AN INTRODUCTION TO ZION'S CONGREGATION FROM PASTOR RICK KLAFEHN

(Please note: A brief biography and a photo of Pastor Rick were included in the December 19, 2021 Newsletter)

It is my joy and privilege to join you during this transition period as your intentional interim pastor and to serve and to support you on your journey. This journey may seem like a long and winding road, and I feel for you. The pandemic has not made it easy. Let's recognize Pastor Anita Mohr for her kind and gracious, capable and steady assistance and leadership to Zion. Please join me in expressing our generous gratitude.

I look forward to learning more where Zion has been and is now in its transition and seek to keep things going as smoothly and normally as possible.

An intentional interim pastor helps a congregation affirm strengths, discover opportunities, recognize challenges, and address weaknesses.

An intentional interim pastor asks questions: How have the congregation and community changed – both prior and during the transition? What is the same? What is different?

An intentional interim pastor asks three main questions: (1) Who are we – the talents, the gifts, the interests, and the connections God has given us? (2) Who are our neighbors – and their hopes and fears and needs? (3) Where are the intersections, where we can make a life-giving difference with God's life-saving love, that is, what is God calling us to do and to become?

What is God's mission purpose and vision for Zion? What are the core values that guide how Zion makes choices and lives together? What are fitting strategies and goals to help Zion be sustainable, thrive, accomplish its mission, and grow into its vision?

How might you answer these questions?

Let us use this intentional interim period as a gift of time to provide deliberate and well-informed responses, so Zion can choose the best possible pastor (not perfect!) with the most fitting gifts and skills (not all of them!) to pursue your mission together. The role, gifts, and skills needed today and tomorrow likely are not wholly the same as those of prior pastors in past situations.

An intentional interim period allows time for grieving and healing from the sadness of saying good by to the last pastor and the past. It can create readiness to recognize present conditions and to welcome, work with, and build a loving and positive relationship with a new pastor.

Finally, some nuts and bolts: My time with Zion begins on January 17th. I will be working ten hours in New Hartford each week, Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 10 am to 3 pm. I will also preach and lead worship two Sundays a month. I will focus on five areas: administration; worship planning and arrangement of worship supply; contact with members, especially shut-ins and the sick or hospitalized; Congregational Council meetings; and strategic planning.

Pronounce "Klafehn" so to rhyme with "refrain" (accent on second syllable)!

Please keep Zion, your Council, call committee, and all your leaders in prayer!

Sermon: -Pastor Bill Preuss

Grace, mercy and peace be yours from God the Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

How hard it is to pin God down! How impossible to put God in a box! Of course we know this – or do we? I often find myself challenged to become more expansive in my thinking, more inclusive in my vision, and open myself to knowing that God is even more, is even greater than what I had dared to previously imagine. Think that this is new? Think again.

John the baptizer comes from the wilderness to the river Jordan. It must have been quite a picture that John presented. Yet people were not put off by what they saw. No, the crowds came to where he was and were baptized, washed in the river water, repenting and accepting forgiveness. Luke connects this John with the prophecy of Isaiah. John is the "voice of one crying in the wilderness...prepare the way of the Lord."

John's preaching must have been dynamic. Luke records that he referred to at least some of those who came out to be baptized as a "brood of vipers". And still they came. The people asked what they should do as sinners who now had repented – and he tells them. Tax collectors get a special hearing, soldiers too.

With all of this taking place Luke observes that the people were "in expectation". The excitement was building. The stadium was rocking. Anticipation was rampant. At least some began to believe that John could be the Christ of God, the Messiah. The people expected a Messiah who would challenge the political order of the day. A Messiah who would recreate the "glory days" of God's people. They had a vision, and God was expected to actualize this vision in accordance with what the people thought.

A fiery preacher coming out of the wilderness. A charismatic leader who attracted people to him. This has got to be it! He must be the real thing! And, in the verses omitted from today's Gospel text, Luke reminds us in a moment of "flash forward" commentary, that John was eventually killed at the order of a fearful Herod.

But John is a witness. He is not the Christ. And so he tells the people this. We catch a glimpse of John's own vision of the Christ of God. A person so much more powerful that John was not worthy to even undertake the lowliest of deeds for him... "I am not even worthy to untie his sandals!" Integral to John's vision of the Messiah is that God is going to "clean house". The threshing floor will be cleared! Chaff will be burned not just with fire, but with <u>unquenchable</u> fire.

And Jesus came out to the river with the multitude to be baptized with the others. John tells the people that he is not worthy to accomplish the least action for the Messiah, and Jesus comes to be baptized. "Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form, as a dove, and a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

Enlarge your vision John – here on the banks of the Jordan – God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit – is manifest. Open your eyes people – Jesus from Nazareth, known as the son of a carpenter – here is the salvation of God not just for some but for all people. Here is the one whose kingdom is "not from this world" – the Roman rulers whom the people expected to be overthrown; they are nothing but "small fish". It is evil and darkness that is to be defeated.

I will not fault the people on the banks of the Jordan for having too limited an understanding of God, or a too small vision of what God was bringing to God's creation right in their very midst. I won't do this, because as I said before, I regularly find myself challenged to expand my vision of God because it is always too small, too limited. Truly the God we know is a living God! Not just the God of yesterday...not just the God of today...but the God of yesterday, today and tomorrow. In Jesus Christ, the Messiah, the vastness of God is revealed.

In the Baptism of Jesus as recorded by Luke we witness the power of God, the same power of God that washes over us when we are born again as God's children in Baptism. This is so much more than what is expected or deserved. And so, my friends, as we journey through this Season of Epiphany, let the manifestation of God grow in your lives, so that the greatness of God, the power of God, the living presence of God is known by your witness in this living community of faith, and flowing from this community into the world, today. Amen.

May the peace of God that passes all understanding keep our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.




Since we have such great hope in your promises, O God, we lift these and all of our prayers to you in confidence and faith; through Jesus Christ our Savior. **Amen.**

Christmas Greetings from Weilimdorf, Germany!

Edeltraud John, historian of St. Oswald's Lutheran Church, sent us photos of two Christmas trees - one in the sanctuary, the other in Weilimdorf's market square. In return, Zion emailed pictures of our Christmas Eve chancel to Edeltraud's congregation. This beautiful tradition has endured for six years. May it last forever.

We enjoy a special bond with the good people of St. Oswald's. Zion's founder, Pastor Andrew (Johann Andreas) Wetzel, was baptized and confirmed in that church. Historical material about Pastor Andrew has regularly flowed back and forth across the Atlantic, to the enrichment of all. St. Oswald's members are very proud that "Father Wetzel," as he was known, started the tradition of placing decorated Christmas trees in Upstate New York's churches. Several ornaments on Zion's 2021 Christmas tree were gifts from our German brethren.

St. Oswald's flock did not expect to have a Christmas tree this year. Germany has legislated strict Covid regulations, which were slightly eased on 12/20. Edeltraud included the following telltale note with the photos:

"Surprise, wonderful surprise! Only three days ago we were finally allowed to have a Christmas tree, but we are only permitted to have 40 worshippers in the church. They all have to be registered, too, as having been vaccinated. Our members must keep their distance and wear masks. Many more people want to be at St. Oswald's on Christmas Eve.

But we are glad and very thankful. After Christmas, there will be stricter rules because of Corona mutations. We hope and pray that conditions will improve in 2022.
