To our Zion Family,

This past Sunday during the joyful chaos, we continued our "homework" of finding and sharing hope. I was buoyed up when Debbie Murdock shared that \$880 had been given this year in gift cards for the Angel Tree and that over 70 hats, mittens, and gloves had been collected for Johnson Park Center. Jim Marscher shared gratitude from the Stewardship Committee for the generosity expressed in the current pledges from congregants. Fran Holzberger shared encouraging news of the generosity of the Utica community in donating food for veterans. Dan Rodahan offered stories of the importance of local food banks at this time and shared his hope that this generosity would continue in January-June when donations tend to be down. This will be our last leadership letter before Christmas. There will be no leadership letter for Dec. 21-27, so there are many service announcements included here.

-Announcements and updates:

-Council and the Zion's Task Force continue to monitor the COVID situation carefully and, like many, are concerned about the rising cases in our county. Although we had originally planned to offer an in-person option on Dec 20th, we will be offering the Dec 20th service through Zoom, livestream, and service of the word – not in the sanctuary. This decision was made based on rising positivity rates for COVID tests in Oneida County. The health and safety of our congregation remain our top priority.

-This Sunday we will continue our remote worship practice, offering the opportunity to attend the service via Zoom, livestreamed on Facebook, or by using the printed Service of the Word, which you will find later in this mailing.

-Sara will be on vacation from Dec. 18-Jan.3. The office will be closed unless we can find substitutes. Call ahead to make sure someone is in the office if you have church business.

In her wonderful sermon this week, Pastor Janet shared reflections on the three-descriptions of Christmas, that of sparkle, that of starglow, and that of Mary's Song which captures God's ongoing love and justice. One of my favorite expressions of Mary's Song comes from Marty Haugen's Holden Evening prayer, recorded here in the spirit of our times: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=m-SFeQsuZPU. Pastor Janet shared, "Christmas is sparkle and glitter, it is fun and celebration. Christmas is star glow and angel choruses. It is the hush of worship and zooming with friends. But even more, Christmas is the time when Christ comes into our midst to wipe away the tears, to lift up those beaten down by pain and suffering, to call us all to love and serve in his name." Second Reading: Romans 16:25-27 Gospel: Luke 1:26-38

Sermon: Advent 4 -Rev. Jennifer DeWeerth

This morning I want to talk about *where God goes to live*, in hope and promise, and unexpected places. Eventually, since we read the famous Annunciation story, we are going to get to Mary's womb, but we're going to start with 2 Samuel.

Instead of a first reading from Isaiah as we have heard in the previous weeks of Advent, today we read from the second book of Samuel. The reason is pretty obvious-because in the Gospel reading, vs. 32, the angel Gabriel says, "and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David." And our scripture from 2 Samuel is where that *covenant with David* (the fourth covenant of Hebrew scripture after the covenants with Noah, Abraham, and Moses) is spelled out.

As he scans his new monarchy, having just brought the ark of God to Jerusalem and settling into his own new royal home, David is pleased, but something still bothers him, "I have a place to live but the ark of God is still in a tent..." So he decides to build God a house. His spiritual advisor, Nathan, encourages him at first to fulfill this desire he has to build God a worthy house. But then God comes to the prophet Nathan that very night and tells him to warn David off this plan. God says essentially, "No you're not building me a house; I'm gonna build YOU a house; one of your descendants will forever be king in Jerusalem."

And God actually provides a rationale about why David does not need to build a huge temple. God says, "I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle" and I'm good with it. God does not need a fancy house; God is everywhere, and will not leave God's people. Of course, many years later, this promise appeared to have been broken with the destruction of the southern kingdom, the end of the Davidic reign. But for 500 years, the people of Israel clung to the stubborn hope that God would find a way to keep this promise. And then we get to the angel's announcement to Mary.

But before we get to Mary, I want to linger for a moment more with this passage from 2 Samuel, and what God says in this story, through Nathan. For more than nine months we have not been in the temples we have built for worshiping God. Maybe once, yes, in October, but mostly we have not gathered in that space since last March. That's hard for us, because of our desires, just as it was for David to have to put a pause on his temple plans, but from God's perspective it really is not a big deal. Just as God wandered with the Israelites and remained with them in exile and in tents, maybe we can hear what God is saying to us, something like this:

"My people, I have not been in your church since the day you closed down, but I've been moving about wherever you are, and been with you regardless of that space in that building. Look, Zoom is fine with me, I don't need anything better than that. I'm not too proud to sleep in a tent; I'm not too proud to live in *your* heart. COVID-19 is not stopping me from being with my people. So, what if we're not in the building? I've always been leaving the building anyway. *I've always been on the move. I have always been God with you.*"

Now on to Mary. We can guess that she thought her life would be like this: she would marry, which was the most important thing for a young woman, really a girl, of her time and place. She would become pregnant, she hoped, and bear children. Pregnancy was both the most dangerous thing that could happen to a woman because of the high rate of death associated with childbirth, and at the same time, it was the primary purpose of a woman's life, of a marriage, of a people in society-to procreate.

That was the plan. But then the angel Gabriel shows up. Imagine the disruption of her life and how this message sounds to Mary... *a strange presence and an insistent voice disrupting the plans for a life*. Do we know anything like this sense of disruption in our plans? I'm not saying that a pandemic is like a visit from a present-day angel Gabriel, but it has certainly been a shock that has disrupted our lives and mystified us and made us struggle to find meaning that used to be found not only in our plans, but in our daily routines. As we have struggled with the danger and the loss, at the same time, we have lived in hope.

My favorite pandemic expert, science and health reporter, Donald G. McNeil, was interviewed on a podcast earlier this week about the new vaccine. The interviewer reviewed the data about the escalating positive cases, the increase in hospitalizations, and the rapidly rising death toll. He noted that we are entering an interim time in which it will take a

while to get the vaccine widely distributed across the population, from three months to a year, and during that time, it seems clear, hundreds of thousands more people are likely to die. He asked McNeil, "*I wonder just how dark you think this is all going to be*?" His interviewee paused and my head jerked up at the answer because the senior science reporter for the New York Times said, "I think *we are in the valley of the shadow of death*. It is *really* dark." There is light, there is dawn coming, but it's not here yet.

I paused not only because it was unusual to hear a science reporter on the COVID beat quoting scripture in an interview, but because of Valarie Kaur. Valarie is an activist lawyer and filmmaker who has spent the past almost 20 years working on issues of hate crimes, immigration, and spreading a message she has learned from her Sikh faith which she calls "revolutionary love." But I know her from a viral video of her message when she was with the Poor People's Campaign and a whole bunch of religious leaders for a Watch Night service on New Year's Eve, at the end of 2016. I have watched that video hundreds of times. The reason is that she asks a question in that video that has become a driving question of hope for me over the past few years.

Valarie Kaur speaks for only six minutes, but she talks about the damage of hatred and racism, the horrors of hundreds of years of slavery and oppression and incarceration of bodies because they are Black, brown, foreign, female, or just different. Her own grandfather was imprisoned when he arrived as an immigrant in the US because of his brown skin and the turban on his head. She talks about the rising tide of white nationalism, violence, and hatred in our nation, "Yes," she says, "the future is dark." But then she recalls her grandfather's Sikh prayers of "rising hope" in his dark prison cell, and she thinks about the birth of her young son, and this is what Valarie Kaur says, "The mother in me asks, "*What if*. *What if this darkness of the tomb, but the darkness of the womb?*"

In Advent: What hope do we find in the darkness of the womb? What immense and unimaginable possibility exists in the darkness of the womb? *Everything about a pregnancy is a "what if?" Everything about a womb is about protecting and nurturing with love in this darkness until something wonderful can be born.*

God is not too proud to live in a desert or a tent. God is not too proud to become blood and bone and saliva and flesh and live in the darkness, the dark amniotic fluid of a poor, peasant, unwed teenager. In these four Sundays of Advent we have seen that God's choice is to live

1) in a fragile place where we hunt for small signs of hope,

- 2) in a wilderness where we can see only just the beginning of good news,
- 3) in a song of the oppressed about a world turned upside down
- 4) in a tent and a tabernacle, where the divine presence is rooted only in promise and not in pillars or stone.

And now, of course, we realize it: **in the darkness of a womb**, the body of a Palestinian girl. God has never needed a building or a government or a guarantee of prestige or power. God chooses to live in the darkness of a womb in a human body in a nowhere corner of the world, a dark stable, a dark night. All around us is this darkness and yet, we ask "What if? What if this darkness if not the darkness of the tomb, but the darkness of the womb? *What if the God of love is waiting in the darkness to be born*?" Amen.

Chex Míx Another special holiday recipe provided by chef Jon!

Ingredients:

3 cups Corn Chex[™] cereal, 3 cups Rice Chex[™] cereal, 3 cups Wheat Chex[™] cereal, 1 cup mixed nuts, 1 cup bite-size pretzels, 1 cup garlic-flavor bite-size bagel chips or regular-size bagel chips, broken into 1-inch pieces 6 tablespoons butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 1 1/2 teaspoons seasoned salt, 3/4 teaspoon garlic powder, 1/2 teaspoon onion powder

Preparation: In large microwavable bowl, mix cereals, nuts, pretzels and bagel chips; set aside. In small microwavable bowl, microwave butter uncovered on High about 40 seconds or until melted. Stir in seasonings. Pour over cereal mixture; stir until evenly coated. Microwave uncovered on High 5 to 6 minutes, thoroughly stirring every 2 minutes. Spread on paper towels to cool. Store in airtight container. Substitution: The original recipe includes Corn Chex[™], Rice Chex[™] and Wheat Chex[™]. You can mix and match to suit your taste—just use a total of 9 cups of cereal. Healthy: To reduce the fat to 2 grams and the calories to 80 per serving, use 3 tblspns margarine instead of the 6 tablespoons butter, omit mixed nuts and use fat-free bagel chips. Presentation/Garnish: Make enough of this favorite mix to package up as gifts for special friends—it's so good and always a welcome surprise! Pre-heat oven to 250°. Put cereal and seasoning mixture into ungreased roasting pan and bake for 1 hour, stirring every 15 minutes. Spread on paper towels to cool, about 15 minutes.
