

The Secret Revealed

Ephesians 3:1-13

Two different times in this letter, Paul reminds his readers that he is a prisoner (Eph. 3:1; 4:1), and at the close he calls himself an "ambassador in bonds" (Eph. 6:20). No doubt the Ephesians wondered "Why is Paul a prisoner in Rome? Why would God permit such a thing?" In the first half of chapter 3, Paul explains his situation and, in doing so, also explains one of the greatest truths in this letter, the "mystery" of the church. In the New Testament, a *mystery* is not something eerie or inscrutable, but rather "a truth that was hidden by God in times past and is now revealed to those who are in His family." A *mystery* is a "sacred secret" that is unknown to to those who do not believe, but understood and treasured by the people of God.
