A Few Words From Pastor Rick

The promise of Easter heavens and a new ear

The promise of Easter is not just for humankind. In Isaiah 65, God promises new heavens and a new earth, a whole new creation. Weeping will pass away.

Life will be abundant. God's people in Zion (new Jerusalem) will be filled with joy and delight. The whole world, even the animals, will be at peace. We will read Isaiah 65.17-25 as our First Reading on Easter Sunday.

What a precious promise this is during the war in Ukraine, with its massive destruction and unbelievable numbers of displaced peoples.

What a precious promise this is as we live in the midst of climate change and the loss of biodiversity – and why Earth Day on April 22nd is so appropriate during the Easter season.

What a previous promise this is for Christ's church seeking renewal, revitalization, and redevelopment.

The God we come to know and love and trust in Jesus Christ is a God of new beginnings, a God of life and resurrection.

The God who created the universe continues to create, and promises to recreate us and all life again and again.

God generously and unconditionally forgives our sin, as we repent of the wrong and the damage and the hurt we have done on one another and this beautiful, precious garden planet, and as we seek reconciliation with one another and change the ways by which we live.

God welcomes us back into God's mission to love, to care for, and to protect the miraculous life of all God's beloved creation and all humankind.

The gift of new life and resurrection begins as a tiny green blade of new growth, with faith in Jesus Christ risen from the dead. He is the first fruit, the beginning, of God's new creation. Upon his resurrection our whole faith and life together depends.

God's promise of new life and resurrection will be experienced this month at Zion in two particular ways.

Renewal, revitalization, and redevelopment of congregations always begins with discovery and new focus on their mission. The Abide process led by Pastor Lori Kochanski begins on April 3rd, and it will help us do exactly that. Please pray for and participate in that process. Be prepared to listen and to learn from one another. Seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Your Congregation Council also invited the Congregation Council of Trinity, Herkimer, to an initial conversation April 6th to learn more about each other, a possible first step that may lead to sharing a pastor, and put Zion on a financially sustainable path. Trinity has been without a regularly called pastor longer than Zion. After this meeting, the two Councils will discuss separately whether or not to continue conversations. Please pray for the leaders of both congregations.

No one knows exactly how these conversations will develop or their outcome. We can be sure of God's love and Christ's presence. We can expect surprises. That's why I am particularly drawn to this prayer from the close of Evening Prayer. Please pray with me:

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Abide Process

"Abide" begins April 3, 2022!

This process, led by Pastor Lori Kochanski, assistant to the bishop, is designed to equip and accompany congregations in need of new ways of intentionally working together.

What to Expect: A process for congregations to identify needs and issues in the congregation and community. Then, work to develop measurable, actionable steps to address the needs identified. General notes about the process: - Listening and asking open questions will be emphasized as we work together. - There will be homework in between each time we meet as a group. - Some of the steps will include gathering information from other sources and people who are not in the sessions, but may be helpful to the larger goals. - The process is about developing tools. At the end of our intentional time together in sessions, you will have new ways and renewed practices that will help you identify needs, implement best practices, and be able to work together. - Participation will encourage the kind of group thinking that keeps all the people of the community at the center of decision-making processes.

About the sessions...

Session 1: (with the whole congregation) Identifying any problems/conflicts/needs in the congregation

Session 2: (with council, other leaders and other interested congregational members) Determine insights around the identified problems/conflicts/needs

Session 3: (with council, other leaders and other interested congregational members) Develop measurable, actionable plan(s) to address potential needs

Session 4: (with council, other leaders and other interested congregational members) Prepare to implement plan(s) with the wider congregation. This session will include intentional learning about concrete tools for leaders in the congregation as you continue to work together.

Beyond the sessions...check in, as needed, to keep on track. Also...continue the lifelong practice of listening and adapting to new needs.

In my 175th anniversary history of Zion Church, I stated that the Rev. Reinhold Kessler was the first "child of Zion" to become a Lutheran pastor. Recent research revealed otherwise. I'm delighted to stand corrected.

Adam Martin - brother of "Capitalist Henry" and "Adventurer Frederick" (re: last newsletter) -was a distinguished pastor, scholar, and teacher. Our congregation's initial contribution to the ministry, he took a different path to the Lutheran pulpit.

Shortly after Martin's arrival in 1852, he enrolled in Sunday school - at First Presbyterian Church on Washington Street in Downtown Utica. He knew that success in American colleges depended on mastering English. First Presbyterian offered an environment where Martin *had* to speak and think in English. He couldn't experience this at Zion's German church.

His family, however, was very active in our church and Adam spent *a lot* of time there. Pastor Andrew Wetzel, our church's founder, became Adam's invaluable mentor and friend. Martin aspired to become a Lutheran minister. Wetzel was the *only* Lutheran pastor in Utica. Martin was bright, promising. Wetzel was a scholarly, successful cleric. Bonding naturally occurred.

Pastor Andrew was respected in Central New York Lutheran circles. He served on the Board of Trustees of Hartwick Seminary, founded in 1797. Nineteenth century Hartwick also offered college-prep classes and accepted Adam Martin in 1853. In all likelihood, Pastor Andrew arranged for Adam's admission.

Zion's founder enjoyed strong Hamilton College connections. He tutored Hamilton students in Greek and Latin. The college offered Wetzel an honorary degree, but Zion's humble founder declined, stating that others were more deserving. When Hamilton accepted Adam Martin in 1854, Andrew Wetzel probably penned a persuasive recommendation.

Martin enrolled at Hartwick Seminary after graduating from Hamilton in 1858. He interned at Zion during his Hartwick years and lived with the Wetzels. A newspaper referred to him as Zion's "assistant pastor." After graduation in 1861 and ordination in Rochester, the newly-minted minister answered his first call - at St. Mark's Lutheran, Middleburgh, Schoharie County. While there, he revived a waning membership and stabilized finances. During his St. Mark's tenure, Martin taught part-time at Hartwick and was awarded an honorary "Masters of Arts in Course" (A.M.) degree by Hamilton College in 1863.

Pastor Martin enjoyed a close friendship with Andrew Wetzel until Zion's founder entered the church triumphant in 1880. They teamed for the wedding of Adam's brother, Henry, in 1864. After our congregation enlarged its sanctuary in early 1873, services of rededication were held on July 27. Adam preached at an afternoon Sunday school assembly, and was liturgist for an evening English service. When Pastor Wetzel's son, Edward, passed in 1875, Adam Martin gave the eulogy. He returned to Utica for Andrew Wetzel's funeral in 1880.

During his Middleburgh pastorate, Adam met his future partner, Ann Eliza Sanford. They married in New York City on July 23, 1868. Ann's father was New York State Supreme Court Judge Lyman Sanford. Her grandfather was William C. Bouck, New York's 13th governor (1843-1844). Sanford and Bouck were on Hartwick's Board of Trustees and both served as the seminary's treasurer.

Adam and Ann raised one son: Sanford Bouck Martin (1870-1937), whose achievements mirrored his parentage. He graduated from Pennsylvania College (1890), Yale Law School (LL.B., 1892), and earned a LL.M., *cum laude*, from Yale in 1893. Sanford practiced in New Haven.

Adam Martin left Upstate in May 1865 to accept the presidency of Northwestern College in Watertown, Wisconsin, recently opened by the Wisconsin Synod. Andrew Wetzel's son-in-law, the Rev. Dr. Ewald Giese (Matilda Wetzel's husband), ministered in Wisconsin and, according to one source, may have influenced the synod's choice. However, Martin was young, intelligent, energetic, and fiscally-conscious. Recommendations aside, these qualities had to impress the Wisconsin hierarchy.

To Martin's credit, Northwestern College's enrollment grew tenfold, academic buildings were erected, and contributions created a sustaining endowment. Differences between Adam and the synod, however, doomed his presidency. Martin advocated for bilingual instruction and a curriculum that offered non-theological majors, ideas contradictory to Wisconsin Lutheran thought.

He resigned in 1869 to accept a position as Professor of German Language and Literature, and Instructor in French and History, at Pennsylvania College/Seminary, Gettysburg. This institution of higher learning became Gettysburg College/Seminary in 1921. Pastor Paul Joslyn, who shepherded Zion from 1978 to 1994, was a Gettysburg alumnus.

Adam Martin enjoyed a distinguished career at Gettysburg. American Lutheran Biographies noted that the professor "was a frequent contributor to Lutheran Church periodicals." In 1882, he translated Luther's Large Catechism for the Book of Concord, published by Gettysburg Professor Henry Eysler Jacobs, D.D. Muhlenburg Lutheran College, Allentown, Pennsylvania, recognized Martin's academic achievements in 1887 by conferring on him an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree. In 1890, the Hamilton College Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa awarded Adam an "alumnus membership."

After they retired from Gettysburg in 1898, the Martins moved to New Haven and resided there until their deaths. Adam Martin entered the church triumphant in 1921, Ann in 1926. They rest in New Haven's Evergreen Cemetery.

Adam's brother, Henry Martin, is buried in Forest Hill, Frederick in New Forest Cemetery, Utica. Three brothers, three divergent lives, united for eternity ...

Correction: Last month's article stated that Our Saviour Lutheran Church was created by the merger of Redeemer and St. Paul's congregations in 1926. The union occurred in 1966.
