No Middle Person

In my church newsletter article of August 4, I shared that I had written a study guide on C.S. Lewis' *Mere Christianity* which I started in 2018 and have been editing ever since. In the weeks since that article I have gotten serious about getting it published. Truth is, I was afraid to do so in the past. When you embark on an endeavor such as this you learn some new things, and sometimes those things are not pleasant. One thing I discovered is that, as a writer, you do not send a manuscript, well alone an idea for a book, directly to a publisher. Instead, you have to find a literary agent to do your bidding with established publishers. That is the first, and probably the highest, hurdle to getting published.

Each literary agent, or agency for whom they work, has different requirements about what you send to them for consideration. Some only want an query email with a summary of the book you want published, something about you and if you're already published, and personal marketing ideas. Another agency I contacted just wanted an email with a synopsis of the book and the first five pages attached. I first thought that, if I have to do all of this work, why would I need an agent? Why not send it directly to a publisher? I soon discovered, much to my chagrin, that this is all a part of the screening process. The bottom line is that potential agents want to know that you are passionate about your creation before they will consider you as a client. So far, I've been rejected by two agents, and learned that two more are not considering potential clients for the rest of 2020. The personal lesson for me is that rejection does test one's resolve, but I will keep trying.

As I thought about what to write this week of Christmas on our walk of faith as Christ's disciples at Lake Lotawana Community United Methodist Church, my mind wandered back to this process of (hopefully) getting a book published. Is there is a larger lesson that can be gleaned from my experience of wanting to be a published writer? On the surface, there appears to be no similarities that can be drawn between the two, but that doesn't mean that something can't be learned. Upon further reflection yesterday, I found that lesson.

There is a misconception within Christianity that an individual must go through an "agent" of sorts in order to get to God, just like I have to go through a literary agent to get to a publisher. That is a false teaching within Christianity. You and I have direct access to God. That is what Christmas is all about. When we have a relationship with Jesus through the Holy Spirit, we have a direct relationship with God through the mystery of the holy Trinity. You do not need an intermediary, even if that "agent" is me. As your pastor, I am here to help you in developing or strengthening your relationship with God through Christ our Lord, but the heavy lifting in maintaining that relationship must be done by you, and often that maintenance is done in times of stress and difficulty.

Each Christmas season reminds us that, in fact, we don't have to go to God; God has come to us in the Christ Child, Emmanuel, "God with us." God initiated our holy relationship in the form of a small, helpless, and innocent child that is totally dependent upon his parents. That is a relationship of which we are all familiar, and it is a helpful image to seeing that the door is now open so that we can have that relationship with God through that same Christ Child. In Christ's life, death, and resurrection we have access to the grace in which we now stand (as Paul puts it in Romans 5). Our awareness of God's grace is formed and strengthened in dozens of ways on our walk of faith, and we can increasingly become more and more dependent upon God, especially in the difficult moments of life.

During this strange Christmas season due to the pandemic, maybe now is the time to start that relationship, your faith walk with God through Christ our Lord. It bears repeating; that is a personal relationship, between you and God. While a middle person is not absolutely necessary, they are sometimes helpful in giving another perspective on what inhibits your holy relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

If you are like me and already on a faith walk with Christ Jesus, then this Christmas is a time to assess where we are as we face a new year in ten days. Am I moving forward and finding new ways to serve my Lord and Savior? Or have I stopped on that journey for some reason and now find myself spiritually (emotionally and rationally) stuck and unable to move forward?




