Meeting People at Life's Intersections

Last weekend, I was in Hickory sitting at the intersection of Lenoir Rhyne Blvd and Hwy 70. In the grassy median was a young minister in a suit screaming something about Jesus Christ. I had trouble hearing his words over the truck idling beside me and the *boom, boom, boom* from an unseen car stereo. This minister was trying to take the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the people in an unorthodox, however, in my observation, ineffective way.

The young minister was following the example of Jesus Christ though. Jesus only occasionally spoke in the synagogue and spent the majority of his ministry in the streets with the people. He spent a lot of time teaching or healing at the ancient world's busy intersections. The question for us is how does Bethlehem take the Gospel to the people in an unorthodox but <u>effective</u> way?

Our Vision Team has been studying our community to look for ways to reach the unchurched and dechurched*. We discovered many important facts. Only 20% of the people living within two miles of our church say attending church is important to them. One-third of our children are being raised by single-parent households. 382 students at Celeste-Henkel Elementary School struggle with having enough food to eat. We also discovered huge needs at West Iredell Middle School. Local emergency workers shared with us a growing concern about the opioid epidemic and the large number of overdoses in our community. We discussed the need for a support group for caretakers of individuals with memory problems. There is a lot of need within the shadow of our steeple.

As a church we have a large building, many resources, and caring hearts to respond to these needs. Where do you see God calling us to leave our comfort zone and go into the community in Jesus' name? I invite you to dream with me about what is possible in West Statesville.

There is a lot of loud noise in our society that is drowning out the church's ability to reach people, noise like demanding schedules, illness, struggling families just trying to get by, and the diminishing influence of the church on society. Imagine taking the Gospel into the intersections of people's lives. Into their daily needs of helping their children grow, helping people get jobs, and working with God to transform lives. Imagine a church that steps into the loud noise and distraction of daily life and offers the love of Jesus Christ in a new and innovative way to transform the lives of local families.

The next step depends on you. What do you see as the unmet needs in our community and how can Bethlehem help to meet them? When you hear your minister say we need to leave the walls of our church and go into our community, what scares you, concerns you, or makes you pause. How is God calling you to be part of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the unchurched and dechurched in our community?



1948, Rev. Richard Wurmbrand was kidnapped and imprisoned for 14 years by the Communists, simply because he was a believer in Christ. Three of those years were in solitary confinement. His wife was also arrested and worked in a slave labor camp, leaving their son an orphan. He was prayer for the persecuted beaten for praying, but wouldn't stop praying for strength to endure, for his family and for his enemies, as Jesus tells us

to do. Richard Wurmbrand wrote Tortured for Christ in 1967 and founded the organization Voice of the Martyrs, which aids the persecuted and their families.
