Words from Pastor Tom:

The Freedom of Giving

Giving frees us from the familiar territory of our own needs by opening our mind to the unexplained worlds occupied by the needs of others.

-Barbara Bush

The quote above reminds me that giving is a mind-opening experience. It frees us from self-centeredness, widens our social aperture, and enables us to see the needs of others around us.

Giving in all its forms is also a freeing experience from the bondage that our financial and physical possessions can create. The Advent devotional I shared this past Sunday by Blair Gilmer Meeks alludes to this trap. That spiritual reality exists because, as C.S. Lewis reminds his readers in *Mere Christianity* and *The Screwtape Letters*, we live in enemy territory on this earth. By that, he means that the earthly domain is where Satan fights his insurrection against God, and he is constantly on the prowl to find new recruits to his rebellion. One subtle tool that Satan uses—one of many—is to convince the body of Christ that it doesn't really need our prayers, our presence, our gifts, or our service. The lie then gets exaggerated and encouraged by messages that it's okay to think of oneself before others in "you deserve it" messages in the form of overt advertising and covert temptations. It is a trap we all fall into, including me, especially in this stressful holiday season with COVID-19 lurking in dark corners.

Last week or early this week you will receive a letter from our Administrative Council chairperson Lee Fuerst. We have also included a copy in this newsletter for those of you who may have missed it via mail. He and I want you to prayerfully consider your year-end giving and your anticipated giving for 2021.

Here's why. I truly believe that good things await us. Despite appearances, God IS on the move at Lake Lotawana. Given that spiritual reality, will we catch God's Holy Spirit on an individual, and then congregational, basis? Will we be on fire for Jesus and make things happen in and through our church? Or, will we be content to sit back and receive God's grace but <u>not</u> give it to others? The ministry of this, and every, congregation needs our prayers for others, our presence online and in-person, our financial gifts, and, most importantly, our service to our Lord and Savior in loving behavior. It is the last one—our service—that I continually stress.

As your pastor, I'm eager to lead you into a rebirth of God's presence at LLCUMC in 2021, but I need each of you to believe that God has good things in store for us, then act upon that belief in conjunction with others, to make our faith in God real for three particular groups of people in our community.

The "**Nones**." In 2012, this is how the Pew Research Center described those who do not have any religious affiliation. Reasons vary as to why, and their intensity can range from simple awarenes to atheism. The only way they will know Jesus Christ, and thus who we are as a congregation, is for you to treat them with integrity and respect. Let them know by deed as well as word that faith in Jesus Christ isn't about judgment or moral superiority; it's about love and acceptance of them. That is how C.S. Lewis converted to Christianity from atheism, and it can happen in our homes and workplaces.


The "**Dones**." The Pew Research Center described them as knowing all about religion well into adulthood. They know the practices and the language of the church, but then something hurtful, traumatic, or judgmental happened, and they walk away <u>not only</u> from that congregation but from religious affiliation as well. As those who are "done" with religion as they have experienced it, they are the hardest group to reach. Your consistent faith, honesty, and witness of Christ may be one of many means of grace available to break down the wall they've built.

The third group, the "**Un-dones**," is a more recent category, and I'm not sure of its origin. They are folks who may or may not have some religious affiliation but are so overwhelmed by life's circumstances (work, parenting, caring for others, illnesses, etc.) that they can't seem to find their way back to church (or the schedule will not allow it). They need someone to guide them toward a more fulfilling and eternal life, and that someone maybe you.

The Nones, Dones, or Un-dones are all around you. Think about these folks in your prayers, your presence, your gifts, and your service for the rest of this year and into 2021. When you find them, love them as Christ our Lord loves us. Show them that you trust in Something that is far greater than our present circumstances, and that hope <u>does</u> exist. That is how we make disciples for Jesus Christ, and our church programming, in whatever form it may take, will simply reflect who we already are as a people called United Methodists.
