# 19 Pentecost Leadership Letter for the Week of Sept. 27th-Oct. 3rd

# Dear Zion Family,

This past Sunday we were blessed to have Rev. Jennifer DeWeerth back in the pulpit to lead our service. Rev. Jen preached on the second reading from James (5:13-20), in which "he urges us to pray in every situation, in good times and in bad, in joy and suffering, intercessory prayer for those suffering, and praise and singing with those who are full of joy. Second, he urges people to pray for one another;...James writes, 'Therefore, confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed.' We can note that, for James, prayer is not just private and personal. Prayer is a social activity and public~it happens in community...When we people in the church pray for one another, even for the individual sickness, or sin sickness, the whole community is healed." James reminds us that prayer is powerful and effective. Rev. Jen shared her experience of the power of the prayers she offers. "When I say prayer is effective and powerful, I generally mean the way I observe it working most obviously to me~that it changes me. Through prayer, I have come to care more about others and then take action to care for them." Let us be prayerful this week and every week, as it can yield benefits both for those we pray for as well as ourselves.

Our congregation mourns the passing of longtime member Francis "Fran" King, who entered the church triumphant on September 27, 2021. We extend our heart-felt sympathy to Claudia, daughters Jan and Denise, and the rest of the King family.

Fran joined our church when he married Claudia Zoeckler in a candlelight ceremony at Old Zion on December 14, 1956. With that union, he became part of a family who had been a vital element in our congregation for over a century. He embraced that vitality and expanded on it during his 65 wondrous years with us. Fran served on the Church Council for many terms, was President of the former Lutheran Church Men, and coordinated that group's activities, such as their Saturday morning breakfast programs. A master electrician, he chaired Zion's building committee after we moved to French/Burrstone Roads, and donated his time and expertise to many a wiring project, such as the complex electrical connections needed to activate the balcony organ. He was an usher, a greeter, a strong supporter of congregational outreach, a Bible study regular, a chaperone for Youth Group functions when it was called the "Luther League," a cook for the annual Easter Breakfast, a driver for Zion's bus in the 1960s, as well as many additional benevolences for his beloved church.

We will miss him, miss him deeply. In future days, when we think of our friend Fran King and his life at Zion, the words of Matthew 25:23 will quickly come to mind: "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Calling hours will be held at church this Saturday, October 2<sup>nd</sup>, 11a.m. -1 p.m., immediately followed by the funeral service. Per the family, masks will be required. We would like people to practice social distancing while at Zion to keep everyone safe.

### **Sermon:** Forbid Them Not -Pastor Janet Hoover

Do you ever feel as if, no matter how hard you work, you never quite get everything accomplished? Have you ever been frantically trying to meet a deadline, only to be frustrated by interruptions? Then you should be able to understand the anxiety which motivates the disciples in this passage. Jesus is on the road again, but this time there is a special urgency. He knows that his time is running out. In the short time left, he tries to prepare his disciples. He continues to heal the sick, and to teach those who gather around him what it means to follow him. The hours slip away—so much to accomplish and so little time. Surely, the disciples feel the strain and the tension. They want uninterrupted time with Jesus so they can make sense of what he is trying to tell them. They see the tiredness and stress in his face and long to protect him. And then, some from the crowd have the nerve to bring little children to him. It's no wonder the disciples react sharply. This was actually an unheard of and shocking thing to see. Even though children in Jesus' time were longed for as a means of assuring the future, even though they are seen as a gift from God and a strong affirmation of life, at the same time there is very little attention given to the children as individuals. They are expected to obey and learn and grow up as quickly and quietly as possible. A proverb from this time says that a man is destroyed by morning sleep, mid-day wine, and chattering with children. In their reaction to the presence of children, the disciples are not necessarily cruel or unfeeling, they are simply acting out the belief of their day- the belief that children are a waste of an adult's valuable time. But Jesus sees things differently. Let the children come to me. Forbid them not. The kingdom I have been preaching belongs to them, too. Bring them to me. And then, in front of everyone, he gathers the children in his arms, lays his hands upon them, and blesses them. Notice that Jesus doesn't say: Let those children who are well-behaved and quiet come to me. He doesn't say: After I take care of important matters, and if I have time, I'll see the children. He doesn't say let the little ones related to me by blood come closer. He doesn't say: Those of you who enjoy children take care of them and let the rest of us tend to business. He says: Let them come to me. Jesus' actions say to the children: I have time for you. You matter. I want to hear what you have to say, and I want you to hear me. This is no way for a respectable rabbi to behave, and this incident must have made a great impression on the people, for it is described in three of the gospels. Through his example and his words, he has charged us with a responsibility. And if we want to follow Jesus, we must take it seriously. So, how do we do that? How do we bring children to Jesus? Sometimes through teaching and coaching, but classrooms and organized activities are not the only way we bring people to Christ. Before the stories of God's people make sense to the children, they have to experience, to see for themselves, what it means to be God's people. They must trust others before they learn to trust God. They must know love. They must feel accepted and know that they belong. Children may not study their Bibles as diligently as desired, but they will study the lives of the adults they meet in the sanctuary and in the church parking lot, in the grocery store and at football games. They learn by watching you. How we demonstrate Christ's love wherever we are has a powerful influence on how the children will love others and God. We are called to be the people of God-together. There is no minimum-or maximumage requirement to be a part of the family of faith. That is wonderful, but it isn't always easy for anybody. Children are not always angelic and well-behaved. At times, they are messy and noisy, they interrupt and don't sit still. And they distract us when we want to concentrate. But adults are not always angelic and well-behaved either. We are sometimes irritable and short-tempered, opinionated and sometimes a bit set in our ways. We are often task-oriented and have little time for simply enjoying life. There are problems and tensions when all ages join together. But it is that connection that enables the exciting opportunity to be the body of Christ, using the gifts of each person to enrich the lives of all. We come to God with individual gifts and talents, and each age also brings something the world needs. Children are bearers of love and hope and grace through: hugs, laughter and tears, small acts of kindness like sharing graham crackers and offering bunches of beautiful dandelions, spontaneous demonstrations of thankfulness and joy, directness and simplicity of faith. Youth are bearers of love and hope and grace through: provocative questions, dreams for the future and the energy and enthusiasm to carry them out, innovative and creative thinking, frankness and openness to new ideas, deep compassion for the hurts of others, and a faith which challenges and pushes us past complacency. Adults are bearers of love and hope and grace through: wisdom and insights which come from experience, knowledge and skills, strength of character, and a faith which has been hammered out in the fires of life. God's promise to our earliest ancestors in the faith was that God would be their God and that they would be God's people. Through the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, that promise became a reality for all people. We are all children of God-holding hands with men and women, young people, and children in worship and praise. When I think of the church, the child of God in each of us no matter our age is called to be a disciple of Christ and helped to grow in faith. Where children and adults are involved throughout the church's life. I see a place where all of God's children—whatever the stage of life they are in—are able to take risks, try new things, teach a class, sing a solo, lead a committee, share their questions and doubts and insights, knowing that they will be supported and encouraged. I see a place where we can be who we are—where we can act our age, whether it be 7 or 47 or 107, without fear of rejection or criticism. I see a place where we can live together celebrating our differences and cherishing each other's gifts. I see a place where all people discover and claim over and over again the good news of God's abiding love. But remember—Christ's love is not just

for those of us gathered here, but for all children everywhere: the ones who don't nestle snug in their beds, the ones who sleep with hunger and fear. Those are our children, too. Jesus says: Let the children come to me. Jesus is calling us to embrace not just our own children or the children of Zion or those children we know, but all God's children. How are we doing? How are we caring for the children of humankind? I don't think I like the answer I come up with—sometimes we let them starve. Sometimes we let them live short lives in miserable poverty, sometimes they're abused and neglected by the very people who should love them the most. Love of God can't be separated from love of neighbor—and that includes the children. Those who can't fend for themselves, those who are powerless in the political decisions which shape their lives and their futures. Children need your help. Christ came that our hearts and the hearts of children everywhere might be filled with: love instead of hate, hope not despair, compassion instead of selfishness. Christ came to teach all creation how to love God and one another. You are being called to respond to that compassionate, merciful, loving, protecting, nurturing, sheltering, gathering grace of God. You are being called to serve a Savior who stopped on his way to the cross to reach out to the children. And, as you say here I am, Lord-tell me what to do, God will open doors of opportunity for you and for this congregation. Some of you will be empowered to work to stop the violence and poverty around us because you know that you can tell a society by looking at how its children die. Some of you will be inspired to lead us in the fight to end world hunger, because hungry children are bathed in the tears of God. Some of you will put on a mask when you enter a place where those too young to be vaccinated are present. Some of you will go to work tomorrow and work for new plans, new policies, because the people of God should be about protecting God's flock. Some of you will return to schools and classrooms to teach and counsel and listen. Some of us...all of us I hope...will keep the children in mind as we vote and speak out to our elected officials. And I hope that wherever we go we will work to provide a safe place for children to learn and grow and to know that God's desire for them is a nestling warmth and the embrace of love. In a poem some of you may know, Ina Hughes offers a prayer for the children: Jesus says: let the children come to me. Children who put chocolate fingers everywhere, who like to be tickled, who stomp in puddles and ruin their new pants, who sneak popsicles before supper, who erase holes in math workbooks, who never can find their shoes. And children who stare at photographers from behind barbed wire, who can't bounce down the street in a new pair of sneakers, who are born in places we wouldn't be caught dead in, who never go to the circus, who live in an X-rated world. Forbid them not: Those children who bring us sticky kisses and fistfuls of dandelions, who sleep with the dog and bury goldfish, who hug us in a hurry and forget their lunch money, who cover themselves with Band-aids and sing off key, who squeeze toothpaste all over the sink, and slurp their soup. And those who never get dessert, who have no safe blanket to drag behind them, who watch their parents watch them die, who can't find any bread to steal, who don't have rooms to clean up, whose pictures aren't on anybody's dresser, whose monsters are real. Pray for children: who spend all their allowance before Tuesday, who throw tantrums in the grocery store and pick at their food, who like ghost stories, who shove dirty clothes under the bed and never rinse out the tub, who get visits from the tooth fairy, who don't like to be kissed in front of the carpool, who squirm in church and scream in the phone, whose tears we sometimes laugh at, and whose smiles can make us cry. And we pray for those whose nightmares come in the daytime, who will eat anything, who have never seen a dentist, who aren't spoiled by anybody, who go to bed hungry and cry themselves to sleep, who live and move, but have no being. Pray for children who want to be carried, and those who must. For those we never give up on and those who don't get a second chance. For those we smother with attention, and those who will grab the hand of anybody kind enough to offer it. So, pray for the children you treasure and for the children all over the world, for each child is a gift. Pray that the child in each of us would be freed to explore and dream and laugh and love. For we are all children of blessing, children of promise. And Jesus stopped his business. He took them in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.



Receive these prayers, O God, and those in our hearts known only to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



## ZION ENDOWMENT FUND ANNUAL DISTRIBUTION FOR 2021

Zion's Endowment Fund has \$16,160 available for distribution in 2021. One fourth of the total distribution will go to each of the following categories:

- (1) Community outreach programs
- (2) Special ministries of Zion
- (3) Missions of the ELCA
- (4) Zion Capital Projects

To be considered for a grant, submit a Zion Lutheran Church Grant Application Form describing your organization and what the funds will be used for to: Zion Lutheran Church, 630 French Rd., New Hartford, NY 13413 - Attn: Endowment Distribution. Or send via email to office@zionluth.com.

Deadline for receipt of the form is November 1, 2021. All applications will be considered at the November 2021 Endowment Committee meeting. Recipients will be notified in writing and checks will be sent in late November/early December 2021.

## ZION ENDOWMENT FUND OVERVIEW

Zion's Endowment Fund was established in 1985 for the purpose of enhancing the mission outreach of Zion Lutheran Church apart from the general operations of the congregation. The Fund welcomes gifts from Zion and Utica community members. Gifts can consist of memorials, bequests in wills, charitable remainder and other trusts, charitable gift annuities, assignment of life insurance and transfer of property, such as cash, stocks, bonds, or real estate. To-date, most gifts have been from bequests in wills. Planned giving is one method of providing end of life gifting of one's wealth to the Zion Endowment Fund.

## YEARLY DISTRIBUTIONS

The Endowment Fund by-laws require that yearly distributions be made from the Fund. The distributions are divided among the following: one-quarter each to; community outreach, missions of the ELCA, special ministries of Zion Lutheran Church and Zion capital projects. The Endowment Fund Committee makes recommendations to the Church Council and Zion's congregation concerning the charitable distributions. Past recipients include; Community Food Bank, Your Neighbors, Family Nurturing Center, Canstruction, Lutheran Homes Foundation, Vanderkamp, KEYS Program, Foothills Rural Community Ministry and Center for Family Life and Recovery.

### HISTORY OF GIFTS RECEIVED AND DISTRIBUTIONS

In the 35 years of its existence, the Endowment Fund has received gifts and bequests of about \$200,000. Over this same period, distributions from the Fund now exceed \$280,000. The Endowment Fund expects to distribute approximately \$16,160 this year.

### CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE FUND ARE WELCOME

Contributions to the Zion Endowment Fund need not be just in the form of bequests in wills or trusts. Cash or checks, in any amount, in memory of a loved one or in honor of someone special, would be appropriate and welcomed. Our hopes and expectations are that additional gifts, coupled with Fund earnings, will cause the Fund value to increase so that Zion may play an ever-larger part in fulfilling its mission in the world. Your endowment gift would be a part of that process.
