What is a truism? A Truism is a statement that in a short concise means expresses a vision of life that when spoken listeners find an immediate agreement with. As we read through the Bible, we discover that we as a church are called into action. We are not here to only observe those in need; we are called to act into acts of kindness, forgiveness and repentance. We are called to take personal action. We read in the scriptures: ³⁰ Then Jesus answered and said: "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his clothing, wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a certain priest came down that road. And when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. ³² Likewise a Levite, when he arrived at the place, came and looked, and passed by on the other side. ³³ But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. When he saw him, he had compassion. ³⁴ So he went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ On the next day, when he departed, he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said to him, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, when I come again, I will repay you.' ³⁶ So which of these three do you think was a neighbor to him who fell among the thieves?" (Luke 10: 30 – 36) It is the one who took action on behalf of the hurt man who was blessed. Not those who passed by and complained about how someone should do something.

How do we really solve the problems that the church confronts, we need to be more fully engaged. We cannot feed "those who hunger and thirst" without those who go to them with food and water. We cannot clothe the naked without those who take clothes to them. We cannot teach our youth without those who will teach. There are many areas and problems that cannot be done without a person who is called to that ministry.

If you see a need or something that might need some change, then join up with the committee that oversees that area and help in the change. Don't just stand there or go away saying that "No one" was willing to do anything...you are that "one".

SERENITY PARTICIPATES IN COUNTYWIDE "PIT" COUNT OF HOMELESS

On January 28 homeless persons came to Serenity Corner to be counted as part of a "Point In Time" effort to document the number of homeless in the City of Terrell. Each one participated in a survey regarding their particular status and needs. The PIT Count, now being done in Kaufman County annually is sponsored by the Kaufman County Homeless Coalition in association with the Texas Homeless Network. The Count provides a snapshot of homelessness at a point in time. Serenity Corner also held a count last year just for local homeless. Each homeless person who came and filled out a survey with the help of a volunteer was provided a lunch, a bag of winter personal items and had the opportunity to pick out some donated clothing; jeans, sweats, shirts, socks, shoes, caps, gloves and coats. The results of these PIT counts will be used by local governments, churches and non-profits to improve response to homelessness and to measure progress toward the ultimate goal: ending homelessness in Kaufman County. Serenity is constantly working to improve its understanding of the needs and circumstances of the people experiencing homelessness in our community. The surveys help provide us with key data on gender, age, ethnicity, veteran status and more.

Serenity also has a team working on plans for the growth of its ministry to the homeless. There is a need for a larger footprint – larger building with adequate facilities, permanent staffing, programs designed to serve the wide range of needs presented by homelessness. A Marketing Plan is in progress with the goal of establishing a sustainable income stream to fund the wide range of services and programs envisioned by the leadership of Serenity.

We at First Christian are proud to be partners with this ministry; providing pantry space for storing the food items included weekly in the Hearten Food Bags and volunteers to pack the 24 bags weekly, providing and serving a hot meal once a month for a Friday night gathering of homeless persons, making donations of funds, food, clothing and toiletries.

MONTHLY MEALS FOR HOMELESS - CAN YOU HELP???

Planning a monthly meal for Serenity Corner is one of the responsibilities of the church's Outreach Committee. Linda List has taken responsibility for planning, preparation and serving of each of these meals with the assistance of others on the committee. First Christian is responsible for feeding about 30 persons on the third Friday of each month. The meals for 2021 have been planned and Linda will be calling various ladies of the congregation each month to help. Ladies who attend CWF have already signed up but if others are willing to make a dish for one of the months please give Linda a call. In the past Joy Class has taken the responsibility for doing the meal and for any cost involved. Since the Class is not meeting this is no longer possible. The Church Budget this year includes a small amount each month for supplies but our members are being asked to donate the food items. If you want to make a financial donation to help with this ministry please make that notation on your check.

These meals are an important piece of Serenity's ministry to the homeless community and participating in the ministry is an important piece of our congregation's Outreach.

MY THOUGHTS By Ken Larsen



This old book, tattered and worn, its pages wrinkled and torn. The golden gilding long ago worn off. Mud splatters, stains, and some old dry grass between some pages. How could it have ever ended up in such a state? Not from neglect, but a constant use.

I spent last night with a homeless man who came to our church to get out of the sub freezing weather that left millions without power and water for several days. We spent hours discussing our individual journeys in life. His troubles with family, relationships, addiction and prison. For 3 years he has lived out of his truck in a local parking lot. 3 months ago the business owner had it towed ,

and without a job he was unable to pay the tow fees to recover it.

We talked of faith, of various organized religions and beliefs, of political issues and the daily lives of those with absolutely nothing but the clothes on their back.

His strength of character you would never notice if you passed him on the street. When a local restaurant provided food to our temporary shelter, he waited until everyone else had eaten to make his meager plate.

Throughout the night and all this morning he would stop talking for a moment, open a random page and quietly read a verse. After a moment of contemplation he resumed our discussion. Today I learned what is the true meaning of "a penny for your thoughts".

He dug an old penny from a pocket and flipped it. I called tails, and was pleased to see it land tail up. He smiled and picked it up again, then telling me that if I got it right again- it was mine to keep. He flipped and I called tails again. As it landed face up he retrieved it from the floor and placed it in his pocket, " you owe me a penny and your thoughts".

Here is what I thought:

This life, this community, is not about race or belief, or our status among others. It is about people. Trying to be good people. Taking the time to look at someone else's circumstances and offering a hand. Pushing through the trials that life throws at us and making it one day at a time. Trying to help one person at a time.

Faith is not about the size of the church- it is about the size of the heart. He started yesterday with a penny and a bible, both worn from much use. Today he gained a new penny and a place in my heart. One day, one person at a time. Priceless teachings.



Wooden Grille for Pipe Organ By Ann Embrey



While many outstanding leaders have been involved in the success of this church through the years, this is a story of two men of the church who were involved with the building of the impressive wooden grille, located today on the wall in the lobby of the Charles E. Mull Family Christian Center on Brin Street.

The beautiful Kimball pipe organ was installed in the new brick building during the Golden Anniversary celebration in 1923. It was delivered by train, along with the beautiful wooden grille

another organ for the First Presbyterian Church in Terrell. A few years later the beautiful wooden grille was created and put into place between the organ pipes and the pulpit.

Reverend Wilford P. Harmon came to Terrell about 1931, with his wife Ineth, who was a public school teacher. He wasn't long out of seminary, as they are shown on the 1930 census in Hope, Arkansas at ages 25 and 22. His tenure in Terrell was short, as First Christian Terrell had a new pastor by 1934. Rev. Harmon & Ineth had moved on to Nashville, TN.

During the short tenure of Rev. Harmon at First Christian Church Terrell, he is remembered for several good works within the church. Our own CWF mentions in their early history that Rev Harmon penned a song for blessing the offerings in meetings of the newly formed Christian Women's Guild.

Dr. William R. Lindley MD (an eye, ear & throat physician) worked with Rev. Harmon on the design and construction of the wooden grille for the organ pipes in front of the sanctuary. The grille with its intricate carving was installed between the pulpit and the organ pipes in 1933 and dedicated to the memory of Dr. Lindley's wife, Nell, who died in 1932.

We believe the grille was removed from the sanctuary about 20 years ago, when the organ received an upgrade to become electronic. Additional pipes were added, salvaged from an older church, and the pipes are now decorative only. Our organist, Kay Cole, remembers sitting in the congregation as a child and hearing high school students playing the organ. She learned piano very early, and was in 6th grade when she began organ lessons, concentrating on foot pedal training. She began playing in church while in high school.
