# FROM THE Pastor's Pesk

## Fog

Have you ever heard the story about the Captain of a large naval ship who was guid-ing it through a heavy fog bank? As he was driving his ship in the fog, he spied a light far off in the distance. Figuring that it must be an oncoming ship, he immediately ordered a message sent ahead saying, "please alter your course." Within a few minutes a message was received saying "please immediately alter **your** course." This upset the Captain who immediately returned a second message to the light ahead saying, "I am an admiral, and this is an aircraft carrier, you alter your course!" Imme-diately there was a response and a message came over the radio saying, "I am a seaman second-class, and

this is a lighthouse!'

There are points in our walk in which a type of fog can begin to surround us. These happen at those times when some tragic event or life challenging event may be taking place. We lose track of where we are in our relationship with God. We began to feel our way hoping that we will softly bump into something familiar that will mark our path and get us back on the right track. All the time constantly praying that our impact will be light and not too damaging.

But like the seaman second-class sitting on the top of the lighthouse, and making sure that the beacon that cast its light out into the fog, God always makes sure that there is a light that will lead us to a safe harbor. We only have to keep looking in the fog for the light to shine through. And like the Captain of the aircraft carrier, we must be willing to give up our own power and authority and follow the directions from the light.

In the first chapter of the book of John, there is a familiar opening where John describes God as becoming light to the world. It says, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." John placed this in his opening comments to remind us that although we walk in times of great darkness there is always some point of light that reaches out to us trying to bring us back in the love and grace of God. There is no reason to give up on our walk or to throw in the towel.

This type of thought sometimes flies in the face of our modern American views, where "The customer is always right." A view in which the desires, needs and wants of the individual trump any power that may try to stifle them. We have to be willing to give up the needs and desires of self and turn ourselves over to a higher power that is trying to help us and guide us in our lives toward a safe harbor. We have to give up our control and become one that is led.

The Bible seems to be filled with stories of people who, when times of trouble descended, relied on their own means to get them out of those troubles. Only to find that their own means was far less effective than they expected. We sometimes bet against the wind, only to have the wind knock us down. We fight against the wind much in the same way as watching a weather channel reporter trying to stand against the forces of a hurricane while reporting on its damage. We fail to recognize that the wind is stronger than we are and can force its way upon us at its will.

The Bible also reminds us that when we cry out to the Lord and call upon the Lord to be our strength and our refuge we do find hope. We find in God that zone of comfort that we so long and desire to be placed in. God's Spirit can cause even the mightiest wind to calm. As we are reminded in the story of Jesus with his disciples in the boat on the Sea of Galilee when the storms, and winds came upon their small ship. While the disciples cowered in fear that their small and fragile boat would soon be swamped by the waves and the winds, Jesus rested quietly and comfortably in the back of the boat. His disciples ran to him to awaken him and asked was he not afraid that he would perish, but Jesus arose turned to the winds and said "be still."

Sometimes we have to be willing to alter our course to avoid the rocks of life. Sometimes we have to be willing to take commands from sources outside of ourselves. Sometimes we had to lay aside our own ego and power and listen to the small voice crying out to us. Sometimes we have to listen to God.

Praying for you as I hope that you are praying for me.

Greenville has a large homeless community and this group, "Girls of Grace" decided to make the mats as their ministry to them. About 20 girls and a number of their mothers, dads and grandmothers spent the morning learning to sort and prepare plastic bags, cut the bags, tie the loops to make balls of plarn and to crochet. We were so pleased to see several sleeping mats well underway by the time we left them.

This is the second group we have helped start in Greenville, the first one led by the pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church. Pastor Debbie spent a day working with us last year in order to get the group at her church started. Praise God that he continues to bless this ministry.
