Message from the Pastor

#### Beloved of Christ,

December has arrived, and honestly, I cannot fathom where 2023 went. For us in the church, We enter a new year already. The liturgical year starts for us in Advent.

Isaiah 64:1-4 invites us into a season of preparation:

"O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would guake at

your presence —as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil —to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence. When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him."

I served as Chaplain for 2 summers with Appalachia Service Project. There were 25 counties in 4 states, so I did a lot of driving. One morning, I was on the interstate in West Virginia, jamming to my music, when suddenly, every light on the dashboard came on and the power steering failed. Let me tell you, that's frightening going 70 MPH. The temperature skyrocketed in the engine. Everything was failing in this car and so I slowed down, threw on the



emergency blinkers, and managed to get a mile to the nearest exit, which was in the middle of nowhere. At the bottom of the ramp, the car died – totally and completely. I called the fleet manager and

told him what happened and gave him the interstate I

was on and which exit number I was currently sitting. He did not want me to call a local tow truck, but told me he was jumping in the company tow truck and would be there in about 2 hours. Did I mention this exit was in the middle of nowhere? All I could see where trees, not even houses. I have no clue why there was an exit to this road from the interstate. So, there I sat, I had not packed anything entertainment wise and the car would not turn on, so no radio. This was also before smartphones. I took a nap. I took a walk. I repacked my bags. Every 5-10 minutes, a car would drive by and some of them would stop to ask if I wanted a ride. The only thing I could do was wait. Checking my watch every 15 seconds praying 15 minutes had passed.

Advent means coming. We remember Christ's first coming and we look forward to Christ's second coming. This is a season of waiting.(*Continues on page 3*)

God chose an unlikely setting for this story: the tiny village of Bethlehem; an unlikely couple as supporting characters in this story; Joseph and Mary; God chose an unlikely audience through which to broadcast the news of Christ's birth: common shepherds; and He chose a newborn infant as the lead character in this lifechanging story of redemption, love and grace; Jesus, the Holy Child of Bethlehem." "Isaiah, the Old Testament prophet, foretold that the Messiah would come and He would be called 'Emmanuel-God with us.' The gospel writer John, having had a personal association with Jesus and looking in retrospect at the miracle of God becoming human, said it this way 'The Word (meaning Jesus) became

flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth. We have beheld His glory, the glory of the only Son of the heavenly Father. This is the compelling story of Christmas. This is the miraculous story of Bethlehem's Child. "

The narrator for the cantata is Marilyn Morgan. Soloists are Maria Potts, Stan Swihart, and Betty Pat Lee (descant). You will hear both familiar carols and original compositions. We hope you enjoy this year's cantata!

We start our Liturgical year, not with celebration and the birth of Jesus, but with waiting. AND, we have to wait 4 weeks!

Waiting. I don't know many people who look forward to waiting. Personally, I'm really bad at waiting. What I'm good at is over scheduling, looking busy, and cramming everything I possibly can into the shortest amount of time. Waiting is so much of life – there is truth in the phrase "Hurry up and wait." We wait for the stoplight to change. We wait for a phone call. We wait for visitors to arrive. Children wait for Christmas break so they don't have to go to school. We wait in checkout lines. We wait for prayers to be answered and for news of a loved one. Some people wait to die. Some always wait for tomorrow. Spend so much time waiting for sometime else or something else, that we miss what God is doing right now and they forget to live.

Advent is time for us to reawaken and refocus. There a difference between waiting for Christmas to come and waiting for Christ. We don't need much help determining when Christmas will come. It doesn't change – December 25 – whether we are finished shopping or not. I don't think many people wake up that morning and say, "I had no idea Christmas was today!" How much of what we do in this season is in preparation for Christmas Day and how much is in preparation for God to become flesh in Jesus Christ? Are we prepared to encounter the Lord of all creation?

Isaiah invites us to wait expectantly and hopefully. There are 2 ways to wait. You can wait like I did on the side of the road praying the time would pass. Or we can wait like we wait for parades on the side of the road – with expectation and hope. Isaiah invites us to shape our expectation and anticipation by the first Advent of Jesus – the one born in a stable and will hang on a tree. If the first coming taught us anything – God comes in ways we never expect.

We wait as people of the promise believing that God has come close and entered our world, that God has redeemed God's people, and that God is present right now.

If we take it seriously, this is Christ's birthday, not our birthday. As we busy ourselves making lists and buying presents, what if the most important list we can make is – what does Christ want from me on his birthday? Imagine if we all waited like this.

#### SCRIPTURE

**December 3:** Advent begins today. This season of the church year is when we prepare ourselves to welcome Jesus as a baby. This is a busy season with church services, decorating, concerts, parties, shopping and getting ready to visit with family members we might not see often. In the busyness of the season, don't forget why we are celebrating. How will you prepare your heart to welcome Jesus into your life once again?
