#### Words from Pastor Tom,

I have found myself thinking about the future after I (and Jennifer) got our first COVID-19 vaccination three weeks ago, and now that we've had our second dose this past Saturday, I want to share an idea that has been swimming in my brain—one, I hope, will help us "turn the corner" and think about the future rather than dwelling on the past and present.

There was so much that we couldn't do when I arrived last summer, and I've talked about my grief at those lost opportunities due to the pandemic. So, my idea is a series of what I call "Eat 'n' Meets." At this point, I'm thinking one every three months starting this July of 2021—a time I hope the pandemic will be such that we can safely gather for a potluck meal (the "Eat" part) and a time of sharing (the "Meet" part). The subsequent Eat 'n' Meets could be in October, January of 2022, and April of 2022. Again, my thinking is a potluck after the 10:00 service, with the sharing time immediately following around the tables (not in a separate room). I will bring up this idea formally at our May Church Council meeting, so I'm open to a different day and time, or perhaps making it a potluck brunch at 9:00 a.m. and having the discussion at 10:00 rather than a worship service, if the discussion takes us in either of those directions.

Eat 'n' Meet #1 would be an open question and answer period (Q & A) with me as the focus. I want to make myself vulnerable to you as your pastor and let you get to know me so that together we can do great things in the name of our Lord and Savior in the future. It would be your opportunity to ask questions about growing up as a United Methodist preacher's kid, my calling into the ministry, my education, my time as a teacher and basketball coach, my past pastoral appointments, my naval career as a chaplain, my motto of ministry, my hobbies (current and "wanna-bes"), or other things you'd like to know. I plan to share a seminar on discipleship and congregational growth that I've written as Eat 'n' Meet #2 this fall, but I'd be willing to foreshadow it with thoughts on that topic since it is an elaboration of my motto of ministry.

There will certainly be more to follow on this idea, so stay tuned!
