I would like to thank all of our supporters for your prayers, charitable contributions and acts of kindness that had a lasting impact on the lives of many men and

their families over the past year. Your support also helped us meet and surpass our budget and financial goals for 2018. We are trusting that God will continue to show His faithfulness and provision in the coming year and that many more lives will be changed through the opportunities afforded at Friendship House! As many of you know, we have entered our 34th year of operation and providing critical services and residential support to men in recovery in our area. Louise Montgomery and her husband Claude purchased an old house that was in dire need of renovation, oversaw and accomplished much needed repairs and opened the doors on December 23, 1985. This ministry was birthed in the hearts of two women who had become prayer partners after meeting each other about five years earlier. Louise and Allison Kelley were both summer residents of Georgetown and had not met until they were both having their vehicles repaired in Topsham one day. They would both come to see this as more of a Divine encounter rather than a chance happening. During their prayer time,

those who were poor and in need and this led to her volunteering at Kingston House, a shelter for the homeless in Boston's Combat Zone. In their times of prayer, they came to agreement that Portland was in desperate need of this type of house and shelter. Through hard work, persistence and a series of miracles, Friendship House was born. The series of miracles included God's provision and overcoming many obstacles. Claude (a renowned portrait artist) and Louise determined that they would use their "rainy day" savings fund of \$50,000.00 to purchase a house. After months of searching and not finding any suitable houses under \$100,000.00, they were ready to abandon the plan of acquiring a house for the homeless, changing to a mission to provide clothing for the destitute in the city. As Louise was driving around to churches, looking for a place to distribute clothing, she noticed a woman carrying a load of groceries on Munjoy Hill and stopped to offer her a ride. Some would call this a chance encounter or random act of kindness, but Louise described it as a miracle. When this woman she had assisted asked why she had all of the clothing, Louise told her the full story of their house search and resulting plan to distribute clothing to those in need. She listened intently and then told her of a house that she knew about on Brackett St. that might be in this price range. It took many more miracles, but the house was eventually purchased and became Friendship House. Allison Kelley became the first resident director/manager and lived in the house. While I never had the honor to meet Louise, as she passed

away in 1992 in a car accident, I had the

honor and privilege to meet Allison for the first time just prior to writing this article. Along with her daughters and son in law, we visited together for over an hour, after giving them a tour of the current Friendship House. Allison is a humble and unassuming woman of strong faith, who was surprised to hear that many thousands of men, as well as their families have been impacted through the ministry of Friendship House over these past three decades! It is amazing to think of the impact that has been made by two women seeking to hear God's voice, following His leading and committing their plans and idea to Him! We are thankful for the strong foundation that was laid for this house and for everyone who continues to be a part of the ongoing legacy of this ministry.
