countries.

Through shoeboxes—packed with fun toys, school supplies, hygiene items, clothing—First Christian Church brought joy to children in need around the world. Each gift-filled shoebox is a tangible expression of God's love, and it is often the first gift these children have ever received. Thanks to the gener-

osity of folks like us, Operation Christmas Child has collected and delivered more than 178 million gift-filled shoeboxes to children in more than 160 countries and territories since 1993.

Thank you again, First Christian Church, and to every individual who helped in any way with our 2019 collection for this global project. Many of you do so every year and your giving heart does not go unnoticed. Through our very simple gifts we sent a message to children worldwide that they are loved and not forgotten.

Some of these kids have never had their very own bar of soap, or even a washcloth. In some cases, whole families have to share one toothbrush. Some children create "bottle shoes" to protect their feet, by crushing empty bottles. A bar of soap, hair barrette, a doll, socks, a stuffed animal, crayons, notebook, coloring book or a soccer ball can bring a child so much joy!

More importantly the shoebox recipients will learn that Jesus saves! Each child will be given THE GREATEST GIFT- a book-let about Jesus' saving grace, plus, the opportunity to attend THE GREATEST JOURNEY: a 12 lesson discipleship program, where they learn to share Jesus with their family, friends and entire village

Now is the time to begin thinking about shoebox gifts for next Christmas!!! For several years the Joy Class has packed 30 shoeboxes each year for just a little over \$300 (shipping not included). This is possible because Sue Ann Norris begins shopping the after-Christmas sales and continues through the next months to shop every special sale until the 30 boxes are filled. If each of us followed her example and began to shop now for our 2020 shoeboxes, maybe focusing on just one item per month, we could have at least 100 boxes next Christmas!

- 2 Cans Vienna Sausage (pop top lid)
- 2 Pouches or Boxes of tuna
- **3 Peanut Butter Cracker Packs**
- 2 Individual pouches of SPAM
- 2 Peach Fruit Cups

Serenity distributes twelve grocery bags of food to our homeless friends every week. Each bag provides a meal a day for one week. We want to help fill bags.

Serenity corner

The local ministry to the homeless, known to us as Serenity Church Terrell, has been operating now for five years in a small building at the corner of South Rockwall and Grove streets. That location has become know as Serenity Corner. You are encouraged to go to the website at serenitycorner.org to learn all about this ministry and to be lifted up and blessed by what you find there. All kinds of ministry takes place at Serenity Corner: worship, celebration, meals, Bible Study, food and clothing distribution, a resting spot to cool off or get warm, bathroom breaks and all kinds of Social Services. Don Ledbetter who has a fulltime job is the minister, mentor, mediator, Social Service director and friend to all who enter this small one-room building. Everything else that takes place at Serenity is done by volunteers. Volunteers serve a meal on Friday nights to 30-40 people, volunteers help plan the Annual Block Party, volunteers stock the food pantry and distribute food and clothing, volunteers have created the website and a facebook page.

And now a large group of volunteers has begun meeting to plan and prepare for Serenity's future because Serenity is growing. In the recent "PIT Count" (a point in time count of homeless persons in Kaufman County done in conjunction with the Kaufman County Homeless Coalition) around 25 homeless individuals were identified who call Terrell home. In order to minister to this homeless population and others who come to Serenity for help, bigger facilities are needed. Don's wish list for the future includes a building on property that has been donated with for serving meals, for worship, for a food pantry and clothing closet. It would include showers and a washer and dryer so folks who live on the street can get clean clothes and a clean body while their physical body is being fed and their spiritual body is being nourished.

Our church has been actively involved in Serenity's ministry and in this new planning endeavor. All kinds of tasks are being assigned to volunteers and a number of new activities are in progress: application for designation as a registered 501(c)3 tax exempt organization, creation of a video and a promotional brochure. If you are interested in participating in the ministry, contact Scott or Charlotte Gilmore, Pastor Craig or Lynn in the church office
