
Message from the Pastor

Beloved of Christ,

May 19 we celebrate what is perhaps the second most important day in the church calendar – Pentecost. The first is Resurrection Sunday with Jesus being raised from the dead. Pentecost is the one day of the church year we change all the paraments to red and I get to wear my red stole. Pentecost reminds us of the gift, movement, and power of the Holy Spirit given to us.

Jesus tells us in John 14:12 "The one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father." This has always struck me as odd and challenging. We will do greater things than Jesus? Really? In a way, yes. Jesus, in his earthly ministry, was confined to human standards and human conditions. He could only walk so far. Think about the Church through 2000 years of history. True, there are not great parts of our history, but there are also tremendous things the Church has done hospitals, schools, feeding programs, care for the poor, just to name a few things. All these to further the spread of the gospel of salvation and new creation. Each of theses empowered by the working of the Holy Spirit.

On Pentecost we remember the gift of the Holy Spirit. The story is told in

I think it's important to consider the back story. Acts is volume 2 in this larger work. Volume 1 is the Gospel according to Luke. Luke wrote both the gospel and Acts. Most people call it Luke-Acts. Luke is making a broad point for us. There is a two-fold movement. In the gospel, we hear of God's grace, mercy, salvation, and love poured freely on all of creation, ultimately in the cross and resurrection. Luke doesn't end the story there. Yes, we are saved from sin and death and destruction - praise be to God. There is an even deeper importance, not just saved from something, but we are saved FOR a purpose. God has saved us and given us a task. The books of Acts answers the larger question, if God has given us all things, not even sparing God's Son, how then shall we live. While the choirs are off during the summer months, there will be a variety of special music such as Women's Chorus, Men's Chorus, vocal soloists, instrumental soloists and more.



That is what Acts wants to tell us - we are given a mission.

Acts is our story. Acts is the story of the church – it's formation, the first problems, and following as the Spirit leads. It's not what the disciples expected and the movement of the church begins in a rather strange way. It's not an organization or institution. When the wind blew, and the tongues of fire fell, they didn't have time to take inventory of gifts, strengths, or resources. When they started talking in other languages, no one began with why this wouldn't work or why they shouldn't do this. How many things in our life and in our church do we never attempt because we are afraid of failure or because we don't think we have the resources or abilities?


In Acts, the church is constantly surprised and constantly learning and growing and changing. There is a difference between building a movement or building a monument. We like building monuments. A monument freezes a moment in time – remember this, never forget that. They can be good things, but friends, Jesus didn't come to build monuments. The Spirit gave birth to the church to be a movement. A movement changes things. A movement shifts things. A movement refuses to be nailed down. A movement if fluid. Whereas a monument relies on buildings and static things, a movement relies on people. A movement is alive. A monument is dead.

Jesus created the church, not so a group of people would come together once and a week, put up with each other for an hour, and then go home unchanged. The Spirit fills the church where this is the place where we practice this faith, where we find encouragement and hope. But, then we are sent out to be the church in the world. We come here to learn about this faith, we are sent out to do it. We practice love, mercy, forgiveness, welcome, mercy, hope, love, and risk. May it be so in us.

May Murturing Faith Ideas

SCRIPTURE

May 5: Read John 15:9-17

Jesus commands the disciples to love one another sacrificially. How much would you give up for the sake of a friend? What does the "complete joy" of Christ mean to you, and how do you share it with someone else?

May 12: Read John 17:6-19

Jesus prays that God would protect the friends that he is sending into the world. Are these impulses at odds with one another – staying safe and serving in the wider world? What risks are you willing to take to speak truth to those who would rather not hear it?

May 19: Read Ezekiel 37:1-14

Ezekiel prophesied to the dry bones, and the Holy Spirit swept over the valley to breathe new life where there had been none. Is there a part of your faith life that feels "dry"? How are you praying the Holy Spirit would renew your church community?

May 26: Read Psalm 29

This psalm describes the voice of the Lord like a powerful storm that blows over the land and inspires the people to worship. When did you last simply sit in stillness and listen to the rain? What do you hear the voice of the Lord saying to you right now?
