You will tread upon the lion cub and viper; you will trample down the lion and the serpent.


I will deliver those who cling to me; I will uphold them, because they know my name.

## Sermon: -Pastor Rick Klafehn

Every first Sunday in Lent we hear the story of Jesus' temptation. We know from the story of Adam in the garden – Adam the Hebrew word for human – that temptation is a universal human experience. Jesus was tempted because he is human and not only divine.

He experienced all we go through, even temptation, so he can save us who are human.

Jesus was tempted in the wilderness right after he was baptized. For us also, baptism does not immunize from temptation. Therefore, Jesus teaches his disciples to pray, "Save us from the time of trial" or in the older English translation, "Lead us not into temptation." The Greek word in the Lord's Prayer means temptation, test, or trial. Every temptation tests our faith and values. Every temptation puts us and our faith on trial, whether we are children of God. God allows us to be tested, but as James 1:13 teaches, God is never the tempter. We cannot trust and love God, if God might tempt and lead us into sin and its evil and deadly consequences.

If this were a Bible class, I'd ask what you think each temptation of Jesus is all about – no right or wrong answers. The temptations of Jesus are, I think, a kind of Rorschach test to help us uncover the temptations to which we are most prone. How we interpret the temptations to Jesus says, I think, as much about us, as him. What do you find in them?

Satan first tempted Jesus to turn stones into bread to satisfy his physical hunger. We might find here: the temptation to gratify our own personal desires and immediate needs: physical, emotional, or social; the temptation of greed or to hoard; the temptation to put our own survival ahead of anyone or anything else; the temptation in the middle of anxiety and fear to be impatient and to react and to succumb to our perceptions in the immediate moment; the temptation to distrust God to care for us and protect us, to give us what we need when we really need it; the temptation to trust only ourselves and take matters into our own hands, no matter the consequences or cost to others; the temptation to confuse what we want with what we need, the temporal with the eternal.

The devil then tempted Jesus with earthly power and might. We might find here: the temptation to be in charge, to control peoples and resources – even for purposes we believe just and good; to seize power to get one's way and any way you can, even illegally, by lies and deceit, by threat and intimidation, by violence, by manipulation of due process, by disrespect for the rights of others, by ignoring or breaking ethical and national boundaries, by compulsion and force, rather than by kindness, respect, and love.

The devil finally tempted Jesus foolishly to jump off the top of the temple believing God would save his life. We might find here: the addictive temptations of thrill-seeking, popularity, and fame, the temptation to take inappropriate and unreasonable risks, to pursue whatever excites our senses and causes our adrenalin to flow, be it speed, drugs, getting away with something; the temptation to test God's promise of protection; to seek impossible, unrealistic, magical and fantasy solutions to our problems; to live blindly in a nostalgic past or naïve future, rather than to recognize and face the challenges in the present.

Often the voice of evil uses words that sound good. Take care of yourself. God wants you to have daily bread. God wants you to make a difference and help save the world. Trust God. Prove your faith by how you live.

These spiritual axioms are not the whole story. Yes, take care of yourself and, yes, God wants you to have daily bread, but not at the expense of others, not at the cost of distrusting God's care. Yes, God wants us to make a difference, and help bring of God's reign of mercy, justice, and love. Yes, God wants our trust, and our faith put into action, not just empty words or a feeling, but not by trying and making ourselves out to be our own savior or the savior of others, not when acting out of desperation or for show is really living out our lack of faith in God or promoting ourselves and feeding our own selfish egos.

Satan used even the words of Scripture to tempt Jesus. Religious leaders can do so still today, as sadly and regrettably slavery was justified in many white churches in this country for too many years. There is a right and a wrong way to use Scripture. Satan uses Scripture to mislead, to exclude, to isolate, to divide, to judge, and to condemn.

Jesus uses Scripture to live as a child of God with faith in God's love, God's reign, and God's promise: to reconcile, to unite, to include, to stretch the boundaries of God's love, to forgive, and to save; to invite trust in God's mercy and love. Jesus uses Scripture as a means of God's mercy and grace.

Luke traces Jesus' genealogy back to Adam, and calls Adam, son of God. (3.28) Adam, the first son of God, in the garden succumbed to temptation. Jesus, the new son of God, in the wilderness resists. His resistance is the beginning of God's new reign, God's new creation. His victory over Satan in the wilderness was like young David's over Goliath. Both had been anointed as God's chosen one – Jesus with water his baptism, David with oil by Samuel – signs of God's greater reign to come.

Jesus would be tempted again in the Garden of Gethsemane at prayer, before he was betrayed into the hands of his enemies and arrested. Jesus knows what temptation is like for us. He shows us the way to resist, and he loves us, even though we fall.

God supplies angels we cannot see to guard us in all our ways. More than that, the Holy Spirit gives us one another: to be a twelve-step support group for us who are addicted to sin; to be strong for each other when we are weak; to help each other recognize and resist temptation; to remind each other of God's word in Scripture and God's living word in Jesus; to help each other trust God's saving love, even when the way ahead is not clear and we are anxious and afraid; to forgive each other when we fail. The church, a flesh and blood, living, breathing, congregation of ordinary people, is God's gift to you: a people of love and faith, through whom the Holy Spirit daily guides and forgives.

In the face of temptation turn to God in prayer. Paul writes in Romans, "The same Lord is Lord of all and generous to all who call on him. Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved". God promises in Psalm 91, "I will deliver those who cling to me; I will uphold them, because they know my name. They will call me, and I will answer them; I will be with them in trouble; I will rescue and honor them. With long life will I | satisfy them, and show them my salvation

Thanks be to God in Christ Jesus. Amen.


