Message from the Pastor

Beloved of Christ,

We have been examining the "Great Ends of the Church" as written and included in our Book of Order. As a reminder, "ends" is this sense means something akin to aspirations and targets at which to aim rather than a conclusion. In other words, ideally, these summarize what the Church should look like and what we should strive for in our personal life.

The first end is "The proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind."

The second is "The shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God."

The third is – "The maintenance of divine worship."

The fourth end is – "The promotion of the truth."

We arrive at the fifth end – "the promotion of social righteousness."

All of the prophets in our Bible have things to say on this topic. Ezekiel gives us a different picture than usual for God's judgment in 16:49 – "This was the guilt of your sister Sodom: she and her daughters had pride, excess of food, and prosperous ease, but they did not aid the poor and needy."

Remember, the Presbyterian Church wrote the Great Ends of the



Church in 1910. This is not some new "woke" agenda. The Church, reading the biblical witness, saw the importance of living and serving and offering. The way of the cross is a re-envisioning of our culture and society. St. Augustine in the 4th Century wrote in a sermon: "You give

bread to a hungry person; but it would be better were no one hungry, and you could give it to no one. You clothe the naked person. Would that all were clothed and this necessity did not exist." This he saw as central to the gospel.

John Calvin put a huge emphasis on promotion of social righteousness. He wrote, "The poor are chosen to represent God upon the earth." In his pastoral ministry, he encouraged all churches to devote at least half of their resources to the poor and needy. He viewed this not as acts of charity, but as a witness to God's justice and advocating of the reign of Christ in the church.

Modern prophet, Shane Claiborne, wrote, "If our gospel is not good news to the poor and the oppressed, it is not the gospel."

Obviously, "the promotion of social righteousness" is central and has *(Continues on page 3)*

She is also a ringing member of a handbell quartet called MLB-4, which is a sub group of Music City Bronze. Julie has 40 published handbell arrangements and was named Composer of the Year in 2009 by Jeffers Handbell Supply.

Keving McChesney lives in Colorado Springs, CO and has over 450 titles in print. He has won the American

Guild of English Handbell Ringers Composition Contests and Jeffers Composer of the Year. Kevin is a handbell catalogue editor, directs the Pike Peak ringers, an auditioned community handbell choir, and is a workshop clinician and festival conductor.

One of the aspects of Montreat I always enjoy is seeing and meeting composers and arrangers in person whose music we ring or sing in church. I believe finding out more about them adds an additional layer of appreciation to the music both for those making the music and those listening.

been central to the understanding of the church since its inception. In modern understandings, we have focused much more heavily on personal righteousness, which is good. Who we are and how we live matters. However, the gospel is never "Me and Jesus". The gospel is, and always has been, a countercultural movement that seeks to reshape and reimagine our life together.

One of my favorite complaints against the church was written by Julian Julian the Apostate (331–363). Writing to a pagan high priest, he orders Arsacius:

"...to build in each city, frequent hostels in order that strangers may profit by our philanthropy; I do not mean for our own people only, but for others also who are in need of money. . . . For it is disgraceful that, when no Jew ever has to beg, and the impious Galileans [Christians] support not only their own poor but ours as well, all men see our people lack aid from us."

Basically he is complaining to his pagan priests that they need to be better at caring for people because the Christians are making them look bad. How absolutely wonderful it would be if someone could lob that kind of accusation at the Church today! Friends, "the promotion of social righteousness" is not some twisted and perverse ideal, but central to the heart of God and central to what we should be doing as a congregation of our Lord and Savior. This should make us squirm a bit. The Gospel never was about making me feel comfortable and happy. The Gospel has always been about the kingdom of God coming to

earth in the person, the work, the life, the death, and the resurrection of Jesus, the Christ.

Jesus did not come into this world that we would have more and better religion. Jesus came that we might have life and have it abundantly. That begins in us and with us and through us. The way things are and always have been do not provide that much interest to our Lord and Savior. Instead, Jesus is much more interested in what we may become and what is blossoming now.

I invite you to prayerfully consider where and how God is inviting us, pushing us, calling us to participate in this wonderful mission of social righteousness.

SCRIPTURE

February 2: Fourth Sunday after Epiphany

Read Jeremiah 1:4-10
