As we look forward to July 11th and being together in the sanctuary, let's embody the love and good works noted in the scripture above and show up in person. Gathering together is a meaningful way to encourage each other in our faith journeys.

From the Council President

"So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord – for we walk by faith, not by sight.... So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

2 Corinthians 5: 6-7, 17

I was honored to be selected for a one-year term as President by the Church Council at its June 14th meeting, and very much appreciate the confidence expressed in that selection. I want to thank Dreama Terrill for the wonderful leadership that she provided to us as President during the past three years, and ask for your prayers and support as we move forward to build on the great tradition of St. John's.

As we emerge from the pandemic, and are able to gather once more for inperson worship, starting on July 11th, there is a strong temptation to go back to the way things were "before," to the old creation. But our challenge now is to acknowledge our impulse to go back to the old, while Jesus urges us forward into the new.

During the pandemic, we suspended in-person worship to protect those who were most susceptible to infection, to help protect our communities, our families and ourselves. Even with those sacrifices, some 600,000 people died of Covid-19 in this country alone. May they rest in peace, and may their families and loved ones know God's peace and grace in their grief.

Now that we are emerging from pandemic time, we long to get back to the old, familiar ways of doing things.But we have been changed by this pandemic in ways that we are only beginning to understand. We have lost much, in addition to those who have died. Many have lost health as they continue to live with long-term effects of Covid-19. Many have lost jobs. We have lost favorite restaurants and shops and other services. We have lost some confidence in ourselves and in each other.

But we have also gained much. We have learned new ways to worship and new ways to connect with people who didn't or weren't able to come to worship with us before. We have discovered new strengths and resilience. We have discovered ways of being family when we couldn't be physically present for each other, and we learned how to continue to be Church when we couldn't worship in person.

As we return to the Sanctuary, we will continue to exercise restraint for the sake of the most vulnerable, including children under the age of 12 and others who cannot be vaccinated, and we will continue to offer online worship for those who are unable or uncomfortable coming back to in-person worship. For now, we will continue to wear masks indoors. And although some may find this frustrating, we look forward to the day when these restrictions will no longer be necessary.

We have much to look forward to. The Congregational Life and Care Committee is hard at work planning upcoming activities, including a return to indoor Fellowship lunches, an August baseball game outing, a September picnic, applesauce-making in October and the return of the German Heritage Dinner in November. The Missions and Outreach Committee is working to identify community needs to which St. John's can respond, both with our hands-on labor and our financial support. Pastor Tom continues to help us discern our way in the Interim Ministry process, ultimately leading to a search for a new Settled Pastor. The Trustees and Renovations Committee are continuing to oversee the completion of repairs to equip our building for the next phase of our ministry to the community and to each other.

But these committees and the Church Council can't do it alone. We need your prayers, your ideas, your input and your participation. As noted in the excerpts from Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians quoted above, we are on the brink of a new creation. Please help make it so!

July Mission of the Month: FeedMore

Starting out as "Meals on Wheels" for shut-ins, Feed More has evolved into so very much more over the years. Directly from its website, here is what it does:

Feed More collects, prepares and distributes food to your neighbors who struggle with hunger.

You might not know it, but 1 out of every 10 individuals in Central Virginia is food insecure, meaning that more than 160,000 of our neighbors face hunger on a daily basis. Many of these neighbors of ours are working one or more jobs and are barely scraping enough together to get by each month. These are our neighbors who are living paycheck to paycheck when an unexpected medical expense or car trouble takes them down, depleting what little savings they have. These are our neighbors who are forced to make tough choices each month between basic necessities – pay the electricity bill or buy healthy groceries for well-balanced meals for themselves and their families. In 2020, with the support of the community, Feed More distributed 37,021,220 pounds of food, which is the equivalent of 30,851,017 meals to our neighbors in need. Most of their clients only need help for a few times, many visiting the pantries less than 7 times before they are back on their feet.



Additionally, in our area, thousands of kids and teens are receiving free or reduced lunch. Due to the Pandemic and when school ends, these kids and teens are without those lunches. Feed More's Summer Food Service Program provides thousands of children and teens with healthy and reliable breakfast and lunch meals, free of charge, during the summer. During the Pandemic, Feed More has worked to fill the gap for the youth who were attending school virtually.

St. John's has been a supporter of Feed More for years, and now they need us even more as they restock their pantries for the onslaught of summer needs. Return to in-person worship, July 11th

We will be returning to in-person Sunday worship in the sanctuary on July 11th!! Although it appears that most members of our congregation have been vaccinated, we are asking everyone to continue to wear masks while in the building to protect guests and those who may not have been vaccinated. We will have masks available for those who need them. We will be able to sing hymns during the service, but while seated and masked. Also, you will see that we have marked every other pew for occupancy in order to maintain appropriate distancing. Although many of us have not seen each other in person for many months, please do not congregate in the aisle before or after the service. And instead of passing the collection plates, we will place them at the doors for you to deposit your offerings on your way in or out of the building. After the service we will have a time for fellowship and refreshments (including treats from David Craig) outside, during which masks will not be required.

While you are in the building, we hope you will take advantage of the opportunity to view the new display of church memorabilia in the alcove just outside the Parlor by the elevator door, prepared by the interim ministry history project group (thanks to Betsy and Richard Bighinatti, David Craig, Johanna Gilbert and Dreama Terrill). You should also notice the newly-restored front and side doors; the new carpeting in the narthex and the Lombardy Street entrance foyer; upgraded rest rooms, with hot water in the sinks; new energy-efficient LED lighting throughout the building; an upgraded elevator and new chairlift on the stairs leading from the back parking area to the Parlor; and a raised clearance (no more hitting your head!) on the door from the Parlor to the Sanctuary.

Although parking continues to be available on Sunday mornings along the Monument Avenue median strip, we now have designated parking spaces (marked "CH") in the alley next to the church and along the right-hand and far walls in the apartment building garage.

Finally, for those who are not yet ready to come back to in-person worship, we will continue to stream the service by Zoom, live from the Sanctuary.
