Message from the Pastar

Beloved of Christ,

Psalm 148 is a call for all creation to praise God, the maker of all things. I love the image of the sun, moon, mountains, cattle, creeping things, and flying birds all joining in a hymn of praise to God. The Psalm concludes in this way:

"Let them praise the name of the Lord, for his name alone is exalted; his glory is above earth and

heaven. He has raised up a horn for his people, praise for all his faithful, for the people of Israel who are close to him. Praise the Lord!"

I write this from Montreat, NC while sitting on a porch overlooking Lake Susan and surrounded by mountains. Truly I see God's handiwork everywhere I look. I listen as birds chirp. Even in the stillness and quiet, I hear a praise of God ring out. Creation sings and in many ways is inviting me to join into the age old, yet surprisingly new, hymn of praise.

I consider how wonderful it is to serve a church that values continuing education for its staff. I feel comfortable speaking for John Morrison in offering sincere gratitude for this opportunity to attend the Music and Worship Conference. In the learning and the personal growth, I am also fed spiritually and renewed in my own faith and love for Jesus Christ.

The theme this week is "Thirst No More". Truly, there are so many ways to thirst. We all have experienced physical thirst.

There is also emotional thirst as we desire to love and be loved by others. There is mental thirst as we discover how little we truly understand. There is spiritual thirst as well. This one is more difficult sometimes to recognize.

Where do we go to quench our thirst? To whom do we go to quench our thirst?

To be honest, we don't always go to the best places. We find ourselves drinking from wells that never satisfy or even leave us thirstier than before. There is only one who can truly satisfy. There is only one who knows the deepest longings of our hearts. There is only one who knows us completely and loves us unconditionally.

As a pastor, this is a good reminder. It is good for me to remember that I too must drink from that living water. I too need to stop and rest and listen to the still small

Musical Notes from John Morrison, Director of Music &

I attended Week 2 of the Montreat Worship

and Music Conference this summer and it was such an enriching and renewing experience, as always.

The weather was beautiful and sunny which was fortunate as it had rained almost all of the first week of the conference. The class and ensemble offerings were varied, run by wonderfully inspiring clinicians, and it required making some difficult decisions as to which one to pick. This summer I opted to sing with the adult choir directed by Jason Max Ferdinand. Highlights of that experience were singing "Thanks Be to God" from Elijah by Felix Mendelssohn during worship and singing in the closing concert which ended with a powerful rendition of "Some Day" arr. by Nathan Carter. Each conductor has his or her own style and it's always fun to see how they go about bringing the music to life in their own unique way.

I signed up for a handbell reading session run by Sandra Eithun and Brian Childers. These sessions involve ringing straight through pieces without stopping to rehearse them in order to give directors attending some good ideas of handbell music they can use for their choirs. The Cambridge Handbells have rung anthems by Sandra Eithun before so it was great to see her in action directing a choir. Fun fact: Sandra has more than 600 pieces for handbells in publication! There was an organ concert as part of the conference this summer (That hasn't always been the case, but usually there is one.) I always look forward to hearing the featured organ recitalist who this year was Nathaniel Gumbs performing a program of

works by Sowande, Mendelssohn, Reger, Widor (the first movement from the Symphony No. 5 which is not as well known for the final movement typically played at Easter), Florence Price, Elgar and more. The venue for the concert was at First

Presbyterian Asheville which has a Holtkamp pipe organ.

I attended a Global Drumming class with James Wells from the Nashville area who typically works with children and youth, but was also great with adults. Eric Wall led the service playing class where he shared his views and experiences as a church musician and organist and highlighted the

relationship between singing and organ playing. The Routley lecturer David Bjorlin talked a lot about the hymn writing process, tools that hymn writers use, and potential advantages and disadvantages of these tools.

There was a bit of a surprise one evening at the youth talent show when an announcement was made that a Momma bear and her cubs were hanging out behind Anderson Auditorium and everyone should go out the front. (I never saw the bears, but some others did.) Never a dull moment at Montreat!





Being surrounded by such natural beauty it is also important to spend some time just enjoying the outdoors. Pastor Evan, Jennifer, and I did just that by hiking up the Lookout Mountain Trail to take in the breathtaking view. I would sum this view up with simply one word, "Wow!"


Scouts take advantage of various summer camps


voice of God to speak.

Here are a few updates from the Property Team. As most of you know, the restoration work on the stained glass windows facing the main parking lot has begun. Windows are being repaired and trim painted and then a new covering placed over the windows. We have exceeded our donations by \$2,017 (\$49,017). So a BIG thank you to everyone who supported this project.

The next major project is to replace the elevator near the office entrance. The project will be approximately \$60,000 and should be completed by the end of October. An elevator fund is in place with \$5,230 already donated.

August Murturing Faith Ideas

SCRIPTURE

August 6: Read Matthew 14:13-21. When the disciples told him the crowds before him needed food, Jesus told the disciples to give them something to eat. From the five loaves and two fish, Jesus fed over 5000 people. There are still hungry people in our midst. This week, when your family goes to the grocery, buy extra and share it with your community food pantry.

August 13: Read Matthew 14:2-32. When the disciples saw Jesus walking on water, they were afraid, because they didn't know who/what it was. Peter got out of the boat and started walking toward Jesus, until he became frightened by the strong wind around him, and he started to sink; Jesus caught him. When have you been scared? Share what has scared you with a friend of family member. Give thanks to God that Jesus is with us in scary times and situations.

August 20: Read Genesis 45:1-15. Many years after Joseph's brothers sold him into slavery, they came to Joseph seeking food in a time of famine, and they did not recognize Joseph. When Joseph told them who he was, he also told them that not to be distressed for God had been working in all that had happened. When, as you think back over your life, whether long or short, has God worked in a surprising way? Give thanks to God for God's never ending care.

August 27: Read Matthew 16:13-20. At Caesarea Philippi, Jesus asked the disciples who other people were saying that Jesus was. Then Jesus asked the disciples the same question – "Who do you say that I am?" Peter declared Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God. Jesus asks that same question of his disciples today – "Who do you say that I am?" What is your response?
