Genesis 8:13

13 In the six hundred first year, in the first month, on the first day of the month, the waters were dried up from the earth; and Noah removed the covering of the Ark, and looked, and saw that the face of the ground was drying. 14 In the second month, on the twenty-seventh day of the month, the earth was dry. 15 Then God said to Noah, 16 "Go out of the Ark, you and your wife, and your sons and your sons' wives with you."

I admit sometimes I'm a whiner. And recently I've been whining ... a lot. I want to go to the store without having to wear a hot, sticky mask. I want to go to a restaurant to have dinner with friends, get my hair cut, go visit my friends in the country and sit on their new back porch. I want to see my brother-in-law, with whom I am still grieving over the death of his wife/my sister. I want to see our economy start to rebound.

I want ... I want ... I want.

Then I got to thinking about Noah, but more importantly about Noah's wife. And, being the scientific person I like to think I am, I did a bit of calculations.

According to the text, Genesis 7: 11- 13, in the six hundredth year of Noah's life, the second month, on the 17th day of the month ... they entered the Ark.

We all know about the rain for 40 days and 40 nights; we get it pounded into our spiritual heads from the time we are able to sit up. What we don't find out until well after we reach adulthood is this: the 40 days reference used over and over again in the bible is a spiritual time frame, one that signifies probation, trial and/or chastisement, not an actual unit of measure.

We all know about the animals, 2 by 2, which, based on the square footage of the Ark could have held around 70,000 creatures according to scientists at the University of Leicester in England. (And by the way, the Ark was about 1/3rd the size of the Titanic).

Frankly, I hadn't really thought about this very much until recently, given where we are right now in the world with the pandemic. But let's just consider this:

June Devotion

Noah was 600 years old when God closed up the Ark with he, his wife, his 3 sons, and their wives, and somewhere in the neighborhood of 70,000 animals. You have got to know that Mrs. Noah was pulling her hair out trying to keep the Ark from smelling like rancid camel dung and keeping the sheep out of the bags of corn. I can't imagine any amount of goat litter would be enough to keep the air fresh. And remember, according to the text, God had sealed the doors and windows. HOLY MOLY, Batman!!! Can't you just hear her holler "Can we just PARK this thing somewhere for Jehovah's sake and open a window??!!!'

But the story gets a bit more exciting. In the scripture I chose above, it clearly states "in the six hundred first year"!!! Wait, ... WHAT!!!

The Ark was sealed on the 17th day of the second month of Noah's 600th year, and they didn't leave the Ark until the 27th day of the second month of Noah's 601st year. Noah was 600 when they started floating around, and now he's 601!!??

A year? A WHOLE YEAR??

70,000 animals, two 600-year-old parents, their three sons and wives were adrift for a year without a window open, without a haircut, without internet ... without, without, without.

And when it was over, God sent a rainbow as a sign of his everlasting covenant to never again destroy the life on earth.

It's only been ten weeks for me, so what the heck do I have to whine about, eh? Is it fun? No. Am I worried about my loved ones and my future? Yes, I certainly am. But I'm not locked up in an ark with a 600-year-old spouse and knee deep in sheep dung.

Let's all trust God has given our scientists the knowledge they need to help keep us safe through this, and let's follow the guidelines even if they make us miss a few comforts. Remember, we could all be like Mrs. Noah and her gang of 7 + 70,000. And let's remember God's promise, to always be present for us.

Thank you, God, for reminding me most of the things I'm missing are just things. Continue to keep one hand on my shoulder and the other hand over my mouth if I want to complain too much. Thank you for the food on my table, the roof over my head, and the friends and family I am blessed to have. Amen.

Annual Meeting Report

The St. John's Annual Meeting took place by Zoom after church on May 31st. The following church members were elected to the following positions:

David Agee, Marcie Agee, Betsy Bighinatti, Kathy Freise, Dreama Terrill and Terry Weaver were elected to two-year terms as members of the Church Council.

Jeff Jacobs was re-elected to a three-year term as Trustee.

Jeff Michel was elected to a three-year term on the Audit Committee.

Betsy Bighinatti, Jeff Jacobs and Beth Oxenham were re-elected to three-year terms on the Endowment Board.

Questions were addressed relating to the search for an Interim Pastor and the process for returning to worship in the church building. The Church Council is working with the Central Atlantic Conference of the UCC to identify candidates for the Interim Pastor position, and will be appointing a search committee to evaluate Interim Pastor candidates. In the meantime, members and friends of the church will be preaching and conducting the Sunday online services, and you may contact Rev. Beverly Lindsey, at revbevlindsey@gmail.com or (804) 275-7165 if you would like to serve as a worship service liturgist. In addition, you may contact Rev. Beverly Lindsey with any personal or pastoral concerns.

With regard to returning to worship in the church building, the priority is maintaining the safety and health of our members, friends and visitors. The Church Council is constantly monitoring and evaluating guidance from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Virginia Health Department, the UCC and other church resources, and the church's insurance carrier. We hope that it will be possible to resume worship services in the sanctuary by late summer, at which point the new heating and cooling system will be fully operational. But we recognize that some people may prefer to participate in worship without coming to the building, and therefore we intend to continue to offer worship via Zoom or another online platform even after we return to worship in the church building.
