# Zion's News & Notes

### A Few Words From Pastor David

One requirement of my Call Agreement was that Zion establish a Mutual Ministry Team (MMT). In March we fulfilled this requirement by forming a MMT made up of Shirley Eadline, Scott Gwilt, Bob and Bonnie Loomis, Mark Thompson, and me. A primary purpose of the MMT is to

enhance communication between the congregation and me, the pastor, as it is well known that good communication must be a high priority for an organization such as ours that is going through changes and transformation. It is hoped that if anyone has a concern about the changes, or the transformation, and they do not feel they can approach and speak directly with me, they can express their concern to a member of the MMT, who can then bring it to the MMT where it can be addressed. The operative assumption being that this will enable us to address any concern while it is still at a low level of intensity, before it escalates and erupts.

In addition, we also envision the MMT as another vehicle for enhancing Zion's ministry, a ministry we share, a ministry I consider to be truly mutual. (It is important to note that the MMT does not replace any of the Council's work or its crucial leadership role, but rather supplements it.) The MMT will periodically solicit your input regarding the many and different areas of Zion's ministry with the first such question asking how we can improve our mutual ministry. We want to ask this first because we want to include you, the congregation, at the very beginning of the process and allow you to have input into the areas we will address. In other words, we want to include you in setting the agenda. So, when you see requests for input from the MMT in the bulletin or the newsletter, please respond. We really do want to know what you think and how we can better work together to more fully live out Zion's call to Christ's mission and ministry.

Finally, it may be helpful to repeat that one of the foundational texts for my understanding of pastoral ministry is Ephesians 4:11-12 where Paul writes: *The gifts Christ gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the people for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ.* I sincerely believe we are all called to, and gifted for, ministry and we have this ministry together, mutually. So, if you have an idea of how we can build up this body of Christ, aka. Zion, and more effectively carry out Christ's mission and ministry, please let me or one of the members of the MMT or the Council know. Thank you for the privilege and honor of letting me join you on your and Zion's journey in faith.

# Vignettes From Zion's History: Pastor John Henry Sprock and the New Zion: Part I

The Rev. John Henry Sprock officially succeeded Edmund Bosch on February 1, 1950. He served until 1971. Zion's congregation made its exodus from the old German neighborhood in West Utica to suburban New Hartford during the Sprock era. This move greatly enhanced our church's potential for growth.

Born in Jersey City, New Jersey, in 1905, Pastor Sprock possessed the most unique lineage of Zion's ministers. His mother, Anna Louise Kupker, was the daughter of William and Anna Kupker, working class Germans who immigrated here in the 1860s. Anna may have named Zion's future pastor for her brothers, John and Henry. The pastor's father, James Francis Sprock, was born "Jaime Francisco" in Cuba in 1866. James' father was Juan Herberto August Guillermo Sprock (John Herbert August William - "August," for short), an import/export merchant in Cuba and, later, Curacao, a Dutch colony in the Caribbean. August immigrated to the United States around 1880 and settled in Jersey City. His father was Cornelius Janszoon Sprock, a wealthy Netherlander who owned three plantations on Curacao in the mid-19th century.

James Francis Sprock and Anna Kupker married in 1888. The union produced eleven children; John Henry was the eighth. His younger brother, Arthur (b. 1908), also became a minister - in the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church of Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Censuses revealed that James Francis labored as a milk dealer, house painter, railroad conductor and, in 1930, a "helper at a gas station." The 1940 records stated that he hadn't held a job in a decade. Pastor Sprock's youngest sister, Marie Wilhelmina (b. 1915), was a stenographer at Metropolitan Insurance. She supported her parents during the Great Depression.

John Sprock excelled at Dickenson High School in Jersey City and was admitted to Wittenberg College in Springfield, Ohio, in 1924. After graduating in 1928 as an education major, he enrolled at Wittenberg's Hamma Theological Seminary and completed his Bachelor of Divinity studies in May 1931. Sprock financed his education by working off-campus in Springfield and through a generous Wittenberg program whereby, if an undergraduate declared for the Lutheran ministry, the college loaned him support from a trust fund. After ordination, the debt was forgiven.

He was ordained on October 22, 1931, at the Ohio Synod's annual meeting, held at the United Lutheran Church of New Philadelphia. Prior to this, he served as student pastor of Calvary Church in Springfield and was named "pastor of the charge" there following his graduation from Hamma. Grace Lutheran in North Tonawanda extended Sprock his first call in 1932. He ministered in greater Buffalo until 1940, when he accepted an offer from Epiphany Lutheran in the Bronx. His tenure in New York City lasted until our congregation approved his candidacy in 1950.

John Sprock married Wittenberg classmate Marie Stuckey at her parents' home in Wauseon, Ohio, in 1932. The couple had no children. Marie was a high school English teacher at Utica Free Academy for two decades. During the Sprocks' years at Zion, she was active in all women's organizations, sang in the choir, and accompanied John to Luther League events, among other activities. Like Elizabeth Wetzel, Margaret Nolte, and Peggy Joslyn, Marie Stuckey Sprock was an invaluable partner in her husband's ministry.

Pastor Sprock played important roles in Lutheran synods. While in Buffalo, he served as Vice-President of the Western Conference of the New York Synod. During his Bronx ministry, he was President of the New York City Conference and, in his Zion years, he was President of the Central Conference. He served as President of the Synod's Board of Religious Education and chaired several committees. Sprock strongly believed in interdenominational cooperation and was elected president of the Councils of Churches at Buffalo, the Bronx, and Utica (Zion Pastors William Nolte and Edmund Bosch also served as presidents of Utica's Council in 1933 and 1949, respectively).

In 1952, during Sprock's leadership of the Utica Council of Churches, he persuaded Zion member Olga Geiger Long to apply for the organization's office administrator's position. Olga's professionalism earned respect and admiration throughout the area. When she retired in 1980, Utica Mayor Stephen Pawlinga declared October 23 "Olga Long Day" and the Council of Churches honored her exemplary service at their annual banquet, held at Zion.

# Vignettes From Zion's History - Continued

John Sprock's belief in interdenominational cooperation led to his strong advocacy of Utica's ecumenical movement. He was appointed to the Council of Churches' Ecumenical Committee in 1951; that group's work brought about several unity Reformation services among Utica's Protestant churches. The committee's crowning glories occurred from 1966 until 1972, when it persuaded the Syracuse Diocese of the Roman Catholic Church to allow its Utica parishes to join their Protestant brethren for services under the banner: "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: That They May Be One." On January 20, 1967, Pastor Sprock preached at Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Utica, an event that would have been unthinkable two years prior. Three days later, our church hosted a unity service conducted by Baptist, Reformed, and Presbyterian ministers, two Roman Catholic priests, and opened by our pastor. Worshippers filled the nave, balcony, narthex, and overflowed into the Fireside Room for this historic event. These joint services were replaced in 1973 and 1974 by "pulpit exchanges," where priests and ministers preached in their counterparts' sanctuaries. After its glory years, Utica's ecumenical movement faded to memory.

Hartwick recognized Pastor Sprock's achievements and awarded him a Doctor of Divinity degree in 1956. In conjunction, Sprock preached the baccalaureate sermon for the college's graduating class. Among the honorary degree recipients that year was New York's Attorney General Jacob Javits, who later served in the United States Senate.

Changes occurred during Sprock's early years at Zion. The pastor started what must be considered our church's most unique ministry: "Drive-in Lutheranism." Sunday services were held during the summers of 1951 and 1952 at the WGAT Drive-in Movie Theatre on Commercial Drive in New Hartford. Although these events attracted sizable crowds, the church barely broke even. Some folks loved the alternative worship, however. When the Council announced that the 1951 rites ran a \$10 deficit, a member who enjoyed the fresh air liturgy sent Zion a check to cover the "debt."

The pastor rekindled a variation of a John Philip Lichtenberg custom when he started "Memorial Cross Sunday" in May 1951. On Children's Day in June 1880, Lichtenberg initiated a practice whereby the little ones paraded around Zion's nave carrying bouquets of flowers. They placed the sprays in openings on a large cross, creating a magnificent display. John Sprock's cross held over two hundred red and white carnations, each one purchased as a memorial to Zion's members' loved ones. This tradition continued throughout his pastorate.

A small Latvian Lutheran population immigrated to Utica after World War II. When the Rev. Theodore Zarick, of Rochester, asked to use our sanctuary for this group's worship, the Council readily agreed. Latvian Lutheran rites were held at Zion from December 1951 through February 1953. Many of these immigrants arrived in the United States through the efforts of Lutheran World Relief and were funded by families in Central New York.

Claude Zoeckler served as Council President and choir director during John Sprock's pastorate. Claude, his wife Gladys (a substitute organist at Zion), and children Claudia (King) and David, summered at their camp on Lake of the Woods, near Redwood in St. Lawrence County. They attended St. Paul's Lutheran in that community. Claude persuaded St. Paul's leadership to host our choir for weekend retreats every July during the early 1950s. This became a wonderful "choral vacation." Claudia King fondly recalled the welcoming "get together" the church held on Friday evening and the Saturday picnics at Kring's Point State Park, highlighted by luscious local cuisine. St. Paul's members opened their homes to Zion's choristers; some families gladly housed several guests. Our choir performed at the church on Saturday evening and at Sunday's service. Audrey Long Scholl remembered how choir members car-pooled for the two-hour ride to Redwood and sang favorite Lutheran hymns throughout their northerly trek.

Our congregation's greatest achievement during the Sprock era was the building of the New Hartford sanctuary. The history column in next month's newsletter discusses the relocation/construction processes, and other major events in this pastorate.


