"Press On to Maturity"

A principal goal of the teaching, or doctrine, of Christ must be that of pressing on to maturity. This was a primary concern for Paul, and it should be our goal as well (Phil. 3:12–14).

WARNING AND EXHORTATION TO GO ON TO MATURITY (5:11—6:20) (CONTINUED)

If we pursue being complete persons in Christ, we will come closer to achieving God's will for our lives. The writer of Hebrews emphasized this thought of advancing toward maturity at the beginning of Hebrews 6.

- 14. What insight does the concept of Jesus as "forerunner" lend to our understanding of Him as our High Priest?
