To our Zion family,

This past Sunday following the 10:00 AM service, we met via Zoom to hold this year's Annual Meeting. Thank you to all those who attended, along with those who helped present the 2020 Church year. Despite all the challenges encountered in 2020, the Annual Report and our meeting show that Zion remains a healthy congregation that continues to carry out its mission. Many thanks to Sara Silva for putting together the Annual Report and all who contributed!

Announcements and updates:

-At this year's Annual Meeting, our congregation voted in new Church Council members: Laurel McCurdy, Barb Wilson, and Nancy Thompson. Dan Rodahan will also be joining council meetings regularly. Dave Meneses and Doreen Nicholls will both serve an additional three-year term on the Endowment Committee. We extend our thanks to Kristen Burson for her year as council co-president. (Kristen will remain on council for an additional year beyond her three-year commitment.) The Council Leadership Team for the upcoming year will be Mark Thompson (president), (Jeanne Gymburch (vice-president), Linda Bennett (secretary), and Wendy Stevens (treasurer). Wendy just completed six years (two terms of three years) on the council and, per our constitution, must rotate off as a council member. She will, however, remain in her role as Treasurer. Thanks to Wendy for years of devoted service! Welcome to Laurel, Barb, Nancy, and Dan, as they join continuing members of this year's church council: Linda Bennett, Carol Blackburn, Kristen Burson, Jeanne Gymburch, Matt LaFave, Michele Lasher, and Kim Ritchie.

-Feb. 28th is our next scheduled in-person worship service, assuming conditions remain safe enough to allow for us to gather in person. In order to hold this service in person, we need five volunteers to staff this service: three greeters at the front door to check people in and two ushers. If you are willing to help staff the service, please call Sara at the office. Should we not have enough volunteers, we will need to hold the service via Zoom. Several members of the Task Force will be out of town that weekend and unable to play a role in the service.

-We will be polling our Zion congregation in the next two weeks to get an idea of the readiness of our members to return to the sanctuary for in-person worship. Holding in-person worship is a labor-intensive undertaking. It would be helpful to know the needed conditions for individuals' readiness to return (e.g.—infection rates below 3% for x number of consecutive weeks, or a sufficient % of our congregation attending who have already received two doses of the COVID-19 vaccine, etc.). This polling will be sent to you via the same method by which you currently receive Zion correspondence.

-This Sunday we will continue with our remote worship practice, offering the opportunity to attend the service via Zoom, livestreamed on Facebook, or by using the printed Service of the Word, which you will find later in this mailing. How can I get a vaccine appointment? Am I eligible? Council is researching how we might be able to help our congregants who don't have computer access secure these appointments and vaccinations. We'll keep you updated. If you'd like assistance in securing an appointment for a COVID vaccination, please call Sara.

-Zion's Souper-Bowl tradition lives on despite the pandemic! This past Sunday, 509 cans of soup were donated to this year's effort. First Reading: 2 Kings 2:1-12 Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6 Gospel: Mark 9:2-9

Sermon: Transfiguration Sunday -Rev. Jennifer DeWeerth

The Transfiguration story that we hear on this Sunday is not just your garden variety conversation between Jesus and a few of his disciples. No, this is a mountaintop experience with all the first century bells and whistles. There are dazzling displays of light and appearances by Moses and the great prophet, Elijah. Because Elijah appears, the Lectionary designers assign a first lesson from 2nd Kings that we also read in the summer, during the season of Pentecost. It's the story of Elijah being taken up in a whirlwind with a pyrotechnic display of horses and chariots, as witnessed by his successor, Elisha. Yes, it's all about the shiny bright lights this morning to close out the season of light, before the Lenten season, a season of relative shadow that we begin on Ash Wednesday. Big action, mountain top experiences, moments that break through the usual separation between earthly realities and the heavens above.

As I read the texts for this Sunday, there was one line that kept echoing in my head, and it was a strange one. It was the voice of Elisha, as he is watching Elijah ascend in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha, keeps watching and watching and crying out and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" I researched this line a bit to see what more there was to it, but it is basically an exclamation like it sounds, a combination of being impressed and dismayed, astounded

and also overwhelmed, seeing and yet disbelieving, amazed and also thoroughly undone. "Holy moley, the chariots and the horses! The fire and the whirlwind!" It sounds like it is over the top, all too much to even handle cognitively.

Elisha is following Elijah around from town to town, crossing the river before this moment when Elijah is swept up. We have not been traveling nearly as much as Elijah and Elisha are in this passage (mostly not traveling at all). But we *have* been sitting in our houses for the past eleven months having a similar experience: Our hands half covering our eyes, but unable to look away as our plans and our routines, our expectations and our hopes, go up in a regular fireball of pyrotechnics, a whirlwind of strangeness and smoke. "Holy cow, the virus and the daily news! The unbelievable chaos and COVID!

It is a spectacular phenomenon unfolding before our eyes, but it's not just a spectacle. Just as is the case with Elisha, this experience is *deeply emotional*. We have experienced stress, grief, and loss, and know that many others have, as well. As Elijah's final days near, Elisha has asked Elijah for a double share of his prophetic leader spirit. Elijah answers that, if Elisha sees him being taken away, then his request will be granted. Elisha does see it. Boy does he see it. He sees Elijah being brought up to heaven in the whirlwind. So, that's what he had hoped for, right, to see Elijah's departure, to inherit a double share of Elijah's spirit. But still, he is devastated. He is at a loss; his mentor, the great prophet, is gone. He has dreaded losing Elijah, so much so that he won't leave his side. Then he does lose him. He tears apart his clothing; he mourns. And that's it. That's where the reading ends.

Here's the thing. The lectionary gives us this story today to connect the story of Jesus' transfiguration to Elijah and the light displays. But in doing so, the lectionary committee snips off the last two verses, perhaps the most important two verses, of the story. Here they are:

"Elisha picked up the mantle of Elijah that had fallen from him, and went back and stood on the bank of the Jordan. He took the mantle of Elijah that had fallen from him, and struck the water, saying, "Where is the Lord, the God of Elijah?" When he had struck the water, the water was parted to the one side and to the other, and Elisha went over."

What do we learn from this story once we take these verses into account? First, this story is not just about Elijah; it is also about *Elisha, who outlives him*. Just like the story of Jesus' transfiguration is not just about Jesus; it is also about the witnesses, the ones who will come down, and go on and continue even after Jesus is transfigured, and even after he is gone from their midst. And it is about God who is with all of them. *We need to remember that the mantle is shared*.

Second, at the beginning of the story, Elisha, is *holding on*, desperate not to lose Elijah. But it ends with Elisha *carrying on*. He has been thrown for a loop. (The chariots and the horsemen!!!) But he sees the mantle as it falls to the ground. And he has the call, the courage, and trust in God, to pick it up. And he continues Elijah's work of speaking the truth and leading the *people*. Likewise, the disciples and Jesus knew that the goal was not to be on the top of the mountain; it was to come back down and do the work of ministry that remains. The work of God doesn't end at the bank of the Jordan with the death of Elijah, or at the mountaintop, or with the death of Jesus. *We need to remember that the mantle is passed on and on.*

When I look at Zion Lutheran Church, when I look out at all of you, I see that as the mantle was passed to you last winter, it was in the midst of crisis and chaos, a global pandemic, while you were just trying to grieve a little bit, the loss of your called pastor once again. No harm, no foul, if you had just become overwhelmed, sat down, and torn your metaphorical clothing.

But look at what has happened! Look at how each of you in different ways has picked up the mantle, how Zion together has picked up the mantle of ministry during a time of transition. There has been leadership with purpose and mission. The members of the congregation have been cared for through every struggle and illness, loss and concern. Difficult decisions have been made through inclusive input. Outreach to the community has continued every single month. Plans and progress have been made in the search for a new pastor. The gospel has been preached and safety processes maintained, and songs have even been sung. You saw the mantle of Elijah fall to the ground and you simply bent down, picked it up, and have worn it, together, walking under its weight, and its great meaning. The mantle represents the wisdom, the gifts, and the grace of God...to make a path, a way, through the waters, for the sake of the people of God.

A story of fire and whirlwind. A story of brilliant light. This story is about Elijah and Elisha at the river. It is about Jesus and his disciples on the mountain and all the way back down it again to continue along the way, to minister to the people, to trust and serve God. It is about the church and its work. Sometimes through transition and loss. Sometimes through an amazing mountaintop experience. Always a way forward, even in the most difficult of times. God parts the waters; God transfigures and transforms. We bend down to pick up the mantle of ministry that falls at our feet and wear it across our shoulders for a while. Amen.
