2018 has been a very productive year for Interfaith Outreach Home as we welcomed 14 new families throughout the year. Thanks to old and new community partners alike, 5 of our apartments were refurbished, making them warm and welcoming spaces for new families.

Four families graduated after two years in the program - Deborah and Krystal did so as first-time homeowners! Nine others are continuing on their path to sustained self-sufficiency.

Our annual fundraising dinner, A Harvest of Hope, was a huge success. Educator Celeste Clark, our keynote speaker, was joined by current and former IOH residents Lesley, Nysha, and 10-year-old Adji. Each of their testimonies emphasized how invaluable stability and access to education are to breaking the cycle of poverty. Lesley has recently been accepted to Georgia Tech University for Industrial Engineering. and her twin sister, Ashley, is a sophomore at Georgia State on the premed track. Nysha Is also a student at Georgia Tech.

The push to purchase the land that IOH has rented for 26+ years grows stronger each day. If we are successful, our plan for expansion will include transitional, affordable, and market-rate housing. Though our plans remain in their early stages, we're deeply committed to the effort.

While we're proud of our accomplishments, they would not have been possible without you, our donors and supporters. As you gather with family and loved ones this holiday season, we hope that you will remember the families of Interfaith Outreach Home.

After my first visit to IOH, I did the same thing.

The powerful stories Deborah shared with me of lives being transformed were so inspiring that I couldn't wait to start telling my friends. By the end of the day, at least 5 other people had heard about IOH and my excitement for this work of providing safe, affordable housing for families to build a stronger future. I called friends who I thought could offer financial support. I called others on the church staff to find out how we could support this ministry. I called people I knew would be excited as I was to know this kind of ministry exists.

We are approaching the time of year when, in the Christian tradition, we tell the story of shepherds who hear angels tell them "good news of great joy." In a world where bad news seems to occupy far too many of the headlines, we want to spread our own good news of great joy about the work of IOH. When we tell others about this ministry, and they tell 2 friends, and they tell 2 friends, we multiply what we can do and the resources from which we can draw. So, let this

work of empowering families and inspiring children be some of the good news you spread at this time of year. . Tell everyone you know about it. Let your enthusiasm be contagious. This news is too good to keep to ourselves.

On Mother's Day 1948, 46 people gathered for a worship service. Also on that day, 19 people signed the opening charter as the first members of Brookhaven Christian Church (BCC) and its history officially began. Over the years, the church has continued to be a presence in the community. Through involvement with

organizations like Interfaith Outreach Home the members of BCC continue to demonstrate their commitment to the community.

Brookhaven Christian Church was a founding member in supporting Interfaith Outreach Home and has provided support in a variety of ways. Over the course of just this year, BCC hosted its annual Halloween Party for both church and IOH families. They also provided hands-on labor for facilities clean-up and maintenance, provided Thanksgiving baskets for the residents and important, ongoing financial support. Harvest of Hope

IOH held its 2nd annual celebration on October 17th at St. Martin in the Fields Episcopal Church. The theme of this year's celebration, A Harvest of Hope, was in thanksgiving for those that have supported IOH in its years of planting seeds for the future of families.

IOH Board Chairman John McNeil introduced our Keynote Speaker, his daughter Celeste McNeil Clark. Celeste, recipient of the AJC Celebrating Teachers Award, shared moving stories of her students and the impact of stability and security. The opportunity to directly impact a child's life, to plant seeds for their future, occurs when you support IOH.

Once those seeds are planted; however, they must be nurtured and allowed to grow. The importance of IOH was exemplified in the words of our 3 Harvest of Hope speakers. Adji, a 10-year old resident of IOH shared her happiness at being able to sing, dance and play with her little brother in a safe, loving home. Nysha and Lesley are graduates of IOH. They are both college students attending Georgia State and Georgia Tech, respectively. They both shared how important their time at IOH had been to their success as both students and as young women.

Our celebratory dinner was truly a Harvest of Hope for these young people as it has been for the more than 500 families that have graduated from Interfaith Outreach Home.
