THE WORD

First Reading: Psalm23

Second Reading: Philippians 4:1-9

Sermon: Joy, Life Lived in Excess -Pr. Eldon DeWeerth

I am joyful and pleased to be here again with the friends in Zion community. I know we are still only communicating on-line by pictures, yet we share the common need to gather, to worship together and to focus on God's words, and to pray - for our community, the needs of others, and our national world. Even in the absence of a pastor, all these things are important for all of us. I will also be back one more time in November.

After I looked at the texts for this Sunday, I felt drawn to two of the scripture readings. I felt called to focus on only those two today. These two are so inspiring to me. They gave me joy & hope even in the overwhelming impact of the pandemic on all of us; the resulting difficulties brought about in our nation by endemic racism; climate change; and the California fires; the tearing apart of our culture & society by divisive political turmoil. We are not forgetting actions which are tearing down our democracy. I found myself lifted again by the "Good News" of God's Word that can fill us and leave us with joy, peace, and hope for Zion's future. These two portions of the scripture are:

- * The great comforting and fortifying words of Psalm 23, associated with David -
- * The inspiring love letter of St. Paul to the Philippians with the moving insights he has about Jesus and His meaning for our situation.

This Sunday, we have the opportunity to focus on the deep fears, pain, suffering, and conflicts which face us, our nation, & the world. We need to turn to our God for care, hope, and loving support. We need to ask how we can turn our worry to joy. But can we?

Psalm 23 is referred to as a trust psalm. A trust psalm expresses faith and confidence in God amid great difficulties, threats, and dangers. This psalm has been used time and again. We turn to it in times of death. I am sure I have recited its words at the bedsides of the dying, in funeral/memorial services. My guess is it has been used by nurses and caregivers thousands of times during the pandemic. These beautiful words are often in our common memories.

As we recall this psalm, we do trust our God who provides us with all that we need - in so many ways, whatever our age, we need nourishment and guidelines for our lives. God is there for us. We trust our Lord and Savior. Our lives are flooded with the benefits of grace and hope every day. We need goodness and mercy with friends and enemies. We must have a safe house in the pandemic. Our home is with our God. The deep love, care, support, and wisdom that we see in the 23rd Psalm are passed along to strengthen and guide the church and its members. Psalm 23's foundation of trust is passed along to Paul and the young church in Philippi. One thousand years later, Paul writes a soaringly beautiful letter based on trust in Christ. He seeks to lift the spirits of the young congregation that he started and cares for. Now Paul sees that they are in trouble, but he is in prison facing a death penalty for preaching the gospel, he can't be with them, so he writes. It is hard to see how his words can be so moving, joy filled, & caring in those circumstances.

One brief comment. I am using only a small part of the Book of Philippians. I encourage you to read the whole short book in whatever version you have. Paul's general message is that he wants his readers to know Christ, to draw always on Christ's resurrection, to know Christ's suffering for them and to become more like Christ. It is interesting that Paul begins his message to the Philippians by sharing a long list of his credentials as an apostle of Christ. Yet what he wants them & us to see in him, is that Christ is the source of his joy, peace, & hope. He wants them & us to remember that we are baptized into Christ and called to fully know Christ's resurrection, his suffering for us, and also, like Paul, reach to become more like Christ in our calling as disciples. Paul challenges us to not see our worth in achievement, our position as leaders or followers, or having the most things in life. He calls us to have the mind to think & act like Christ.

What Paul is discerning for the body of Christ the Church is to have a heart and trust in God, who is at work in every person and congregation. In this letter of hope and joy, Paul invites his readers to "complete my joy". Be of the same mind in Christ, have the same Love in Christ. Our text today seems to point us to the discovery that these intentions are our source of joy. Yet Paul is not writing this on an especially good day. From prison, Paul tries to resolve a church fight. The old saying goes that no one ever wins a church Fight. Two women are fighting (I didn't make it up - 2 women - Paul did). Two esteemed leaders in the congregation & colleagues of Paul are having differences. Paul does not want to settle it & identify the issues. He just says they need to resolve their differences - and asks them to "Be of the same mind in the Lord." (These questions arise in all congregations - are there differences between people & mission? Does Zion have any unresolved differences during this vacancy?)

The text points out that the need for love and joy resides in all our souls and struggles to come out. Paul's joy springs out of God's gift in Jesus Christ and our desire to be filled with this same joy. It is this "spilling out" quality of Christ's life, death, & resurrection that accounts for the sense that brings us to a place that we can have that joy that life is filled to overflowing in who we are, what we do, and how we interact with others. This excess is the overflow of what cannot be contained within any one person. [The Message] Joy is Life in excess. This drives "a sense of all God's wholeness, in Christ, everything coming together for good; will come to settle us down. It's wonderful what happens when Christ displaces worry at the center of your life." [The Message] This can be a great motivator for generosity, for hospitality, for the need to reach out, and to act for others' needs.

I am faced with the question: what is the center of my life? Worry or Joy? What about your center? In the midst of all this pandemic (7 million cases of covid19, 200,000+ deaths); environmental disasters; long overdue racial issues; a divisive election; I hope for us to attend to these worries within ourselves and with others and hope that our hunger for joy is exposed.

We then can find a calm space and the will to come together, then to find and see the heart and mind for common ground and complete a new sense of joy together. The truth is that we badly need to see Paul's words to the Philippians as a call for our congregations and Christians all to embrace his list of challenges for us. How could you achieve these?

- having the same mind in Christ
- standing firm
- reconcile when there is disagreement
- having the same Love
- always rejoice
- don't be afraid of challenges
- don't worry Christ is near
- don't be afraid God is with us
- remember the peace of God which passes all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus

Let the people say with joy, AMEN, Let It Be So.

Candy Corn Popcorn Balls

Prep time: 15 minutes, Ready in 15 minutes, Makes 15 Servings

Ingredients:

½ cup butter or margarine

1 (10.5 oz) bag JET-PUFFED miniature marshmallows

1 (3 ounce) package JELLO Brand Gelatin, any flavor

12 cups (3 qts) popped popcorn

1-cup candy corn

Directions:

- 1. Microwave butter and marshmallows in large microwavable bowl on HIGH 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 minutes or until marshmallows are puffed. Stir in gelatin until well mixed.

ZION ENDOWMENT FUND ANNUAL DISTRIBUTION FOR 2020

Zion's Endowment Fund has approximately \$15,300 available for distribution in 2020. One fourth of the total distribution will go to each of the following categories:

- (1) Community outreach programs
- (2) Special ministries of Zion
- (3) Missions of the ELCA
- (4) Zion Capital Projects

Deadline for receipt of the form is November 1, 2020. All applications will be considered at the November 2020 Endowment Committee meeting. Recipients will be notified in writing and checks will be sent in late November/early December 2020.

ZION ENDOWMENT FUND OVERVIEW

Zion's Endowment Fund was established in 1985 for the purpose of enhancing the mission outreach of Zion Lutheran Church apart from the general operations of the congregation. The Fund welcomes gifts from Zion and Utica community members. Gifts can consist of memorials, bequests in wills, charitable remainder and other trusts, charitable gift annuities, assignment of life insurance and transfer of property, such as cash, stocks, bonds, or real estate. To-date, most gifts have been from bequests in wills. Planned giving is one method of providing end of life gifting of one's wealth to the Zion Endowment Fund.

YEARLY DISTRIBUTIONS

The Endowment Fund by-laws require that yearly distributions be made from the Fund. The distributions are divided among the following: one-quarter each to; community outreach, missions of the ELCA, special ministries of Zion Lutheran Church and Zion capital projects. The Endowment Fund Committee makes recommendations to the Church Council and Zion's congregation concerning the charitable distributions. Some past recipients include; Community Food Bank, Your Neighbors, Family Nurturing Center, Canstruction, Lutheran Homes Foundation, Vanderkamp, KEYS Program and Foothills Rural Community Ministry.

HISTORY OF GIFTS RECEIVED AND DISTRIBUTIONS

In the thirty-five years of its existence, the Endowment Fund has received gifts and bequests of about \$200,000. Over this same period, distributions from the Fund now exceed \$280,000. The Endowment Fund expects to distribute approximately \$15,300 this year.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE FUND ARE WELCOME

Contributions to the Zion Endowment Fund need not be just in the form of bequests in wills or trusts. Cash or checks, in any amount, in memory of a loved one or in honor of someone special, would be appropriate and welcomed. Our hopes and expectations are that additional gifts, coupled with Fund earnings, will cause the Fund value to increase so that Zion may play an ever-larger part in fulfilling its mission in the world. Your endowment gift would be a part of that process.
