Sermon: Deacon Patsy Glista

Grace to you, peace and love from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Our second scripture reading this morning is from Paul's first letter to the early church in Corinth. Verses 4 – 13 are frequently used at weddings. People in general are drawn to the text – maybe because it is at first brush, what I would call, 'a feel good' text. It talks about love after all. This text hangs on my wall at home, lovingly cross-stitched by my mother and gifted over 30 years ago. I wonder how many couples ever go back and read and reflect on this scripture text after the wedding. While many choose to have it read at their marriage, Paul did not write his first letter to the Corinthians for someone's wedding, nor do I plan to talk about marriage today.

I have always been intrigued by the first verse, "If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal." It makes me wonder if Paul used these words in an attempt to gain the attention of the congregation's members. The vision that comes to my mind is my young son marching through the house with a kitchen pot and wooden spoon; the clanging and banging never failed to get attention.

What do we know about the people of this early mission church in Corinth? A port city on the Mediterranean Sea, Corinth had often over the years clashed with Rome. Ultimately Corinth was destroyed in 146 BC by the Romans and then laid uninhabited for nearly a century until 44 BC when Julius Caesar, probably understanding its importance as a seaport to the Roman Empire, re-founded the city. It grew rapidly and by the time of Paul's visit, Corinth was the largest and most flourishing center in south Greece. Compare its growth to that which took place in our nation after World War II, when housing blossomed almost overnight and manufacturing boomed. Surrounded by grain fields, olive groves and grape vineyards the city also had great diversity. Its residents included sailors, businessmen and government officials. The biannual Isthmian games in honor of the sea god Poseidon were held in Corinth as well, bringing Greeks from far and wide to the area. A booming community, but also a place of much diversity and often societal corruption.

Paul comes to this community preaching the 'good news' and Jesus' message of salvation, encouraging the people to set aside their differences and talking about love that bears all things, believes all things and never ends. Obviously, there were at least some to whom this message resonated as an early mission church had been established. But there were disagreements. Several church leaders had ministered among the people including Paul,

Peter and Apollos. There were those in the congregation who were loyal to Paul, those who believed loyalty to Peter was key and those who were Apollos' loyal followers. Think how all this displaced loyalty may have divided the congregation! Additionally, the members weren't especially good about following the guidelines of the church, maybe missing weekly worship, not joining in the communion meal – we don't really know specifics. Basically, the influences of their surroundings pulled them in many directions so that their loyalties weren't first to Jesus Christ and their faith community; much like the world we live in – especially over the past two years. All sorts of things have pulled us collectively as a nation and individually, from one direction to another – vaccinate or don't vaccinate, speak out about increased violence or just stay away from it are two examples that come to mind. The happenings around us, whether we agree or disagree with them pull us and compete for our time, sometimes taking us away from or causing us to act in ways that may not reflect the love of Christ.

So, Paul begins, "If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal." His message speaks of love, but not the love of flowery poems and roses; it is a message of love shown by actions; love demonstrated, at times, by walking into the weeds. Having in the previous verses laid out all the various kinds of gifts for ministry that God gifts believers with, Paul now moves to help the Corinth church and us understand what the true focus of the church is, 'works of love,' or as Paul says 'a more excellent way.' In the first three verses of our text, Paul indicates that being able to speak in tongues, having prophetic powers, or all knowledge, or faith sufficient to move mountains, even the willingness to give away all our possessions, gains nothing if we do not have love – we are just a noisy gong or clanging cymbal. He wants the church members to understand that sharing the love of Christ is the most important thing, and it is a love we put into action.

In the next verses Paul shares with us what love must do or not do instead of what love is. He doesn't describe it as an abstract, feel good, word, but rather a word of solid action. In Greek there are several different words for various kinds of love, unlike our English where 'love' is the only word, so Paul's description is helpful in broadening our understanding of what it means to love as faithful followers of Christ. There are actually 15 action verbs in total in Paul's message – 7 of these describe what love must do – 'be patient, to be kind, to rejoice in the truth, to bear all things, to believe all things, to hope all things,' and 'to endure all things.' The other eight action verbs have to do with what love should not do – 'not to envy, not to boast, not to be arrogant, not to be rude, not to seek its own way, not be to irritable, not to be resentful, and not to rejoice in wrongdoing.'

I don't know about you, but for me on any given day, any one of these action verbs can provide a challenge, whether things love is to do or things love is not to do. We just went through the holiday season – even waiting for your computer to work quicker while on-line shopping has potential to create impatience, to say nothing of finding out what you want is on backorder. A few years back Norm and I, returning home from Colorado, got stuck in Detroit for an extra day amid freezing rain and sleet. Like thousands of others, we were tired, sometimes hungry, uncomfortable and cold. That is an experience that can easily lend itself to being irritable, and even rude; one of those hard to 'bear all things' experiences. I observed plenty of rude people as we were booked, rebooked and rebooked again, hoping to get on a flight home. But I also saw lots of patience – pilots unable to fly their planes helping out at gate desks to answer passenger questions. And there was the gentle, kind voice of the wheelchair transport person who waited over 45 minutes with us outside in the cold trying to get us on a hotel shuttle.

What would it look like for us to act in love? I don't think it looks like the casually spoken, "I love Bagel Grove bagels," or "I love my favorite TV show, MASH." What would it look like to be patient, even when one has waited too long at the doctors; to be kind, even when the cashier at the store is grousing at us; to rejoice in the truth, even when we don't feel joy; to bear all things, even when a situation feels unbearable; to believe all things or to hope all things even when the situation feels hopeless? This is a feeling in our hearts so strong about sharing the love of Christ that we are willing to speak up about injustices we see. Maybe it is feeling Christ's love so strongly that we can listen patiently and hear with love the views of those who think differently than we do, rather than talking over the person or insisting that our view is the only right one.

Paul's more 'excellent way' of love in all things is a tough pill to swallow but, we have that spoon full of sugar to help it go down – the love of Jesus Christ. His message to the Corinthians and to us today, is that no matter how we came to be a part of the faith community and no matter our differences or diversities, we all believe in and follow the same Jesus Christ; we all receive the Holy Spirit in our baptism, share in the bread and wine and participate in Christ's work. And no matter the diversity in our communities or different ideologies, we know that we have a God who unequivably loves all of the human race, all of creation. God's love isn't measured by any human standard. It is love that never ends or as Rev. Matt Skinner says 'a love that never falls down, never stumbles, never chokes up and won't flop.' The answer when we don't hear what we want to hear isn't to throw the person over the cliff, or 'under the bus,' but rather to speak and act in

and with love. God's love is the very same unconditional love that chose the widows, the weak and foolish, sick and the lame; a love so strong that God sacrificed his only Son for our salvation. First and foremost, it is Jesus Christ's example of love in action that the Corinthians, and we, are to follow - not Paul, Apollos or the latest social media or newest technological promotion.

God's love encourages us and calls us forward into the unknown and at times into murky waters where, like Jeremiah, we may prefer not to go. It is a love that calls us to follow Jesus' example and willingly seek to love and care for each other. It a world seemingly filled with arrogance, selfishness, violence, poverty and hostility, we are called to act in love with patience, seeking to grow in faith, hope and love – in our relationships with one another, in our actions and with our Lord and Savior. Colin Raye has a song called Love Remains. It speaks to the stages of life that at times are filled with tears and sweat, shared joy and shared pain. At the end of each verse is the line, 'through it all love remains.' This is the good news of the love of Christ – through all of our trials, tribulations, good times and bad, times of prosperity and times of pandemics, God's love remains ever constant and unconditional. As we continue our Epiphany journey in the light of Christ, may God's love be the flame that shows the way and guides our words and actions. Amen.



Since we have such great hope in your promises, O God, we lift these and all of our prayers to you in confidence and faith; through Jesus Christ our Savior. **Amen.**


