# Message from the Pastor

#### **Beloved of Christ,**

Last month, I introduced the six Great Ends of the Church as found in our Book of Order.

The great ends of the church are:

the proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind;

the shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God;

the maintenance of divine worship;

the preservation of the truth; the promotion of social righteousness;

and the exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world.

The Presbyterian Church composed this statement in 1910 in order to paint a clear picture of who we are and what it means to be the church. Each statement might seem distant or lofty, but each is meant to inspire, to challenge, to lead, and to shape us in our lives together.

This proclamation is not a mission statement or a list of distant goals to achieve. The word "end" is used in this context to mean purpose or reason for being; these purposes should define who we are right now in the present and should provide targets for growth. To study the Great Ends is to measure our life together as a congregation. All six



matter. We cannot choose certain ones that we are good at or feel comfortable doing while leaving others to do the rest. They are all interconnected—each relies on and defines the others.

This month we will look closely at the first statement:

"The proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind." Quite honestly, this is who we are and why we are. We join our voices with countless others from the ages to proclaim the mighty works of God for our salvation.

In Exodus 12, Moses institutes the Passover observance and commands that "when your children ask you, 'What do you mean by this observance?' you shall say, 'It is the Passover sacrifice to the Lord, for he passed over the houses of the Israelites in Egypt, when he struck down the Egyptians but spared our houses.'"

Once the people passed through the Red Sea and saw the destruction of the Egyptian army, they sang: "In your steadfast love you led the people whom you redeemed; you guided them by your strength to your holy abode." (Ex. 15:13)

Psalm 27 proclaims: "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? (Continues on page 3)



The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"

Isaiah adds his voice in chapter 25: "Lord, you are my God; I will exalt you, I will praise your name; for you have done wonderful things, plans formed of old, faithful and sure."

Paul chimes in as well in Romans 1:16: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the

Greek."



The scriptures are filled with the proclamation of God's good works for our salvation. We are called to add our voice to their songs of praise and thanksgiving. We are recipients of this incredible love given by God, but we are not meant to merely consume it. To proclaim the Gospel for salvation is to speak and to share with others

how God has worked in our lives. It means to be vulnerable in the Spirit's revelation of our sinfulness. It means listening to

the experiences of others and learning from how God is at work in them, even if they cannot recognize it in themselves.

The proclamation of the Gospel is so much more than simply listening to a preacher in the pulpit every Sunday. Proclamation requires that we place ourselves in the story of God's love and reconciliation and share that with others. It means finding ways to put into words what it means that we follow Christ and that Jesus is Lord. Many scholarly studies and anecdotal stories describe horrible encounters with people of faith and explain why people are leaving the church. This first Great End of the Church makes a powerful counter statement that God is good even when God's followers fail.

I love this statement attributed to D. T. Niles: "Evangelism is just one beggar telling another where to find bread." That is the gift of our scriptures. That is the gift of worship in the church. That is the gift of our living. We proclaim not ourselves and what we have done, but only what God can do for us. May we find ways to share with others this truly incredible Gospel of salvation.

## September Murturing Faith Ideas

#### **SCRIPTURE**

#### September 1: Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost/Proper 17: Read Psalm 15

This Psalm of David asks the question, who shall be admitted to the temple, the worshipping community? The answer given is those who do what is right and speak the truth, who honor and fear (meaning respect and worship) the Lord, and who are trustworthy. As you read the Psalm, ask yourself if you do these things, and, if not, what might you do differently in your life?

#### September 8: Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost/Proper 18: Read James 2:1-10

When we treat people based upon their appearance or how much wealth they have, we fail to follow the command to love neighbor as self. Where do you do this in your life? What action(s) can you take to remedy this situation?

#### September 15: Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost/Proper 19: Psalm 116:1-9

The psalmist gives thanksgiving for his/her recovery from illness after describing his/her supplications to God. How often do we receive the benefits of prayer, yet forget to give thanks in return? Begin or continue a practice of thanksgiving for prayers answered whether small or large.

#### September 22: Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost/Proper 20: James 3:13 - 4:3

James tells us when good works are done with wisdom and not selfish ambition, we will sow a harvest of righteousness and peace. Conflicts and disputes arise when we want it all our own way. What can you do to become more gentle, honest, and merciful in a world filled with conflict?

#### September 29: Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost/Proper 21: Read Mark 9:42-50

Mark warns us of all the ways we are tempted to sin or cause others to stumble due to our actions. What do you think it means when he says, "have salt in yourselves?" How can that give you peace with one another?
