Message from the Pastor

My friends,

Those who have studied the Bible and the ancient languages in which it was written seem to agree: the second letter to the church in Corinth represents the apostle Paul's theological struggles better than any other letter in the New Testament.

In it, Paul wrestles with and writes to one of the earliest gatherings of people of faith who were struggling themselves with this Good News; that is, the Gospel of Jesus Christ: "...Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:14-15)

How do you feel about this? Is this Good News for us here, in 21st century Richmond, VA?

The photo on the page below is from a collection of artwork and writings called <u>Imaging the Word</u>. I offer this today because while I have and will continue to study the Bible, I am no scholar and I have no ancient languages. Very often I rely on contemporary resources like <u>Imaging the Word</u>, on lyrics from modern songwriters, and on my own experience of life in community, to more fully comprehend what God is up to in the world. I believe that our ancestors in faith were doing the same – reflecting on their life experience alone and together to understand the nature of relationship with one another and with God – and so reading their stories is essential to my theological struggles. But never to the exclusion of my own experience of life. And especially, most recently, my experience of life here with you people of St. John's UCC.

I will not claim to fully comprehend how or why things come about as they do. And sometimes the feelings I experience are contradictory to the principles of our faith. Yet, when all is said and done, I remain optimistic and believe in the Good News.

I think that the sort of delight I see in this photo is the residual feeling that is sustained in me with you all: like two sisters who have climbed to a high place together, facing into a strong wind on a hot summer day, we can look ahead and feel refreshed even by what we can not see.

So here's a quote for you... for St. John's UCC... and for the days ahead.

"That's why we live with such good cheer... it's what we trust in but don't yet see that keeps us going." (2 Corinthians 5:6a & 7)



June Devotional

Acts 2:44-47

"44 All the believers were together and had everything in common. 45 They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. 46 Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, 47 praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

As we enter the Pentecost season, oftentimes the focus falls on the early church. While we can recognise that times are very different now than they were 2,000 years ago; many things have stayed the same. Recently I was reminded of the myth of the Cowboy. Oftentimes portrayed as a lone wanderer roaming the wide open spaces of the American West, making their way on their own. I call it a myth because in reality that was not how the West was "won." Communities came together, towns formed, governments were set in place. As we look at this past year, what have been the things you have craved the most? Was it alone time? Was it doing things on your own? Or was it a connection with other people?

So many of humanity's instincts actually rely on working together and being part of a group. In many ways, that is what God wants of us too. God values personal growth, but I think even more important is the growth of the church as a whole. As a community of faith, we are stronger and more capable of caring for each other than any of us are on our own.

God, may each of us pray and find a way to be a part of your church body. Amen.

From the Desk of the Council President

Time flies!!! It's truly amazing how quickly time slips away. Until we stop and look back to where we were, we don't realize how fast time flies or how far we've come.

In the fall of 2018 we finalized the sale of our parking lot so that we could renovate our building and the race was on. That seems like only yesterday to most of us, doesn't it? Yet here we are, three years later, preparing to worship again in our beautiful sanctuary on July 11th after being elsewhere for what feels like forever. It will be a true homecoming for us. Many of us have felt as if it would never happen in our lifetimes. And along the way many of those have become part of St. John's "cloud of witnesses" who enfold us with their memories and have made so many things possible.

It was the congregational meeting in May 2018 that I rejoined the Church Council after many years and began serving as President. It was a real honor to begin my service with such an amazing group of folks. Johanna Gilbert, Scott Siefert, and Laura Totty were on that Council with me, along with Betsy Bighinatti, Marcie Agee, David Agee and Rob Osborn. Those folks worked tirelessly along with various committee members to get everything accomplished for the parking lot sale and planning for the HVAC and other renovations. Sometimes daily phone calls and meetings and negotiations were taking place with the City of Richmond, the attorney for the buyer, the developer, the Historic District, and on and on and on. In the meantime, our Missions Committee was finding and involving us in great local organizations as part of our outreach. Our Worship and Music committee was helping plan upcoming services. The Facilities Committee, under Richard Bighinatti, got the necessary repairs done. The Congregational Life and Care Committee, chaired by Scott Siefert and then Betsy Bighinatti, was doing a great job planning activities and helping to keep our church community connected.

In 2019, Laura and Johanna left the Council, and their hard work and dedication cannot be over stated. Joining us that year were Jeff Jacobs and Daniel Martin. Jeff was already very involved with the Renovations Committee, along with Trustees Sarah Allen, Rob Osborn and then Jeff Hetzer. And as we were to find out in about nine months, Daniel's skills would become even more vital to our church in several ways.

In 2020, Kathy Freise and Terry Weaver joined the Council as we dealt with the sudden resignation of our Pastor, began to struggle with the Pandemic, moved into a virtual mode of worship and began meeting to keep all of us safe and together as a community. Scott Siefert moved to Minnesota with his wife, Chris Wing, and David Craig agreed to take his slot on the Council. Our Worship Committee, under the leadership of Rev. Beverly Lindsey, became a vital part of meeting our weekly spiritual needs during our search for an interim minister by providing us with a wonderful array of different preachers and styles of worship. We came to understand our resilience as a community in the face of fast-paced evolution.

The year 2020 was also a time of social upheaval, and St. John's found its building almost dead center in the struggle for social justice during the summer. From our Juneteenth commemoration through our weekly vigils supporting peaceful protests and the Black Lives Matter movement, under the leadership of Terrie Pendleton and then Lindsey Franklin and Winston, St. John's has stood firm against the forces of institutional racism and white supremacy.

It was during 2020 that the Council decided that continuity of leadership would be helpful in maintaining our momentum in the face of so many other changes, and recommended that all officers stay in their positions for one more year. And so I ended up serving as President for three years instead of the usual two. St. John's has made remarkable changes and progress in these past three years. The folks I have had the honor to serve with on your Church Council and committees have been nothing short of amazing. Betsy and Richard Bighinatti have been remarkably dedicated to the continuation of our operations in so many ways I cannot list them all. I so appreciate all of their hard work and counsel. Marcie Agee has kept us focused on our mission and outreach ministries, and we have been able to help so many, many folks through the funding that she was able to obtain from the Stille Foundation and your generous donations. Beverly Lindsey has done a fabulous job in keeping our worship timely and spirit-focused. Of course Shirley Townsend and the talented musicians whom she directs is the rock on which all of our music depends. Bud Higgins and Richard Bighinatti came every week to record Shirley and our other musicians and singers for worship. And I can't say enough about Daniel Martin and his skills in digital outreach that have helped to bring us together, share our message with the online community, and see us through our move to online worship and soon to a hybrid combination of in-person and online worship. Terri Weaver's insight has been invaluable. Kathy Freise has kept us informed and connected with our community, denominational and spiritual ministries. And I am very grateful to Jeff Jacobs and all he has done, from advising on legal matters, reviewing contracts, dealing with City agencies, and handling our Historic Tax Credit applications and negotiations, to documenting Council actions as Secretary. Scott Siefert helped get a regular bible study going, and even though he moved out of state, has continued to hold those sessions through the wonder of Throughout it all, our church secretary, Melissa, has kept our Zoom. communications up to day and put together the Messenger, among other duties.

I'm quite certain I have left out many folks who have been vital to our church's successful navigation, especially during the past year, and for that I humbly ask your forgiveness.Just take a look at all the faces, both near and far, on our Sunday morning worship. Each and every one of those faces, of YOU, have been instrumental to our blessed community.

It has been an honor to hold lightly the reins of Council President during these last three years of change here at St John's. We are experiencing an amazing Pentecostal moment in our church and our nation. The future is wide open and bright. Thank you for allowing me to serve.

Congregational Meeting Held on May 16th

St. John's held its annual congregational meeting on May 16th to elect leaders for the 2021-2022 church year, which began on June 1st. David Craig, Jeff Jacobs, Daniel Martin and Lynn Snyder were elected to the Church Council; Rob Osborn was elected to the Board of Trustees; and Bud Higgins and Tony Sharpenstein were elected to the Endowment Board. The Congregation also approved the expenditure of up to an additional \$250,000 from the proceeds of the sale of the church parking lot to complete the new HVAC system in the education/office wing of the church and a number of other capital improvements.
