A Few Words From Pastor David

I want to begin by extending a deep and heartfelt thanks to all those who made the journey to 751 South St. in Utica on June 24th at 4:00 p.m. for our joint worship service with Hope Chapel A.M.E. Zion church. Admittedly, I am biased, but I think it was a great experience. I would encourage you to ask those who attended for their thoughts. (FYI -I was told the service was recorded and will be posted on Hope Chapel's Facebook page in the near future in case you want to see it.) Thank you Karen Toepp for providing an opening prayer, Linda Lambe for coordinating our choir members, choir members for joining with Hope Chapel's choir, and indeed to everyone who showed up, and/or stayed for dinner, and/or brought food. Most importantly, though, I want to thank you all for taking a risk. It was very brave of you to go to an unfamiliar place, to worship with an unfamiliar group, in an unfamiliar style. You went into the great unknown, and really walked out in faith. Thank you so much for taking such a big risk. I am deeply grateful and very humbled! I truly think we have opened the door and started the process of beginning a relationship with the very good and fine folks at this historic African-American church. As a next step in this process, I have invited Hope Chapel to come and worship with us. The date and time are still to be determined, but it is my sincere hope that if you are available, you will choose to attend. I'm confident you will be richly rewarded by the experience. June 24th was the start of something very good. (2)

A second point I want to raise up is transportation. I am aware of several individuals who need transportation to church on Sun. morning and for other events. Some of our people have been giving rides already (Thank you!!), but we still have need for others to do so. Plus, it would be good if we could have others give our current drivers a break and/or cover for them if they can't drive on a particular Sun. or to a particular event. Be that as it may, there is a sign-up sheet in the Narthex at the church for people who are willing and able to provide transportation and for people who need it. Please consider whether this might be a ministry the Spirit is calling you to perform. (Reminder – there are sign-up sheets in the Narthex for other ways you can fulfill your call to ministry.) If you can't get to church to sign up, please call us and we'd be happy to put your name on the list as either a driver or a rider. Thank you.

Finally, I realize it summertime and many of you take this as an opportunity to get away and to be outdoors. This is good as we all need to refresh ourselves, recharge our batteries, and take in God's wonderful, awe-inspiring world. I wish you well and pray for your safe travels. When you are around, please come to worship as your presence positively affects the worship experience for all of us. If you're not here for worship, stop in some other time. I'd love to see you and visit with you. Also, please try to check in periodically because there will be much activity and planning occurring over the next couple of months, and we want you to be included and/or aware of what is happening. We will try to inform you, but you also need to try to stay informed. As you know, communication is essential, but it is also a two-way street.

Thank you again for the privilege of being your pastor. As I said to the folks at Hope Chapel yesterday, you are a great congregation and I am truly blessed to be your pastor. Have a fantastic summer. Be safe and know that you are in my prayers, wherever you may be.

Vígnettes from Zíon's Hístory: Congregational Pícnics

Picnics were once a regular part of Zion Church's calendar. Usually held in July, these outings gave members an opportunity to escape Utica's oppressive summer heat and experience a day of relaxation, fun, and fellowship in the neighboring, cooler countryside.

Until mass production made automobiles affordable in the 1920s, Zion's flock relied on trolley and railroad transportation to reach their picnic destinations. Utica's Inter-urban Trolley Company capitalized off city dwellers' desire to break away from their sweltering summer routines. The company built Summit Park in Oriskany on their trolley line's western end and Utica Park, at the site of the old Chicago Pneumatic factory in Frankfort, at the eastern terminus. Both parks, with carnival rides, picnic grounds, and plenty of shade, attracted crowds. The company's New York Mills line connected with that village's parks, and a South Utica branch led to Casino Park, off Oneida Street, another popular destination.

Zion held picnics at all of these locations, and at others. The earliest recorded congregational picnics occurred in 1873 and 1875 at French's Grove, a facility near the site of today's Chanatry's Supermarket. In 1876, Zion's members patronized Palmer's Grove, Frankfort. Our people frequented Utica Park in 1896, Wilson's Grove in New York Mills in 1904 and 1910, and Forest Park in 1920, all of which were near the trolley lines. Utica's trolley company added cars on each of these days to accommodate 500+ Zionites.

Railroads also provided transportation to picnic destinations. In 1880, Zion's Young Men's Society started a tradition of summer outings at the Lake House on Canadarago Lake, Richfield Springs. These picnics, which were celebrant, "wet" affairs, lasted through 1920. The Young Men even brought their own music. A Utica paper noted, in June 1902: "The excursionists returned at nine o'clock in the evening and, headed by Schremp's band, marched up Genesee Street and over Columbia to the School Hall." The Delaware, Lackawanna, and Western Railroad (D.L.&W.) ran daily passenger trains from Utica's Union Station to Richfield. In July 1892, the Young Men's Society filled eight cars for their picnic.

Trenton Falls, north of Utica, was a very popular 19th century tourist attraction and Madison Lake, near that Madison County village, boasted a small resort in the early 20th century. Zion's Sunday school teachers used trains to reach both communities. A paper reported that, at Madison Lake, on July 31, 1903: "Dancing was enjoyed by Zion's faculty and the Germania Orchestra furnished the music. Boating, fishing, and other sports were also indulged in. Prior to leaving, the teachers sang a favorite Sunday school hymn, accompanied by the orchestra."

Zion's picnics were superbly organized events, with numerous committees assigned to details. At the 1920 outing, for example, the *Frauenverein* (Ladies Aid) cooked dinner and supper. Over 100 members volunteered for committees that took responsibility for music, ice cream, soft drinks and candy, policing the picnic grounds, games and prizes, and transportation. This meticulous organizing often led to tidy profits. The 1879 picnic netted \$118 (\$3,168 in 2017 dollars), while the 1904 event earned \$150 (\$4153 today).

Vignettes from Zion's History: Congregational Picnics

Some Zion picnics began with impressive ceremonies. A Utica paper described the 1896 excursion: "The societies of Zion's German Lutheran Church formed a procession, headed by Marshal George Steinbecker, and marched up Columbia Street to Varick, over Varick to Court, out Court to Saratoga, and over Saratoga to Columbia, thence to Bleecker Street, where they boarded trolley cars for the Utica Park. In the line of march were the Sunday school, Young People's Society, Young Ladies' Society, Young Men's Society, and the women's organizations of the church. The Old Utica Band furnished music for marching, and at the park. A large number of people sought the coolness of the park this afternoon and witnessed the athletic events and other unique contests."

Autos and buses had replaced railroad and trolley transportation by the late 1930s. In response, Pastor Nolte organized car pools at picnic times. In another change, Trenton Assembly Park became a regular picnic site after 1938. This park, located on Route 28 in Barneveld, was started in the 1860s as the "Trenton Falls Camp Meeting Association" and was affiliated with the Methodist Church. A "tabernacle" on park grounds was used for revivals. When the name was changed to Trenton Assembly Park in 1911, the Methodists built a dormitory and dining hall to augment their facility. Chautau-

qua-like summer sessions were held during the 1930s and 1940s.

As time passed, the park's religious purpose faded and properties were sold to non-Methodists. Pastor John and Marie Sprock, and Zion members Earl and Teddi Pierson, for example, owned camps there. For a nominal fee, our church rented the park, which was ideal for picnics. Memories of these events endure. Carl Schmitt recalled participating in softball contests and three-legged sack races, among other games. Fran and Claudia King remembered the delicious covered dish supper, preceded by devotions that brought the crowd together in late afternoon. And Gene and Linda White laughed as they recalled how every year, in the spirit of Zion's Young Men of old, a number of male members left the picnic for an hour in midafternoon to investigate the "refreshments" offered by the Mapledale Hotel in Barneveld.

Picnics have occasionally been held since 1970. Pr. Paul Joslyn, Parish Coordinator Helga Morrison, and their sesquicentennial committee Members of Zion's Young Men's Society at their annual picnic, around 1915 organized an event in 1992.



Anne McCarthy chaired the picnic committee for our 175th anniversary celebration last year, when our congregation gathered at the Kirkland Town Park.


