Leadership letter for the week of March 29-April 4

To our Zion Family,

We find ourselves in Holy Week, the most significant week of our church year. So much is condensed into this week, with the emotional roller coaster of highs and lows that Rev. Jen DeWeerth described in her sermon this past Sunday. Starting with Jesus's triumphant entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, we witness the Last Supper gathering and betrayal on Holy Thursday, His brutal crucifixion on Good Friday, the grief that follows during the Easter vigil, and the sense of joy and fulfillment in His overcoming death and rising from the grave on Easter Sunday! We hope you can make time in the upcoming days to imagine and re-experience the events of this most important week. Pastor Anita and the Our Saviour congregation have generously invited us to attend their Holy Thursday and Good Friday services via Zoom. The Passion of our Lord booklet has been sent via US mail and/or electronically for those unable to attend those services. We have the chance to gather for in-person worship in our sanctuary this Easter Sunday. Harkening back to previous Easter celebrations in our sanctuary, I am imagining Bob Loomis calling out to all of us from the front of our sanctuary, "And the people of God said..." with us all responding, "Amen" and "Alleluia!"

Please be cautious as everyone exits the parking lot. Reminders of the procedures will be read at the start of the service. Recommendations to reduce the potential of glitches for our upcoming Easter service ~It was wonderful to have many of our congregants (approximately 37) gather in the sanctuary for last Sunday's service, in addition to the folks who attended via Zoom. We did experience a few glitches, however, and continue to work to resolve them prior to Easter. Here's what we ask that you do to help us have as smooth an Easter Sunday service as possible:

1) If you attend the service in-person, please turn off your cell phones prior to entering the church. This will reduce the demand on our wifi bandwidth, allowing a stronger signal broadcast from the sanctuary.

2) If you attend the service remotely via Zoom, either on your computer/laptop/tablet, or smart phone, PLEASE MAKE SURE TO MUTE YOUR MICROPHONE PRIOR TO THE START OF THE SERVICE!!! Our technologist will remind you of this before the service begins. Remember that, unless you are muted, the entire congregation can hear anything you say.
3) If you plan to attend the service remotely via Zoom and have not already done so, please download the Zoom app to your device. In case you have trouble getting into the service by clicking on the link provided (above), this will allow you to click on the app and type in the meeting # and password (provided above). 



PASTORAL MESSAGE *Easter According to Mark: An Open-Ended Promise -Rev. Jennifer DeWeerth* The end of the Gospel of Mark can be more than a little discomforting. It is the "odd Gospel out," because there are no appearance stories following the death of Jesus. Not at the tomb, not on the road, not in the garden, not at the lake. No, not one. Instead we have this:

The women go to the tomb, and they have no idea how they will roll away the large stone. But they find it already rolled away. As they enter the tomb, they encounter a young man in a white robe, and we don't know who he is or how he got there. He sees that they are afraid, but tells them not to be alarmed. He tells them Jesus has been raised. He reminds them that he had told them that, after he was raised up, he would go before them to Galilee (Mark 14:28). They are to tell the disciples and Peter this news. The women leave, and they are terrified and amazed, and in their immediate fear they say nothing to anyone. That's it.

We know that this felt uncomfortable to those who read or heard this story, going a long way back, because interpreters tried to shape up the end of the book so it was more like the other Gospels. But we can tell these add ons were not from the author. Mark was the first person to put the story of Jesus into a narrative form, years before anyone else did. He basically invented the idea of a "gospel" as a narrative of Jesus' ministry. But Mark's ending for this story was hardly an ending at all. It was just the short message of the man in the tomb, and the immediate reaction of the women who heard it. That's it. There's nothing about how it turns out! Do they go to Galilee? Who sees him? What happens when they see him? According to the Gospel of Mark, we don't know.

Why did Mark end his Gospel in this way? What was he trying to say? Well, for one thing, over and over in the story he tells, he shows that even the people closest to Jesus, his chosen disciples, did not always understand what he was doing, or what it really means to follow him. Understanding Jesus. Following Jesus. These are always harder to do than they seem, and you're never sure you are doing it in the moment. So the disciples who follow him are sometimes unsure. You can tell by the questions that they ask throughout the story. Jesus casts out the unclean spirit and they ask, "What is this, a new teaching with authority? He is with them in the boat in the storm and they ask "Who is this that even the wind and sea obey him?" What authority is this? Who is this? They keep asking. So it is not surprising that they come to the tomb asking themselves, "Who will roll away the stone for us?" All that Jesus has done and said and still they don't know who will roll away the stone for them! They see and don't see. They understand and don't understand.

Last week, on Palm Sunday, I talked about the crowds in Mark, how the same people responded positively to Jesus, coming to him on the road: "Hosanna!" and then negatively to him, rejecting him: "Crucify him!" Mark believes that we all have the capacity, the potential, to come to Jesus or to reject him. Whether we will or not, not to mention how and when, is not something he intends to answer in his story-he really believes this is up to each of us. He asks the question but doesn't answer it.

In a sense you could say that Mark believes that the narrative he tells about Jesus is one that we must engage in actively, like reading a "choose your own adventure" book. And, because he thinks that our response is not only up to each of us, but also is as yet undetermined, he just ends the story with things up in the air. In the moment, because they are still processing what they have seen and heard, the women are in a state of terror, amazement, and fear, and they say nothing, at least not yet. Mark gives us a cliffhanger, like you have with a tv series, but the kind where the show is cancelled, and you never really know how the story comes out, at least not directly. So Mark gives us a "choose your own adventure" book, and a television series cliffhanger, and the unknown is...*will they go to Galilee*?

Why Galilee? Why has Jesus promised to go ahead of them to Galilee? To Mark, Galilee is a physical place, where Jesus lived and taught and healed. Remember the first words that Jesus spoke in Mark's gospel: "Now after John was arrested Jesus *came to Galilee*, proclaiming the good news of God and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." So Galilee is the physical place where Jesus began his public ministry, where he proclaimed the good news and enacted the kingdom of God. But Galilee is also where Jesus was both accepted and where he was rejected, over and over again. Galilee is a physical place, but it is also a symbolic place. It stands for where God revealed good news through Jesus, and for the risk that someone takes in

following Jesus. The good news of God is for sure, but following Jesus is kind of risky and hard. But the promise is that, if you take the risk, then "you will see him."

Will the women overcome their fear and share the news? And will they and the disciples and Peter go to Galilee? I like that Mark shows us how this is not an easy decision for the women. They are still in shock. They are terrified and afraid. Maybe they need some time. We don't know. But we understand deep in our bones that it is not easy to move quickly from grief and shock to major life decisions. Debi Thomas, in a formulation that seems right to me, calls this Markan post-crucifixion story, where Jesus doesn't start showing up right away and, in fact, no one is even close to ready yet to encounter the risen Jesus' "slow Easter." Good. Real commitment, real life-changing decisions don't usually happen fast. Sometimes the most important answers to the biggest questions take us a lifetime to work out.

So Mark isn't in a hurry to answer the question about who will go to Galilee to see Jesus or whether anyone will at all. He doesn't answer these questions at all. I think Mark doesn't tell us the answers to the questions he asks in his Gospel because he thinks we need to answer them for ourselves. That's why he has written this whole story. *He* believes that Jesus has been raised and is no longer entombed, that his truth could not be buried, that God vindicated Jesus~ the one who proclaimed the good news of God, the one who enacted God's kingdom. He believes this because he has already gone to Galilee, *but he knows that everyone must experience this truth for themselves*.

Will we go to Galilee? That is, will we leave the tomb and move on to the "place" of God's good news, where so much that is hard to understand actually happens: where true healing occurs, and the hungry eat in a fellowship meal, and the powerful and rich are challenged? Will we journey to a place where sins are forgiven, and the first are last and the last are first? He has gone to Galilee ahead of us. Will we follow him? Maybe we won't. But maybe we will. That's as yet to be determined. But if we do, **there we will see him.** That promise, the promise of Easter, is sure. Amen.

Trusting God's promise of new life, we pray for the renewal of the church, the world, and all of creation.




