Message from the Pastor

Beloved of Christ,

Luke 4:1-2 reads as follows: "Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished."

We now enter a season of Lent in the church. Lent is one of the oldest observances of the church. Long before the celebration of Advent and Christmas, Christians observed this season. We can date observances all the way to the 2nd century, but it became standardized in 325 AD.

The numbering of 40 days draws from this passage in which Jesus journeys into the wilderness where he fasts and is tested. The Church has seen itself in this journey as we too are called to grow in faith and to be honest about where we have given into sin, unlike the perfect One. In doing so, we prepare ourselves to once again travel to the cross, to hear the mocking, and to see the Son of God offering himself in pure love for us and for our salvation. Even today, Catholic and Episcopal churches use Lent as a time to prepare confirmands for baptism. One image of baptism comes from Romans 6: a



dying to self and a rising to Christ. For those already baptized, it is an opportunity for us to remember and recommit ourselves to the vows we made. Our Book of Common Worship states this: "Baptism marks the

beginning of new life in Christ. The new way of life to which God calls us is one of deep commitment, disciplined discernment, and growth in faith. The gifts of the Holy Spirit, given with and through baptism, equip and strengthen us for the challenges of Christian faith and life." All of these images reveal to us that the Christian life is more than intellectual assent. It is instead a deeper commitment to take up our cross and to follow in the footsteps of our Lord and Savior.

During this time of preparation, many traditions have undertaken the practice of giving things up for Lent. Lent is not the time for personal improvement or to return to that New Year's resolution that went sideways. Lent is not a weight loss program or an exercise regimen. Lent truly isn't really about us. Lent is about waiting for and expecting the Holy Spirit to work. Lent is about making space for the Spirit of God so that we might be (Continues to page 3)

Musical Notes from John Morrison, Director of Music & Organist



On March 2, we will be holding an Ash Wednesday service at 7 p.m. in the sanctuary.

Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of the 40 days of Lent. can be an overlooked day in our faith iourney. It perhaps lacks the excitement and appeal of other "popular" services such as Christmas and Easter. Nevertheless, I personally find this service to be one of the most meaningful of the entire year. The solemnity of hearing the words "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" while receiving the ashes on your forehead is a powerful experience. Accepting and dealing with mortality is no easy task, but one that we all must face. We all deal with loss at one point or another, but our faith in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior helps to ease this burden. We should remember that the joy of Easter is all the more meaningful after the darkness of Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season.

Last summer at Montreat, one of the worship services focused on Ash Wednesday.

One experience from this service that stuck with me was the point at which we began to hear people from throughout the congregation call out names of loved ones who had passed away simultaneously. We are accustomed to

hearing names called one at a time which naturally makes them intelligible for us to hear and understand. But in this circumstance when with a large group of people had come from various places in the country, it was less about the individual names and more about the

wave of sound which made an emotional impact. Another highlight of the service was the hymn singing. One of the hymns we sang was "Sign Us with Ashes". It has a beautiful melody and the words to the refrain and first verse are: "Sign us with ashes, merciful God, children of dust, as to dust we return.

Sign us with ashes, merciful God. Mark us and make us your own. Surely, you alone can save us. You pay our price with precious blood. Reaching through your great compassion, you lift up your people with love." - Text by Mary Louise Bringle, 2003. Music by William P. Rowan, 2003. (2006 GIA Publications) These words also make a great Ash Wednesday prayer even if they were not sung.

transformed. Lent is a time to let go and to let God work in our hearts in through our lives.

I learned a new practice several years ago that stuck with me. The challenge is not to



simply give something up, but rather, it is to replace that something with a spiritual practice. For example, turn off the TV for 30 minutes and read scripture or pray. Another example: give up a soft drink or coffee and put the money you would have spent on those into a charitable donation. Or, get off social media and spend that time reaching out to people or writing notes of gratitude. Or, turn off the radio on the way to work and spend that time naming blessings God has given. We could embrace the silence and simply pray: "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." There are countless examples, but you get the idea.

This stuck with me because faith is hard work. Growing in Christ is not something that will just happen. It takes intentionality and purpose.

I thought about this even more as we examine the Matthew 25 initiative. What things might the Spirit be asking us as a church to give up? Are there programs or ideas that served their purpose but now are outdated? Are there ministries that the Spirit is urging us as a church to step into?

We might feel as though we are entering a wilderness all alone to be tested, but we may be surprised to see Jesus waiting for us if we but risk and journey onward.

SCRIPTURE

March 6 - First Sunday in Lent: Read Luke 4:1-13

As we journey through this season of Lent, Luke's account of the Temptations of Jesus shows us that God will "test" us before God can use us for his purposes. Hear the words of the hymn "When We Are Tested" by Ruth Duck. When we are tempted to barter our souls, trading the truth for the power to control, teach us to worship and praise only you, seeking your will in the work that we do. What ways is God testing you?

March 13 - Second Sunday in Lent: Read Luke 13:31-35

In the scripture reading, you will see the theme of rejection. Many have been given the choice to seek God's kingdom, but have turned their back on this offer. But the good news is that God has limitless patience! God will wait for you to accept or refuse God's offer of love through Jesus Christ.

March 20 - Third Sunday in Lent

It's A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood! March 20 is Fred Rogers' birthday, and the PC(USA) has designated it as Mr. Rogers Day. Take a moment to reflect on the principals that Fred Rogers exhibited throughout his life. He welcomed the little children and taught forgiveness and the power of kindness, as well as the importance of unconditional love and empathy and to love your neighbor as yourself. March 27 - Fourth Sunday in Lent: Luke 15:1-3

The well-know parable of the Lost Sheep is a parable of joy. How joyful we are when something we've lost is found. God's love for us is a rejoicing love.
