
Two Ends Against the Middle

I had prepared a PowerPoint presentation in 2019 for a civic club in Virginia Beach, Virginia, who asked me to speak on how to talk about difficult subjects and still remain friends. One slide from the presentation is below, and it is how I want to begin to address violent confrontations of different ideological perspectives like the BLM demonstrations in past months and the demonstration at the Capitol last Wednesday as your pastor.

A quick summary of this slide is that it all comes down to whether or not we can accept **change**, and how much you let **fear** drive your words (rhetoric) and actions (behavior). Progressives (my preference to derogatory label of "Liberals" and certainly that of "Socialists") are more prone to accept change, whereas Traditionalists (a more benign description than "Conservatives" and certainly that of "Fascists") are less likely to accept change. The intensity of those sentiments increases as you get further from the mean. Likewise, a sense of fear increases the further away from the mean to the point where the 2.5% on each end ("extremists") live in a perpetual fear or paranoia which they cover-up with false bravado so that no one really sees their fear. Repressed fear nevertheless comes out in the form of anger when it exceeds one's control, as when someone or something takes a cap off a "bottle" (you or me, figuratively) and the pressure is then released. That is what you see in the destruction of property and violence against people during riots.

Whatever the issue that led to the riot, only 16% of the population are on each end of the spectrum (statistically, over one standard deviation from the mean). That means those positions are clearly not the majority of a population. Most of our society, around 68%, are Centrists (Moderates could be another description). Without a doubt some Centrists lean toward one end or the other of the spectrum when it comes to their views on political and social issues, but they are not so entrenched in their fear of change that they refuse to listen to other perspectives. They are also less apt to resort to harsh rhetoric and physical violence. Centrists unfortunately get caught in the crossfire between Progressives and Traditionalists, and so are viewed as enemies by both sides. That is what two ends against the middle looks like, and when it is carried on for too long and/or to a greater degree of severity, it leads to a social implosion. This has happened over and over again in human history, and it can happen to us.

This analytical tool is dependent on a large number of participants, and it should be inclusive of all demographic groups (rich and poor, multiple ethnicities, both genders, the entire adult age range, etc.). The curve



is skewed and unreliable if the sample numbers are too small and/or they only include a particular demographic group. As an example, it could explain sentiments of United Methodists in the U.S. on gender and sexual inclusion (a back-burner issue we still have face), but if the same survey was given to our congregation, it would <u>not</u> be accurate. That said, I still think it is an informative tool if you stop and think about where you fall in the spectrum when it comes to your acceptance of change and your level of fear.

Maybe you're asking yourself, "Okay, pastor, that's all good and fine, but what does all this have to do with my faith in Jesus Christ?" Here's the short answer. Jesus is the mean, and our Lord and Savior does not take sides. To the Traditionalist who holds fast to the status quo, Jesus seems too progressive, and to the Progressive who wants to throw the past out the window, he appears to be too traditional. Jesus' ethos and morality comes from a Centrist position—one that accepts God's spiritual kingdom which changes stoic and static religiosity and calls for individuals on both downslopes of the curve to turn from sin and idolatry and become a part of the KINdom, the family, of God. That family includes many races, nationalities, ethnicities, genders, ages, incomes, and partisans. True disciples of Jesus Christ are peacemakers.


⁹ "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God (Matthew 5:9, NRSV).

With the strength God gives them, they bring Progressives and Traditionalists together through emotional intelligence and psychological flexibility while, at the same time, seek God's guidance on any given issue in order to find God's truth. They do not take sides, increase the social divide, and further the social implosion. That is how the KINdom of God is increased, how our congregation will reflect that KINdom on earth as it is in heaven, and how the Body of Christ will resist the temptations of Satan when he puts on the clothes of false Christianity.

¹² For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free [Traditionalist or Progressive]—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. ¹⁴ Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many (I Corinthians 12: 12-14, NRSV, adapted).
