A Few Words From Pastor David

Despite the weather, I have heard many positive comments, and encouragement to make this an annual event. We had a surprisingly good turnout, Matt Aceto stepped forward at the last

minute to provide very good music, and people contributed lots of food. Oh my, did they ever! So, thank you Ann for taking the leadership role for this, and thank you everyone for responding so well in your respective ways.

Next, I'd like to thank Jack Henke for giving his lecture A Survey History of Lutherans in the Mohawk Valley on September 23rd. 



Vignettes From Zion's History: Pastor Andrew's \$50 Windfall

Several months ago, while trolling through the historically rich Fultonhistory.com website, I discovered an article from the *Utica Daily Press* of March 15, 1910 that included a letter of appreciation written by our founding pastor, Andrew Wetzel, in 1841. The *Press* extracted the letter from an issue of the *Young Lutheran* magazine, a Missouri Synod publication.

One of Pastor Andrew's friends, the Rev. F. Frederick Winkler of St. John's Lutheran Church in Newark, New Jersey, sent Zion's father \$50. The Female Missionary Society of St. Matthew's Church, Philadelphia, gave Winkler the money "for the benefit of his congregation or of the Redeemer's Kingdom in general." Winkler understood the difficulties that Wetzel faced and wanted to help his circuit-riding comrade succeed in Upstate New York's developing frontier. Wetzel applied the funds to the construction of St. Peter's Church, Verona.

The letter is an excellent, rare example of Pastor Andrew's writing. It clearly documents the financial hardships he experienced. German immigrant churches often struggled to survive because of their parishioners' economic limitations. Indeed, throughout Zion's West Utica history, we were never a wealthy congregation and the church often scrimped to make ends meet. As late as 1952, seven years before our move to New Hartford, the Council borrowed money from a prosperous member to cover regular expenses.

But let us return to 1841 and listen to Pastor Andrew as he thanks his benefactors.

Dear Christian Friends:

Being so unexpectedly brought into connection with you, that I have thankfully to acknowledge the receipt of a sum of money that was originally not destined for me, I feel called upon to give you a short description of the circumstances that led to the appropriation of the money for my use.

Nine years ago (1832), I collected several small congregations in Oneida and Lewis Counties in the State of New York, where German emigrants had located. For several years, they were destitute of the means of grace, not having anybody to break unto them the bread of life. Under these circumstances, I settled among them, formed them into congregations, and administered to them the means of grace.

Partly by the distance in which these Germans settled, partly by the poverty by which they were pressed down, my labors among them became connected with a great many hardships. Often, yea commonly, I had to walk thirty miles from one congregation to another to preach, and the recompense for my labors did never exceed the sum of \$100 a year, from which sum I had to support a family (my wife and four children).

It was almost impossible, but He who governs the world with His mighty arm, He who knows the wants of His children, never forgot us. He gave us always our daily bread and blessed our feeble labors in His Kingdom. We saw His finger and His aiding hand so often in the hours of distress and discouragement and heard His voice say, 'I have not forgotten thee, go on in the work I have assigned to thee.'

It was in such a time of great discouragement when the Rev. Mr. Winkler, of Newark, New Jersey, handed me the above named money, granted to him by your Female Missionary Society. Everything around me seemed gloomy. Debts I had to pay, which I had contracted for the support of my family. A church was built last year in the congregation where I live (St. Peter's), and I had become personally responsible for the payment of \$150 in wages because the means of the people were exhausted. There was every prospect that the almost finished church should be taken from us and, consequently, the congregation scattered after nine years of labor.

Just at that gloomy time, I received the letter from the Rev. Mr. Winkler, who for some time had known a little of my circumstances. He informed me that he had a small sum of money yet, which he did think to apply in the spirit of its generous donors. Thus, he gave it to me. It was intended for his congregation, and they were in debt yet, but he believed they would by exertion be able to go along now to build a new German Evangelical Lutheran Church in Brooklyn, Long Island, last winter, and spend that \$50 for their cause. Circumstances, however, delayed the establishment of that congregation until the present time.

Mr. Winkler, therefore, thought of me. Thanks to God, our Redeemer, that He sent help when my heart would sink within me in despair. Thanks to you, dear Christian friends, for your zeal and contributions in His cause. You must feel now, indeed, that it is blessed to give. Go on in your holy works!

I shall go on in the same works, so much more encouraged, and shall always feel thankful to God that my lot has been in the Evangelical Lutheran Church that counts yet so many congregations and societies and members who are warm and zealous in the cause of the Lord.

Zion Endowment Fund

INTRODUCTION

Zion's Endowment Fund was established in 1985 for the purpose of enhancing the mission outreach of Zion Lutheran Church apart from the general operations of the congregation. The Fund welcomes gifts from Zion and Utica community members. Gifts can consist of memorials, bequests in wills, charitable remainder and other trusts, charitable gift annuities, assignment of life insurance and transfer of property, such as cash, stocks, bonds, or real estate. To-date, most gifts have been from bequests in wills. Planned giving is one method of providing end of life gifting of one's wealth to the Zion Endowment Fund.

YEARLY DISTRIBUTIONS

The Endowment Fund by-laws require that yearly distributions be made from the Fund. The distributions are divided among the following: one-quarter each to; community outreach, missions of the ELCA, special ministries of Zion Lutheran Church and Zion capital projects. The Endowment Fund Committee makes recommendations to the Church Council and Zion's congregation concerning the charitable distributions. Some past recipients include; Community Food Bank, Your Neighbors, Family Nurturing Center, Canstruction, Lutheran Homes Foundation, and Vanderkamp.

HISTORY OF GIFTS RECEIVED AND DISTRIBUTIONS

In the nearly thirty years of its existence, the Endowment Fund has received gifts and bequests of about \$160,000. Over this same period, distributions from the Fund now exceed \$250,000. The Endowment Fund expects to distribute approximately \$10,740 this year.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO FUND ARE WELCOME

Contributions to the Zion Endowment Fund need not be just in the form of bequests in wills or trusts. Cash or checks, in any amount, in memory of a loved one or in honor of someone special, would be appropriate and welcomed. Our hopes and expectations are that additional gifts, coupled with Fund earnings, will cause the Fund value to increase so that Zion may play an ever-larger part in fulfilling its mission in the world. Your endowment gift would be a part of that process.

HOW TO APPLY FOR A DISTRIBUTION FROM ZION'S ENDOWMENT FUND

During the month of October, Zion's Endowment Fund Committee announces in the weekly church bulletin at Sunday worship services and in its monthly congregational newsletter that it has funds available for its annual distribution to charitable organizations. To be considered for a distribution, charitable organizations are required to submit a Grant Application Form to Zion Lutheran Church (Endowment Fund), 630 French Rd, New Hartford, NY 13413 or E-mail (with Subject Endowment Fund) to Office@ZionLuth.com, describing your organization and a brief explanation of what the funds will be used for. Please follow the format and guidelines specified on the Zion Grant Application Form. *Deadline for receipt of the Grant Application Form is November 1*.

The Endowment Fund Committee meets in early November to prayerfully decide on the recipients of a distribution from the Endowment Fund. The recipients are notified by letter, in late November, and checks are distributed late November – early December.


