"A Word from Pastor John"

Lent is here. Lent is the season of 40 days before Easter (not counting Sundays), a time of self-examination. In these weeks, we take stock of how faithful or unfaithful we have been in living what we say we believe. We confess our sins and shortcomings and resolve to live more faithfully. During Lent, we also are reminded of our mortality and our total dependence upon God for this life, and our eternal life in Christ. I hope you will allow these weeks to help you renew your commitment to Christ, and prepare you for a joyous Easter celebration! Here are upcoming events for you to take note of:

LENT SERMON SERIES - During Lent, I will be preaching a <u>sermon series entitled, "Who is Jesus?"</u> Each week we will look at the portrait of Jesus each of the Gospelwriters paints in their writings. Each one fashions how they tell the story of Jesus in unique ways that reveals who they believe Jesus is. CHANGE IN OUR PRAYER CARD PROCEDURE ON SUN-DAY MORNINGS – For some time, there has been concern about the way we collect prayer cards for inclusion in the prayer-time in worship. Currently the cards are placed in the offering and the ushers must quickly rummage through the plates to find all the cards so they can be delivered to the pastor and included in the prayer. Many Sundays, some to the cards are missed, and therefore not read. Our Worship Committee has approved a change in how the cards will be collected. People are asked to NOT put the cards in the offering, but hold them for a moment. <u>Following the offering, you will be</u> <u>asked to pass prayer cards to the center aisle and the</u> <u>ushers will collect them and bring them to the pastor</u>. We feel this will ensure that all cards are collected and concerns shared.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE UPCOMING GENERAL CON-FERENCE – As you probably are aware, our denomina-Methodism, there are various views about the most godly way the church should relate to LGBTQ persons. As you can imagine, there are strong feelings about this issue. Persons of integrity and faithfulness disagree. There are churches that would like our denomination to be much more restrictive when it comes to the inclusion of gay and lesbian person in the life of the church. These churches are anxious to break away from the UMC to form a new Methodist denomination that will reflect their views. The quadrennial meeting of the General Conference of the UMC will meet in May and consider a proposal, called "A Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation." This "protocol" is a plan whereby those dissenting congregations would be permitted to leave with their property to form a new

expression of Methodism. If the Protocol passes, only those congregations wishing to separate from the UMC will have to vote to do so. Congregations who are happy as they are and wish to remain do not need to do anything. We don't know if the protocol, or some other plan will pass the General Conference, but it is likely to pass – which will mean changes for the United Methodist Church as we adjust to fewer congregations.

<u>The Bishop's Cabinet will be holding an informational gathering in each district to share updates about the up-</u> <u>coming General Conference and the Protocol. Ours will be held Monday, March 30 at Suntree UMC in Mel-</u> <u>bourne (10:30 a.m.)</u>. We will carpool from the church office at 9:30 a.m. for those wishing to attend.

Then, immediately following the conclusion of the service, you may move forward to the altar, and the liturgist or a Lay Servant will be happy to serve you communion. (Gluten free bread)



O love, how deep, how broad, how high, it fills the heart with ecstasy, that God, the Son of God, should take our mortal form for mortals' sake!

What does love, Latin, Jesus's life and a fifteenth-century victory song have in common? Obviously the hymn "O Love, How Deep, How Broad, How High." Ok so maybe not so obvious however this great Latin hymn has a rich text and history. It begins sometime in the fifteenth century with both the text and tune. Whether the text or tune came first, no one knows. The author of the Latin text is unknown. Because of similarities to other writings, it has been attributed to Thomas à Kempis. The Latin text is an extraordinary ninety two line poem rhymed in an *aabb* pattern. The translation in our hymnal only uses twenty four of these lines while still maintaining the overall concept. The tune DEO GRACIAS was written as the victory song celebrating Henry V's triumph over the French at Agincourt on October 25, 1415. The English Hymnal published in 1906 is the first ue to learn how to live and treat others from the exhymnal the tune can be found in.

The portion of this rich Latin text found in our hymnals was translated into English in 1854 by Benjamin Webb. Webb was an Anglican priest who edited a couple hymnals as well as translated other hymns. During this time period many Latin and Greek poems were being translated into English to be used as hymns. The depth of these texts were being discovered and scholars wanted to make them available for everyone.

The overall theme of "O Love, How Deep, How Broad, How High" is that everything Jesus did from his birth to resurrection was for all of humanity. The author only asks us to be in awe of these acts and praise God for them. This can be seen from the beginning of the text, "O Love, how deep, how broad, how high,/it fills the heart with ecstasy." We cannot begin to comprehend how great and vast God's love is for us. Our understanding is partially dependent on our faith journey. The author also suggests this through the first line. The more we experience the love of Christ the more intensity it has in our lives. We begin to find it easier to place our whole life in God's hands. The author then spends the rest of the text to offer "proof" as to why we should trust that

God's love will never fail. God sent Jesus, his only son to our world. "He sent no angel to our race/of higher or of lower place,/but wore the robe of human frame/himself, and to this lost world came." God could have created another plan for our salvation but chose to send Jesus for us. This stanza is omitted from our hymnal. The third stanza discusses that for us Jesus was tempted in the desert. Jesus experienced the temptations we give into. Jesus understood how difficult it can be to resist temptation and still calls us to be resistant. We must use lesus as a model for this resistance. Jesus used the Word of God as reason and strength. We must also use the Word of God as our weapon against temptation. The fourth stanza discusses Jesus's ministry. Every aspect of Jesus's ministry was for someone else. We continamples lesus set. We are reminded by the author that "For us he prayed, for us he taught,/for us his daily works he wrought,/ by words and signs and actions thus/still seeking not himself, but us" (emphasis mine). The fifth stanza states that for us lesus was "scourged, mocked, in purple robe arrayed,/he bore the shameful cross and death,/for us at length gave up his breath." Jesus not only sacrificed his life for us but endured great pain and suffering. Fortunately Jesus did all of this to give us eternal life. "For us he rose from death again; for us he went on high to reign; for us he sent his Spirit here."

Like Jesus, we are on a journey. This journey is not easy but we know we have lesus to rely on because he lived his life for us. While the author of this text does not demand anything from us but awe, lesus called us to serve and love our neighbors. Each day we are all given different opportunities to serve others. As we journey through this season of Lent, I want to encourage you to invest some time into serving others. Jesus laid his life down for us so we could have eternal life. So what will you do for lesus?

Day Trip to Visit Our Florida United Methodist Children's Home, March 28

You've heard about and supported the wonderful ministry that cares for children in crisis, our Children's Home. Saturday, March 28, they will hold a "Day on Campus," where members of congregations can visit the campus and the cottages, and meet some of the young people who are cared for there. We will leave promptly at 7 a.m. and return in the early evening (we probably will stop for dinner on the way back to Sebastian). The Home is near Deltona, about a 2 hour drive. We need you to sign up so we can let the Home know how many to expect (they will serve us a complimentary lunch). We will carpool (if you can drive, contact our Children's Home Rep, Phil Molina at 386-848-9305). If we get a large enough crowd, we could look into renting a small bus. Sign up sheets are in the back of the sanctuary and in the fellowship hall.

- 9:00am, gates will open for tram tours of the Enterprise campus.
- 9:30am, three educational breakout sessions at specified locations across campus. These sessions will share some helpful information based on experiences and trainings at the Children's Home. The subject matter for the three sessions will be: foster care, planned giving, and trauma-informed ministry. Ask Phil Molina about the class reservation for this.
- I I:00am, we will gather in the gym or other designated viewing areas for the morning program. This will include presentations and awards, testimonials, as well as music and dance. The program provides an opportunity to celebrate the amazing things that God continues to do through the ministries of the Children's Home.
- At 12:00pm, lunch on grounds.
- At 12:30pm, campus tours resume once again, with many of the cottages also being open for tours.



Three-Week "Inquirers' Class" Each Month

Our Church has developed a three-week "Inquirer's Class" for all those curious and wanting to learn more about the Christian faith, the United Methodist Church, and this congregation. This three-session class will be made available every month on the first, second, and third Sundays of every month, and repeated each month. They will take
