Leadership Letter Sixth Sunday of Caster – May 9, 2021

Dear Zion Family,

Last Saturday evening, knowing that I would not be together with you on Zoom on Sunday morning, I read the Service of the Word for 5 Easter. While driving northeast to Pine Lake on the Sabbath, I kept thinking over and over again about that wonderful key word, "abide." And, I could envision Jesus in the Upper Room turning to his disciples and saying, "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." (John 15:5) After that, I thought about Pastor Janet's Oklahoma version, "Abide in me as I abide in y'all. I am the vine, y'all are the branches," and how these verses are about the community's life together, how we need each other, and how together we are more than any one of us alone. On Monday morning, the day after my camp was opened for the season, I decided to view the May 2nd service on YouTube. What joy! I did not miss Kelli Watson's playing of "Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee" after all. Plus, I found yet another of Rev. Hoover's gems—"To abide with Christ involves immersing yourself in scripture reading it devotionally, studying it, wrestling with the difficult and challenging passages, relaxing into the words of comfort....It also involves constantly turning to Christ for help and guidance and strength." Gospel: John 15:9-17 The holy gospel according to John. Glory to you, O Lord. The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon: -Rev. Jennifer DeWeerth

There is no story in today's gospel. There's not even a single image of Jesus--the shepherd, the vine--that we can grasp on to. There's just a lot of the big words: Love, the biggest of course. But also Abide, Friend, Joy. In some ways, the big words make it so easy. I mean, it can't get any easier in the pulpit than preaching a sermon on "love," right? Especially love that is so..organized: "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. As I have loved you, love one another." 1.2.3. It's a simple, linear chain of love from God right to you and me. So easy. But also too easy. Anyone can sign on to "loving one another" in general; it's the specific, concrete instances that are hard! "Love one another" as a theory, as a principle, as a command, is inarguable...but how?

I think there are some clues here, but, once again, we have to look at the context, and in this case, the context is simple. Both the passages last week and this week from John's gospel come from Jesus' "farewell speech to his disciples," which he delivers immediately after washing their feet. The passage ends, "I am giving you these commands *so that* you may love one another" (15;17). See that little twist at the end of the passage? "Love one another" is not really the command itself. It is the *purpose* of the things that Jesus commands. Jesus gives his disciples commands, *so that* they will love one another. Presumably by doing the things he commands, not the least of which is a humble servant action like foot washing, they will love one another.

I read an article last Sunday about how we need to start building up our social human connection skills again after falling out of practice for the past year. The author noted that the actor Ellen Burstyn once said to her in an interview: "When you mother a child, a relationship is formed. You become the noun by doing the verb." The same, the writer says, can be said for building back supportive, strong communities. You become friends by befriending. You strengthen neighborhoods by neighboring. Jesus says, "Do these commandments, these things I am telling you to do, so that you will love one another." We become the disciples he asks us to be by doing the things he shows us, the things he commands us to do. We become the noun by doing the verb. Still, it is hard to do this stuff. And by that I mean some of us, sometimes, are hard to love. And just in general, loving can be hard work. But if we just view loving one another as a hard slog, like something you try but might not really succeed at, then Jesus' command here becomes something like trying to be saved by works instead of faith, our works, instead of God's grace. That's no good! And that's not what Jesus is talking about. Let's go back to that simple 1, 2, 3 formula. Jesus's love for us is not just the *example* of how we should love one another. "Just as the Father loves me," Jesus says, "I have loved you." Jesus isn't learning by example from his Father how to love us; the love God has for Jesus fills him and creates an abundant love that flows to us, through us, and out from us.

This fits with the overall theology of John's gospel, where love is not a sacrifice in the sense of deprivation or self-denial. It's love in the sense of the free sharing of oneself out of overabundant joy. It is the same kind of self-giving love that Jesus prescribes for his disciples— love inspired by the one who came that we might "have life and have it abundantly" (10:10)— love that spills out of the "fullness we have all received" from him, "grace upon grace" (1:16).

Perhaps none of us can help but think of our mothers on Mother's Day just a little, whether we knew them for a lifetime or a short time, whether they are with us still, or long departed from this life, whether the quality of the relationship we had with them was all that we could have wanted, or not what it might have been. Here's the thing though, about a mother. The work she does, the care she provides, physically demanding, relentless especially at the beginning, in pregnancy, childbirth, feeding, changing, holding, day and night, is not, in the end, drudgery, because of the deep joy she knows as her heart expands beyond her chest and fills everything. Like a mother caring for a baby, the works of love are commanded of us and the tasks are never completed, but if we abide in Jesus' love, we will be *refueled by that love*. When it comes to doing Jesus' commands, especially that daunting command, "love one another," it's not an example that is needed, but a power source. "As the father has loved me, so I have loved you," says Jesus. This is not an example, a 1-2-3 formula that Jesus shares with his disciples. It's a circuit, a conduit of energy flowing through the divine to us and through each of us to one another. Not an example, but a power source. We stay connected to it by abiding in Jesus' love. Gracious God, may we live in your love so that we stay connected to the source of all love. Befriend us so that we will become friends. Fill us with your joy, and let it flow out from us to one another. Amen.
