Message from the Pastor

Beloved of Christ,

Isaiah 42:8-9 declares this promise: "I am the LORD, that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to idols. See, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare; before they spring forth, I tell you of them." (NRSV)

This is a great time of year. I love

watching the earth bud and burst back into life. There are two beautiful pink buds on some small trees in my front yard. The interstate is lined with white buds on trees. Flowers are beginning to break through the ground once more. I imagine creation is singing its own version of the doxology and is praising God who made all things and turns the seasons.

There is another reason I love this time of year: Easter. In reality, I love the entirety of Holy Week. We begin on Palm Sunday with the somewhat ironically named "Triumphal Entry" of Jesus into Jerusalem. We move quickly into the week's gathering storm. Maundy Thursday, we typically remember how Jesus knelt at the feet of his disciples (even Peter and Judas) and washed their feet. Good Friday is a day for us to remember the agony of Christ's passion and what it cost God to fully show us his love and to offer us the gift of salvation



and new life. On Holy Saturday, we pause in the silence of death and the tomb and in the unknown of what has happened and what is yet to come. This is where I imagine most of us spend our lives in a metaphorical sense.

Finally, we arrive at the glory of

Easter! Christians are Easter people. The church exists because Christ lives. We proclaim Christ's Lordship because he is victorious over the grave. We have a purpose in this world because the Christ who lived and died now lives forever and is making all things new. This is our message. This is our life. This is the center of all that we do, say, and live.

Every year, we walk this week. Every year, we hear the same story. Every year...and yet it never gets old. In fact, every year God speaks of new things that are coming and of the new ways that life is being renewed. There is a great hymn entitled "I Love to Tell the Story." The last verse proclaims: "I love to tell the story, for those who know it best seem hungering and thirsting to hear it, like the rest. And when, in scenes of glory, I sing the new, new song, 'twill be the old, old story that I have loved so long." *(Continues on page 3)*

April Murturing Faith Ideas

SCRIPTURE

April 7: Read John 20:19-31

Thomas has gotten a bad rap through the centuries, often being referred to as "Doubting Thomas" because he wouldn't believe it when the other disciples told him Jesus was alive and had visited them. When he did see Jesus, Thomas believed. We all have our doubts at times, but that doesn't stop Jesus from coming to us. Jesus meets us where we are and invites us to believe. What doubts make it hard for you believe that Jesus is alive and with you, meeting you where you are? Celebrate the good news that God in Christ meets and accepts us where we are.

April 14: Read 1 John 3:1-7

The children's song "If Anybody Asks You Who I Am" contains the words, "If anybody asks you who I am, tell 'em I am a child of God." The concluding verse changes it a little bit to "If anybody asks you who are you, tell 'em you're a child of God." The author of the first letter of John reminds us that we are all children of God, not because we are always good and loving, but because God loves us. As God's child, how might you share God's love with others?

April 21: Read Psalm 23

Shepherds take care of their sheep by seeing that the sheep have the food and water they need. When the sheep are threatened or are in danger, the shepherd uses a staff and rod to protect and rescue them. The psalmist sings of God as the shepherd of the psalmist. Think of yourself as one of God's sheep; how has God cared for you?

April 28: Read 1 John 4:7-21

God is love and commands us to love one another. We live in love rather than fear because God abides in us. Are there fears or anxieties that hinder you from loving freely and boldly? In what specific ways are you called to show the love of God to someone else this week?

WV Ministry of Advocacy and Workcamps (WVMAW) is a Christian non-profit organization created for long-term recovery from disaster and the disaster of the disaster West Virginia. Since 2002, church groups have done flood recovery, built handicap ramps, repaired porches, flooring, rebuilt walls, and roofing among other repairs, according to the skills of participants. A skilled Project Manager leads, teaches, or gets out of the way according to the skills of the team, guilding volunteers, managing the project, and keeping needed materials on site during the week. Funding for materials is in part from the fees paid by the volunteers as well as from donations and grants.

Registration Deadline is Monday, April 22. Cost per youth is \$300. At least 3 adults are also needed.
