Years passed, and the trees grew. And then one day, three woodcutters climbed the mountain.

The first tree rejoiced when the woodcutter took it to a carpenter's shop. But the carpenter was not thinking about treasure chests. Instead, he cut and carved the tree into a simple feedbox. The once-beautiful tree was not filled with gold or decorated with jewels. It was covered with dust, and filled with hay for hungry farm animals.

The second tree rejoiced when the woodcutter took it to a shipyard. But the shipbuilder was not thinking about mighty sailing ships. Instead, he hammered and sawed the tree into a simple fishing boat. The once-strong tree was too weak to sail the ocean. It was taken to a little lake, where every day it carried loads of dead, smelly fish.

The third tree was confused when the woodcutter took it to a lumberyard, where it was cut into strong beams and then left alone. "What happened?" the once-tall tree wondered. "All I ever wanted to do was stay on the mountaintop, grow tall, and make people think of God."

Years passed, and the three trees nearly forgot their dreams.

But then one still and silent night, golden starlight poured over the first tree, as a young woman placed a newborn baby into the feedbox.

"I wish I could make a cradle for him," her husband whispered.

That was even better than being the tallest tree in the world.

The author may have intended the story for Good Friday but I think it has a lot of relevance for Christmas. In the story Jesus is found in the most unlikely places - a dirty feedbox, an overloaded fishing boat, strapped to an instrument of death.

And so it may be for us living in these unusual times. The Advent and Christmas rituals will feel different in many ways this year. Yet in the midst of it all remains Jesus, a reminder of God's love for us. It may take a bit more effort, but God can be found in the most unlikely places.

Have a blessed Advent filled with the joy of Christmas.

#### Joel and Jen Martin, ministry leaders in the DiscipleMakers Ministry and who the congregation supports as missionaries share the following highlights about their ministry to local college campuses:

Even with all the restrictions, which at first appeared to limit the gospel, let me give you some highlights of amazing things that are happening:

- Each week 70 or so students log onto Zoom to experience our weekly online large group meetings where we are walking through the Gospel of Luke.
- Each week we have about 120 students involved in small groups that are encouraging one another in their faith, studying the Scriptures, and encouraging each other how to reach out and share their faith.
- Each week we continue to train around 30-40 leaders in how to engage their campus. Like Paul, we may not be able to be with them in person, but we are equipping them and encouraging them to do the work of ministry at a distance.
- At an early online Zoom meeting, an Elizabethtown College student heard the
