Dear Zion Family,

On the First Sunday in Advent, 39 in-person congregants and 11 Zoomers celebrated our traditional "Hanging of the Greens" program at Zion. Here are a few excerpts from, "The Meaning of the Service": The season of Adventthe season of "going forward" towards the birth of Christ-and Christmas, the time of God's physical entrance into our world, both have a long history. This season and its customs have developed through many centuries. Old customs, symbols, and observances are refined, renewed, replaced; new ones are added. As we look at our decorations that adorn the church, we are mindful that, although it is not Christmas yet, it will be here soon. We make ready for the birthday of the King, our Lord, and we dedicate these symbols-and ourselves-to the glory of God and his Son.

There has been a Christmas tree in Zion Lutheran Church every Christmas for the past 176 years. This year, we have a new tree, purchased at Home Depot and decorated with white streamers and red flowers that adorned some of our Christmas trees in the past. At the top of the tree is a star, but not the traditional white one. This star is one of a dozen delightful star tree ornaments sent to Zion in 2019 by the congregation of St. Oswald's Lutheran Church in Weilimdorf, Germany. St. Oswald's was the home church of Zion's founder, Pastor Johann Andreas (Andrew) Wetzel, the minister who began the tradition of bringing a Christmas tree into the church and trimming it with apples, candles, artificial roses, and a star on top. I love the connections of the old and the new! The rest of the star decorations from Germany are displayed on the table in the Narthex. Dubai is an interesting place. Nestled along the Persian Gulf, Dubai is more than a city. It is an old-fashioned city-state. Like the city-states of Italy in the 19th century, it is an independent nation in confederation with those independent states around it. Dubai and its neighbors make up the United Arab Emirates, a nation established in 1972.

The Maktoum family has ruled Dubai since before the founding of the UAE, and Sheik Rashid, father of the current Sheik Mohamed, had a vision for what the emirate would be. He had laid out the city, the deep water port, and many other projects in his head long before they were realities.

In fact, the port of Jebel Ali, which lies north of the city and is a crucial shipping point for not only the Levant and areas to the west, but also for supplying the US military in the region, was "in the middle of nowhere" when it was built, according to our guide when I visited there for work.

It was so much in the middle of nowhere that someone wanted to build a camel racetrack in the area near it. It was open desert with large dunes. When they asked, the Emir said no, that's where the second airport is going..... Dubai barely had need for one airport at the time, much less two. Now, decades later, the port of Jebel Ali and the finalized Al Maktoum airport make up one of the largest free-trade zones in the world, bringing in millions of dollars for the emirate. Materials can move between air freight to ocean freight tax free, paying only the terminal charges.

If only the mountains of sand were moved, the potential of the area to serve a purpose no one else could see would become a reality. The desert that everyone else saw masked the global shipping hub that Sheik Rashid knew would be there.

Every valley shall be raised up and every mountain and hill made low. The crooked straight and the rough places plain. The Lord comes and we must prepare a world that is what God sees, what God intended, and what God created when the world was created. The image of Global Ports Dubai and that city is an easy one to illustrate this if you think about it in physical terms. The amount of earth moved to create a space for millions to live and work where once there was nothing is stunning. I literally watched a canal open that had been dug to provide a water taxi route through the city, where once desert had

been. Outside of our hotel, a new highway was being built to help alleviate some of the congestion on the main highway that runs along the coast. The world was changing to achieve a vision.

But infrastructure projects aren't what the gospel is about. Or are they?

Today's readings, the Gospel and the prophet, call on us to create a space as it was intended by God. One without barriers and without fear. A world in which the richness and beauty of God's creation is seen for all of its glory so that it can be in the presence of God almighty and glorify God, the creator of all things.

That sounds lovely. Until I'm the valley or mountain. How about when I'm the crooked place that needs straightening? Well, that's a problem, now isn't it.

I must admit to you that I have real issues with the contemporary view of Advent and Christmas. The Disneyfication and Currier and Ives-edness of the whole thing has stripped away the heart of the story. Our world of candles, holly, snow, and delightfully cute children in bathrobes helps us gloss over the cry for change from a man who would best be described as "special" where I grew up in the south. It has clad in blue and put a halo on the unmarried pregnant teen that is at the heart of Luke's narrative, because, to see John, Mary, and frankly most of the Gospel people, as they truly are is a mountain we don't want to make low.

The story of Advent and Christmas is a story about "those" people that we've transformed into our people. While John's call is a call for transformation, we've chosen to transform others more often than transforming ourselves. We want to make those people into people we like because that is so much easier than transforming ourselves into someone who can love all of God's people.

That's the kind of transformation that John is talking about. Removing barriers within ourselves is what we must do. The infrastructure that must be changed is internal. Honestly, we don't like that, because it often means confronting things in ourselves that we see in others but desperately want to hide. It means acknowledging we have far more in common with people we don't want to have anything in common with.

It means having civil conversation over differences, accepting one another for who God made us to be even if we don't understand how or why. It means loving people we don't like. Which, I'm firmly convinced, is how Jesus feels about me sometimes.

All too often, we hear the words of John and think of all the changes that need to happen in the world. Yet the changes don't need to happen in the world around us, they MUST happen in us, each one, individually. That's the point of Advent. To prepare the way of the Lord not in the world, but within ourselves.

Yes, that's a lovely image, isn't it? Until we embrace the words of the prophet. He is like a refiner's fire.

I grew up in the town that was home to the nation's first Gold Rush. Before the San Francisco Gold Rush, there was the Gold Rush of 1828 in Dahlonega, Georgia. And, because I grew up there, we learned all about gold mining and refining.

To get to the Gold, you have to move mountains, for it is buried deep within them. But to make it have value, you must refine it. You must melt it and heat it so that the impurities buried within are released and float to the top where they can be swept away, leaving only the pure element. It is a process that requires lots of energy, heat, sweat, and discomfort.

That refining fire is the conviction and presence of God within us. The movement of the Holy Spirit that lets us know when we've done the things we shouldn't or didn't do the things we should do. When we take a deep breath and offer love, kindness, and gratitude to those who would NEVER dream of offering it to us in return.

Loving God means enduring those moments. It means swallowing our pride because we know that life in this world is not about us, but about those around us. Those moments hurt, they are uncomfortable, and they are exactly the refining fire of God working within our sinful souls.

The third verse of the hymn, How Firm a Foundation, has always said it best to me.

When through firy trials Your pathway WILL lie My grace all sufficient Will be your supply The flames will not harm you I only design Your dross to consume And your Gold to refine

These words remind us that a life of Christ is one that is NOT without hardship. Regardless of what the trendy television mega pastors may tell us, our love for God is not the key to a life without burdens and trials. Yet those trials and burdens help rid us of the feelings and emotions like pride, vanity, and superiority that are the dross contaminating a Christian life. The trials remind us that Christ is our brother because Christ became like us, not the other way around.

Living life as someone striving to follow in those footsteps means enduring, loving, and accepting all of those around us. It means questioning the status quo when that system impedes the humanity of my neighbor, regardless of who they are and what they believe. It means that I must think of others before I think of myself. And it means knowing that the circumstances of my world, no matter how difficult or easy, are not a reflection of God's love for me.

Those are the valleys and mountains we must move, and they are all within us. It is never finished, this preparation and refinement. For we are both saint and sinner with the thoughts and actions of each. As much as we want to focus on the saintly thoughts and actions, that's not what Advent is about. Advent is about removing barriers. Those thoughts and actions which make it much harder for God's love to move in this world because God's love moves through us. Through me and you and everyone around us. The people we like and don't like. The folks that have faith, and those that don't. For we are all creations of God and instruments of God, preparing the way for the Lord of Love to move through this world, even if it is another great city buried under the sand which only the ruler can see. Amen.




God of new life, you come among us in the places we least expect. Receive these prayers and those of our hearts, in the name of Jesus. **Amen**.


