Baptism A Biblical Examination Part 2- The Definition and History of Baptism

Exodus 19:10

The LORD also said to Moses, "Go to the people and consecrate them today and tomorrow, and let them wash their garments;

Leviticus 16:4-5

"He shall put on the holy linen tunic, and the linen undergarments shall be next to his body, and he shall be girded with the linen sash and attired with the linen turban (these are holy garments). Then he shall bathe his body in water and put them on.

Leviticus 16:23&24

 23 "Then Aaron shall come into the tent of meeting and take off the linen garments which he put on when he went into the holy place, and shall leave them there.

 24 "He shall bathe his body with water in a holy place and put on his clothes, and come forth and offer his burnt offering and the burnt offering of the people and make atonement for himself and for the people.

The Origin of Water Baptism

Although Christian Baptism may have been widely used by John the Baptist and the apostles, Baptism *itself* did not originate with him or, for that matter, even with the Christians. The best information that we have leads us to think that the Jews practiced Water Baptism. Certainly, they did not baptize in the way that we know Baptism today, but as a ceremonial act of purification and cleansing for Gentile converts to Judaism long before the coming of the Messiah.

It is thought by some theologians that the origins of Baptism itself are found in the Old Testament books of **Exodus** and **Leviticus** where the Levite priests were commanded to perform a symbolic cleansing in water before and after performing their priestly duties.

However, two things were unique about this particular "Baptism":

- ✓ It was not carried out as a result of conversion, but only for purification and cleansing before priestly duties.
- ✓ Only the priests participated.

Outside of that practice, a study of Jewish history reveals the presence of Water Baptism during Old Testament times when Gentiles wanted to identify with Israel- either politically or religiously. As these former pagans were "converted" to Judaism, they had to go through a three-fold process:

- 1. Circumcision
- 2. Animal Sacrifice
- 3. Water Baptism

The Method of Jewish Baptism

The Jews used rivers, lakes, and streams to perform their ceremonial "baptisms. This was the more common method that John Baptist followed as the Old Covenant came to its inevitable fulfillment. But in addition to those natural means, there was also a ceremonial appliance used for these cleansing services called a *mikveh*- a deep, portable container usually made out of clay. Archaeologists have found several Jewish mikvehs dating from before and after Jesus' time in Israel. Some are in Qumran, near where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found, but there have been some of them found elsewhere in Israel.

According to records found in Israel, the mikveh would be filled with water and the Gentile who was being converted to Judaism would be completely submerged under the water. The person being "baptized" in the mikveh could either have someone perform the "baptism" for them or they could dunk themselves. There is no record of any "sprinkling" of water on the ones converting, but the records concerning these early "baptisms" always describe complete emersion in the water.

Also, the records show that the water source used for these "baptisms" could not be a stagnant pool, but had to be flowing water. There were no water lines back in that day and only rivers and lakes were considered "flowing." A lake was considered "flowing" because of the springs or creeks which fed into it and the water that seeped out of it. The mikvah qualified because it would have a small manmade channel that connected it to a "flowing" water source, such as a river or lake.

While it was common that only Gentile men would use the mikvehs for conversion purposes (accompanied by circumcision) both the men and women of the Jews used the mikvehs. Most of the time- the ladies only used the mikvehs for ceremonial cleansing after their menstrual cycle while the men would use them for cleansing before and after some spiritual duty or act.¹

Many modern Jewish rabbis believe that the first instance of the use of ceremonial cleansing through water occurred just prior to the giving of the Covenant at Mt. Sinai. They cite **Exodus 19:10** as their justification:

The LORD also said to Moses, "Go to the people and consecrate them today and tomorrow, and let them wash their garments;

These rabbis believe that the "consecration" and the "washing" of the

garments are related actions.²

Summary of the Origin of Water Baptism

So, it appears from ancient Jewish records that an incomplete and primitive type of water "baptism" was being carried out by the priests based upon an understanding of several passages in **Exodus** and **Leviticus**. Also, it appears that Jewish males were ceremonially washed through emersion before and after conducting certain spiritual activities and that occasionally women also utilized this process. It also appears that in between the two Testaments- that Gentile converts were *required* to go through this cleansing before "becoming a Jew" either politically or religiously.

And while rivers and lakes were the primary means of conducting this "baptism" there was also a clay appliance called a "mikveh" in which the converts were baptized.

An Important Note

Now it is very important to understand that while we do not know for certain if any of this is information is true or not, these are the best ideas that are available as of this date from all available records. So, we must use this information with caution and not simply accept it as a Biblical fact because it is not. However, if these things *are* accurate, they present some very interesting parallels with John the Baptist's ministry, the Day of Pentecost, and the giving of The New Covenant.

For example, when first John the Baptist and later Peter commanded the Jews to "be baptized," they were in effect saying that these natural born Jews were pagan and Gentiles in their hearts and needed to be "converted" to the Truth- even though they were born Jews and had been raised on the teachings of the Old Covenant. This struck at the very heart of their entire existence and nothing made them more hostile to the New Covenant than the thought they too needed to be "cleansed," "converted," and "saved" like the other Gentiles.

The Biblical Record of Water Baptism

However, what we *do* know is true and what we *can* rely upon is the indisputable fact that Scripture clearly and repeatedly records that both John the Baptist and the Apostles preached, taught, and carried out the baptizing of new converts in water by complete emersion and that Jesus commanded all believers to be baptized throughout the world until His Return while He Himself set the perfect Example by Personally being baptized in water by emersion in the River Jordan. Let's examine the Biblical Record.

John Baptist Required and Administered Water Baptism

Matthew 3:1-12

1 Now in those days John the Baptist came, preaching in the wilderness of Judea, saying,

² "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

³ For this is the one referred to by Isaiah the prophet when he said,

"THE VOICE OF ONE CRYING IN THE WILDERNESS, 'MAKE READY THE WAY OF THE LORD, MAKE HIS PATHS STRAIGHT!""

⁴ Now John himself had a garment of camel's hair and a leather belt around his waist; and his food was locusts and wild honey.

⁷ And he was preaching, and saying, "After me One is coming who is mightier than I, and I am not fit to stoop down and untie the thong of His sandals.

8 "I baptized you with water; but He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

Luke 3:1-17

Jesus Commanded Water Baptism

Matthew 28:16-20

 18 And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth.

⁴ Therefore we have been buried with Him through baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

1 Now Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest,

 2 and asked for letters from him to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any belonging to the Way, both men and women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem.

³ As he was traveling, it happened that he was approaching Damascus, and suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him;

⁴ and he fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me?"

⁵ And he said, "Who are You, Lord?" And He said, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting,
⁶ but get up and enter the city, and it will be told you what you must do."

⁷ The men who traveled with him stood speechless, hearing the voice but seeing no one.

¹⁵ And when she and her household had been baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come into my house and stay." And she prevailed upon us.

The Acts 16:22-34

 22 The crowd rose up together against them, and the chief magistrates tore their robes off them and proceeded to order *them* to be beaten with rods.

 23 When they had struck them with many blows, they threw them into prison, commanding the jailer to guard them securely;

⁷ Then he left there and went to the house of a man named Titius Justus, a worshiper of God, whose house was next to the synagogue.

⁸ Crispus, the leader of the synagogue, believed in the Lord with all his household, and many of the Corinthians when they heard were believing and being baptized.

The Acts 19:1-7

1 It happened that while Apollos was at Corinth, Paul passed through the upper country and came to Ephesus, and found some disciples.

² He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?" And they *said* to him, "No, we have not even heard whether there is a Holy Spirit."

 12 Now I mean this, that each one of you is saying, ''I am of Paul,'' and ''I of Apollos,'' and ''I of Cephas,'' and ''I of Christ.''

²⁶ For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus.

²⁷ For all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ.

 28 There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free man, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

²⁹ And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's descendants, heirs according to promise.

The Linguistic Definition of Baptism

As we have previously discovered, if the Biblical writers were alive today we could simply walk over to them and ask them what they meant in the verses and passages that they wrote and that would end all the debate. But we can't do that because they are all dead. So, all we have to go by are the actual words that God the Holy Spirit moved upon them to pen down and the precise meaning of those words. We also have the "context" in which those words are found and the combination of the precise meaning of the words along with the context in which they were written helps us to discover the one, single, true meaning of every verse and every passage.

Words have very precise and clear meanings. And we cannot arbitrarily assign a meaning to a word without clear evidence- both from history and from the linguistic sources- that allow for that to be done. So, as believers we are absolutely supposed to be illuminated by the supernatural power of the Holy Spirit as we study and struggle to understand God's Word. But that supernatural illumination will always be in concert with the actual meaning of the words of Scripture and their correct context or else we have no basis to trust what we think the Holy Spirit has revealed to us.

So, while being supernaturally enabled to understand and comprehend the Truth, we are *not* free and we have no license to simply place our own thoughts, our

own reasoning, or our own personal interpretation onto the words of Scripture while minimizing or outright ignoring the linguistic, grammatical, and historical context and reality in which those words were written.

By God's own design, Divine Truth is received and learned and taught and understood by humans through the cognizant abilities of the human mind aided by the Power of the Holy Spirit. And that Truth will never be in opposition or contradiction to the literal, grammatical, and historical context of the words of Holy Scripture.

So, in the case of Baptism, to find the true meaning of the practice we must look at the actual meaning of the words that God the Holy Spirit moved upon the Biblical writers to use in the Scriptures. And there are two Greek verbs that the New Testament writers used which express the reality of Baptism:

- ✓ Bapto
- ✓ Baptizo

Every single reference to Water Baptism in the New Testament uses these two verbs and both of them mean *to immerse, or to dip into*. Not coincidentally, they are the same verbs which we translate when we speak of drowning.

The Greek noun *Baptismos* is used in **The Book of the Acts of the Apostles** to *always* refer to a genuine believer being fully and completely immersed into water. The Latin equivalents of this Greek noun are:

- Immersio
- Submersio.

The Greek language has a completely different word for "sprinkling", the word, *rhantizo*, which never is used anywhere in the entire New Testament to describe Water Baptism. Without exception, every New Testament use of the "bapto" family of words either requires or permits complete immersion into water. Even the great reformer John Calvin said:

"The word baptize means to immerse. It is certain that immersion was the practice of the early church."³
