Message from the Pastar

Beloved of Christ,

1 Peter 2:9-10 has become an important passage in Presbyterianism. It reads:

"But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order

that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy."

This passage is loaded with theological meaning for the church. One of the main aspects to highlight is how God has formed us and called us a new people, redeemed and restored through mercy freely given. In our understanding, that is where everything begins – with God. God is the one who acted in creation. God is the one who acted in our redemption. God is the one who continues to act in creating and



light."

One of the ways we do that is in our official Presbyterian Church (USA) cross. For the next few months, I will highlight different images held within the PC (USA) cross. Some of you may know and others may be surprised about the symbols and meanings purposefully included in our cross. Either way, my prayer is that we all may learn more about our faith and what it means to call ourselves Presbyterian.

With Thanksgiving just around the corner, the First Presbyterian choirs are preparing in their rehearsals for the busy Advent and Christmas season soon to come. The Chancel Choir will be presenting a cantata during worship Sunday December 18 and the WV Brass Quintet will be playing for the Christmas Eve service. The Cambridge Handbells are usually ringing about twice a month with the following schedule for November and December: November 6, November 20, December 4, December 18, and Christmas Eve.

We also have some exciting concerts happening at the church in December! On Sunday December 4th at 3 pm, Vocal Tapestry will be giving a concert. Then on Tuesday December 20th there is a Maestri Vocale concert of the Messiah by G.F. Handel at 7 pm in the sanctuary. They will be performing the Christmas portion plus the Hallelujah Chorus. Maestri Vocale started out as a Men's Chorus made up of choral directors, church music directors, and professional singers from around the area to now include a Women's Chorus and an SATB chorus for works such as this. This is our official symbol:

The first thing and most important thing to notice is that it is a cross. Everything we do and everything we are is because of the cross of Jesus Christ. It is through the cross

that we have redemption, forgiveness of sins, and the gift of life eternal. Without the cross, we have nothing. Without the cross, we have no reason to gather in worship. Without the cross, we are still "not a people" as Peter writes.

The cross is center and most important, not just to us but to all Christians throughout the world. This reminds us that we may be distinct in some of our beliefs from other denominations, but all who call on the Lord Jesus Christ are knit together in the very foundational importance of the cross.

The Office of the General Assembly writes this about our specific cross: "The cross represents the incarnate love of God in Jesus Christ and his passion and resurrection. Because of its association with Presbyterian history, the Celtic cross was chosen as a model for this contemporary rendering of the ancient symbol."

We will journey through more distinct details included in our cross and why certain features are shaped they way they are. I invite you to study it and see what images you discover and then spend some time pondering why those elements may be included.

SCRIPTURE

November 6 - Twenty-Second Sunday after Pentecost: Read 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

Paul tells the believers in Thessalonica to not be alarmed about rumors of the coming 'Day of the Lord,' but rather to hold fast to the truth they have been taught. What worries and anxieties is the Spirit inviting you to let go of right now? How do we discern what faith 'traditions' are worth holding on to, and which have served their purpose?

November 13 - Twenty-Third Sunday after Pentecost: Read Isaiah 65:17-25

The prophet is painting a beautiful picture of the 'New Heavens and New Earth' in his final chapters. What images in this passage speak to your deep hopes and desires? How do we cultivate this vision of shalom in our world today, knowing that its final culmination can only be the work of Christ?

November 20 - Christ the King Sunday: Read: Luke 23:33-43

This Christ the King Sunday we are reminded that the crown Jesus wore was one of thorns. How is your life as a citizen of Christ's kingdom marked by sacrifice and service to others?

November 27 - First Sunday of Advent: Read Romans 13:11-14

Paul encourages the believers in Rome that salvation is at hand because "the day is near!" As we wait in this Advent season, how are we shining light into darkness and walking in paths of peace? How is the Spirit using this season to 'wake you up' to pay attention to where God is at work in the world?
