It is always good to know what is happening, and what actions are being taken, in the different expressions of the church (i.e., Churchwide, Synod, and Conference) as we are in ministry together. Notably, the social statement "*Faith, Sexism and Justice: A Call to Action*" was approved. A small group of us read and discussed this statement in June and agreed it would be good to expand the discussion, including how to implement the statement. I encourage everyone to read it (it's available from the church office) and try to participate in the To Be Determined discussions. 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly summary of actions

CHICAGO – Gathering under the theme "We are church," voting members of the 2019 Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) made a number of key decisions to further the mission and ministry of this church. The assembly, the chief legislative authority of the church, met Aug. 5-10 at the Wisconsin Center in Milwaukee. More than 900 voting members:

- Reelected on the first ballot the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton to a six-year term as ELCA presiding bishop.
- Elected Deacon Sue Rothmeyer to a six-year term as ELCA secretary. Rothmeyer, currently serving as executive for administration with the Office of the Secretary will begin her term Nov. 1.
- Approved the social statement "*Faith, Sexism and Justice: A Call to Action*" and its implementing resolutions. The social statement, in part, names patriarchy and sexism as sins and calls the church to action on a range of issues, including gender-based violence, workplace discrimination and economic inequality.
- Adopted "A Declaration of Inter-Religious Commitment," which will serve as church policy for inter-religious relations. The policy statement was adopted with the witness of 39 ecumenical and inter-religious guests in attendance.
- Adopted the "Strategy Toward Authentic Diversity in the ELCA," which consists of a report and recommendations on how the ELCA exhibits authentic diversity and formulates goals for racial diversity and inclusion.
- Witnessed the presentation of the "Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent," which was accepted by the Rev. Lamont A. Wells, president of the African Descent Lutheran Association (ADLA), and members of ADLA.
- Adopted 26 memorials *en bloc*, ranging in topics from gun violence to engagement in the Holy Land and gender identity to seminary tuition.
- Adopted a memorial that affirms the ELCA's long-standing commitment to migrants and refugees and declares the ELCA a sanctuary church body. [Note Bishop Macholz has issued a pastoral letter regarding this memorial. His letter is available from the church office and is posted on our Facebook page.]
- Adopted a memorial that calls for the development of a social statement and social message on the relationship of church and state.

- Adopted a memorial to encourage all synods and congregations to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the ELCA's ordination of women in 2020, the 40th anniversary of the ordination of women of color in the Lutheran tradition and the 10th anniversary of the ELCA's decision to remove barriers to ordination for people in same-gender relationships.
- Adopted a memorial to support the vision and goals of the Poor People's Campaign that align with the ELCA's social teachings.
- Adopted a series of amendments to the "Constitutions, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America," including one that makes ordination the entrance rite for ministers of Word and Service, and one to no longer count deacons as laypeople for representational principles.
- Adopted a resolution that committed the ELCA to support the World Council of Church's "Thursdays in Black" campaign toward a world without rape and violence.
- Adopted a resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance in the ELCA for the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9—the nine people who were shot and killed June 17, 2015, during a Bible study at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, S.C.
- Adopted a resolution to condemn white supremacy, calling all ELCA congregations to engage in a "study of the structures and rhetoric that empower and fuel racism and white supremacy and to take to heart the teaching of Scriptures, so we may all be better equipped to speak boldly about the equal dignity of all persons in the eyes of God."
- Celebrated the end of *Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA*, which concluded June 30 with nearly \$250 million raised in cash, multiyear commitments and planned gift commitments. At the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly, voting members approved the \$198 million campaign to help sustain and grow ministries of the church.

OPWDD

Zion is initiating a new outreach program for people with developmental disabilities. We are beginning with an informal worship service on Mon., Sept. 23, 5:30 p.m. at the Office for People With Developmental Disabilities' Marcy Day Habilitation Center, 9501 River Rd. (near Riverside Pool and Spa) in Marcy. Lisa Lucas-Myers from Zion and Mike McPherson from OPWDD are advising our Disabilities Ministries group, which is hoping to provide a worship service every 3 months. The Sept. 23rd service will be "Zion's Welcome and Worship Off-Site Spiritual Mixer." The format will include lots of lively, uplifting music provided by a few musicians from Zion and possibly one from the OPWDD community interspersed with a couple of scripture readings, a brief homily, and prayers. Following the service there will be a social time and a closing during which the Dec. service will be announced. The program will conclude around 6:45 p.m. Those interested in attending/worshipping/mingling with the OPWDD participants are invited to a training session at the Marcy Day Habilitation Center on Tues., Sept. 3, at 5:00 - 6:00 p.m. Lisa and Mike will give instructions and make suggestions about what works and what to expect from people with developmental disabilities in a social/worship setting. Please sign up in the narthex at Zion if you are interested in joining the Disabilities Ministries group for this event. Families and friends of people in OPWDD's programs are cordially invited to attend.

Roof Replacement

2019 Roof Replacement

On May 12, 2019, sixty-two members attended a properly called congregational meeting where a motion was introduced and unanimously passed allowing the Church Council to spend \$68,600 to replace the roof at Zion. During discussion on the motion, the congregation was informed that the council had requested bids from three roofing companies and decided to recommend Dennis Padula & Sons Roofing and Sheet Metal Company. Padula was the lowest bidder, the most responsive to questions, and has done other roof repairs for Zion.

In order to pay for replacing the roof, the Council will spend \$40,000 of memorial funds, and borrow \$11,600 from the Building Fund and \$17,000 from the Mission Investment Fund (MIF). The Council has decided to go with an “in house” loan of \$28,600 instead of borrowing from an outside source, thereby saving the congregation thousands of dollars in interest. It has also recommended a repayment plan and period for the \$28,600 (this amounts to approximately \$350 per “giving unit”; i.e., a person or family) that will run from June 2019 to Dec. 2021.

During this time each person or family will be asked to pledge to give an additional \$10.50 per month (\$2.60 per week) **over and above their regular offering**. If people would like to give quarterly, semi-annually, yearly, or make a one-time payment, that is certainly okay. In addition, those who have the financial ability to do so are encouraged to give more than \$350 in order to offset those who do not have the means to give the entire amount. With the above in mind, the council asks that everyone please fill out and return the pledge card enclosed in this newsletter. FYI – people may continue to use their regular offering envelopes or use the green envelopes for special offerings. Either way, they should mark the extra amount they are giving as “Roof” or “Building Fund.”

Tax Laws and Giving to Zion

Recent tax law changes provide people an opportunity to make tax-free charitable contributions to Zion from their IRAs. This may be of special interest to those over 70 ½ as in most cases they must take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) annually from a traditional IRA. The tax law now allows someone to make a gift directly from a traditional IRA to a qualified public charity, such as Zion, in the form of a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). Please note that the gift must go directly from the IRA custodian to Zion and not come to you first. The gift still counts toward your annual RMD; however, it does not count as taxable income to you. Zion welcomes such QCD gifts to help with general operating expenses, the Building Fund, the Endowment Fund, and/or the Knobloch Fund. For further information, please consult your financial advisor, tax preparer, IRS Publication 590-B or the IRS website www.irs.gov.

The following article highlights the creative ways in which the ELCA, through the Lutheran World Federation, is approaching the migrant situation in upfront, positive ways. We, at Zion, are part of this work through our weekly offerings, as Zion gives 10% (we tithe) of our offerings to Mission Support. Please take time to read this message and to support this good work through your weekly giving.

MIGRANT SOLUTIONS

Perhaps you heard that the ELCA pronounced itself a sanctuary denomination at the recent churchwide assembly. That means that we are committed to walk with migrants and assist them in any way we can. However, what if life weren't so cruel back in their home countries? What if they had a secure job and steady income? Maybe they wouldn't have to leave home at all. And what about the many who are being sent back to the place from which they tried to escape gang violence, domestic abuse, poverty?

Though the migration crisis is daunting, there is hope. In Honduras, the ELCA supports the Lutheran World Federation and the Mennonite Social Action Committee to assist returned migrants with vocational support. A kiosk at a bus terminal where many migrants arrive provides them with humanitarian aid, hygiene kits, and other essential resources. The Mennonite organization gives mental health care, educational training and life-skills workshops, such as business plans, investments, and human rights. Over 900 people have been helped through this program. A few examples: One man who was unsuccessful in reuniting with his family in the US was given seed money and education to start a pig farm; a young woman was trained in cosmetology and given resources to start a home business; another man was able to expand his woodworking business, obtaining new equipment and registering his home business so he could sell goods beyond Honduras. Your mission support to the ELCA helps programs like this to walk with the migrants and provide sanctuary, right in their own home towns. **We are church together for the sake of the world. God's Work. Our Hands.**
